

ed overwhelmingly to move forward with an expansion of the Narthex and Gathering Place. I'm excited for this project which will strengthen our welcome of people into the life of First Lutheran and enhance our ability to create community. In our world people are hungry for authentic community, and we are creating a space that will foster those connections that bring real healing and life.

Let me give you a brief update as to where we are. There are two things going on simultaneously, the work of the Renovation Committee and the work of the Capital Campaign Committee. It's a bit of a dance since both groups need information from the other group to move forward, but it's a dance we know well and have done before with the Peel House.

The Renovation Committee has engaged with CRP architects for an assessment of the facility as it is now. Once that is complete, they will begin work on schematic designs for phase one. The committee has listened carefully to the congregation's feedback presented at the Ministry Gatherings and is working to incorporate that feedback into the design. We are looking to engage an artist to design the new stained-glass spire and focus on some elements of the façade of the new building that will inspire faith. We are also thinking through how to honor the history of the Bell Tower since it was an iconic part of First Lutheran's public image in the past. Over the next few

months, the Renovation Committee will more precisely define the scope of phase one and develop a budget for the project.

In the meantime, the Capital Campaign Committee is also getting organized. The committee has already begun meeting with lead donors who have committed to giving over \$100,000 to the project. That work will continue over the next couple of months as we build momentum for the public phase of the campaign, which will likely happen in the spring of 2026. It has been incredible and surprising how many people are anxious to make a commitment and even give this year. Significant donations have already been received! The campaign will work to tell the story and invite generosity, but we also recognize some people have already prayed about this and are prepared to give. We are ready to receive any gifts people feel called to make.

I will work to keep you updated so that you are aware of what is happening behind the scenes. Please keep this whole project in your prayers that God would use it to unite our congregation and strengthen our witness. I pray God will use this church and this project to proclaim the good news of the gospel of Jesus and bring people to saving faith. God's will be done.

FROM THE PASTOR

Sunday's Message

NOVEMBER 9, 2025

PASTOR TRAVIS NORTON LUKE 20: 27 – 38

I GREW UP IN UTAH which as many of you know is heavily populated by members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. So, religion was always a topic in my growing up years. As I grew in my own faith, especially during confirmation, I started talking with my Mormon friends about the differences between our beliefs. I invited them to my church; they invited me to their church. I set up appointments with their Bishops and missionaries to debate the difference between our beliefs. My parents didn't love it when missionaries showed up at our door, and I had forgotten the appointment leaving them to deal with them.

One of the biggest differences between our faith and the LDS faith is that we believe in the Holy Trinity. We believe that God is Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons in one, an eternal relationship of love. I remember one Mormon missionary arguing with me about this by trying to show how ridiculous the idea of the Trinity is. His strategy was to focus on the prayers of Jesus. He would ask me mocking questions about Jesus. Who was he praying to in the Garden? Who was Jesus talking to on the cross? If the Trinity is true, was Jesus just talking to himself? Of course, he wasn't interested in my answers, he only wanted to make me feel that my belief was silly and therefore wrong. It's exactly the strategy the Sadducees used when they questioned Jesus about the resurrection. I wish I had Jesus' skill that he demonstrates in his conversation with the Sadducees. The Sadducees were a sect of Jews who didn't believe in the resurrection or life after death or heaven or any of that. And they confront Jesus with questions designed to ridicule his teaching that people come back to life after they

die. They zero in on the Bible's instructions about caring for a woman when her husband dies. The law said that the dead man's brother was required to take her in as his wife and care for her. But they take this to the extreme degree imagining she loses seven husbands and then asking Jesus who gets her in the resurrection. You can almost see them chuckling to themselves as they ask the ridiculous question because they don't believe in the resurrection and they think they've shown Jesus why it's a stupid belief. Only a dummy would believe that people come back to life after they die and only an idiot believes in heaven and resurrection.

Our Christians beliefs are often maligned this way by those who can't imagine that there is more to this life than what we see. There are many problems with the Sadducees question, but the biggest one is simply a failure of imagination. They assume that the resurrection and heaven abide by the same rules and traditions as this life. They can't imagine that it would be different, that the power structures of heaven are different, that relationships and status are different. Jesus' answer to their question uncovers their failure and gives us a glimpse of heaven worthy of our exploration. On the face of it His answer might sound like bad news, especially for those of you who really like your husband or wife. He says that in heaven there is no marriage, nobody marries and nobody is given in marriage. Think about that second phrase, nobody is given in marriage. In Jesus' day, and throughout much of history, women were considered property, given to a man in marriage. That's the assumption of the Sadducees that they can't imagine ever changing. In Bible study when we looked at this passage, one

of the women in the group said she would hate to be the woman in the illustration being handed over to seven different men and having her eternity debated in terms of who would own her. It's a good reminder of why it's important to study the scripture from all points of view because, embarrassingly, I hadn't even considered the woman's perspective in this. Jesus says that the rules that oppressed women and made them property don't exist in the life to come. I can imagine some women overhearing this in the temple who were in arranged marriages who didn't have love or companionship but were treated as property, hearing this as welcome good news. Their imaginations would be open to a future where they were free, where they had equality, where they were like angels. Jesus says that in heaven we become like the angels, children of the resurrection who do not die. Jesus answers the Sadducees inviting them to broaden their perspective and defends belief in the resurrection and heaven.

What do you imagine heaven being like? I think of all the questions I get asked about heaven. What age will we be in heaven? People ask, mostly hoping they get to be young again. Will we recognize each other in heaven? What will we do in heaven? A lot of people are concerned that heaven will be boring, like one big church service that never ends. I mean I love church, I've devoted my life to church, but I'm also committed to church service lasting no more than one hour. I would not look forward to a heaven that looks like an endless church service. Pastor Michaela, Lori and I did a podcast episode on heaven and hell. For some reason my nine-year-old girls keep asking to listen to our podcast. We listened to this episode together in the van on the way to our Saturday McDonald's run, and they started asking me questions about heaven. My stock answer about heaven, especially when people worry about being bored, is to remind people that God made this world that we love and enjoy so much. I told my girls that and then asked them what they love about this world and to imagine that in heaven but even better. They gave it some thought, and then blurted out that heaven must be like Disneyland. But not just one Disneyland but like five Disneylands.

That might be their idea of heaven, but it sounds more like hell to me.

We can't know much about heaven, but Jesus does give us clues and glimpses. As he riffs on heaven he focuses on the resurrection. We believe, as we confess in the Apostle's Creed in the resurrection of the body. Whatever heaven is it is a place where we have physical bodies. We will eat and drink and touch and use all of our senses. This goes against the idea that heaven is a disembodied place for the soul. These bodies matter, God made them and when they work as God designed, they are pretty great. When I think of heaven I think of children at play. They run and jump and crawl and roll, their hearts beat fast, they have endless energy. They use their bodies and as they play they seem to lose all sense of time. When parents tell kids at play it's time to go home it doesn't matter how long they've been playing it always ends too soon. I think heaven will be like play, no sense of time, full enjoyment and full use of our God given bodies.

Jesus says that God is the God of the living, and then name drops the patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and even Moses. He says that to God all of them are alive. That means their story continues, their relationship with God continues. Think of the promises God made to them and they died without having received the promise. But if they live to God then they see that God is continuing the work to fulfill the promises. Abraham sees God giving children to Isaac and wrestling with Jacob and giving him 12 sons that become the 12 tribes of Israel. All of them see the birth of Jesus, the fulfillment of the promise to save the world through one of their descendants. The story goes on! When we think of heaven and the resurrection, our imagination stalls out. We imagine that the story comes to an end, that there is no more adventure, no more forward movement, nothing that is new. So, we worry that heaven will be boring. But that is what death is, death is an ending when everything stops, when the story is over. But to God death is anathema; it has no place in God. Jesus says God is not the God of the dead but the God of the living. So, in heaven there is life and that means the

story continues. There is movement and adventure and new things to learn and see and do. There is purpose in heaven, meaning and satisfaction and worthy pursuits. It's like when you're reading a really good book and you get to the end and there's a feeling of loss and disappointment because the story is over. But then you discover that the author has written a sequel and the story goes on with new twists and turns. That's the idea of heaven because God raises us up from the dead so that our story with God can continue.

The one consistent thing in Scripture about what heaven is like is that it is centered on the person of God. Whether it's a throne room where God is worshipped by the angels or a banquet where Jesus is the host, heaven is where God is front and center and our relationship with God is fully realized. Here we know in part and see in part, there we will see face to face. In heaven God dries every tear, death is no more, and God lives with us. Revelation talks about a new Jerusalem coming down and heaven is a city we live in. But in the new Jerusalem there is no temple because God is there instead walking with us.

Finally, we will know God as fully as we can, or more accurately, we will be fully in God's presence so we can get to know God more every day. We don't know everything about heaven but the things we do know give us hope and guide us in living this life. In heaven there is justice; all people are free from anything that oppressed or burdened them in this life. In heaven we are resurrected, our bodies renewed to use and enjoy as God intended. In heaven our story continues in our relationships with each other and most importantly our relationship with God. In heaven God is the center, we worship and learn and live with the God who made us and loves us. And because we know these things about heaven, we know how to live toward heaven today. God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven. So, let's be heavenly-minded here in this life. Working for justice and peace for all people today knowing that's the reality in heaven. Caring for the physical needs of one another, feeding the hungry, housing the homeless, healing the sick. We continue to collect food especially for those who didn't

receive SNAP benefits this month or didn't receive a paycheck this month because of the shutdown. We do this because we are working toward heaven where God's will is done and everybody is cared for and has what it needs to thrive.

Here on earth, we center our lives on God by worshiping him with our songs and prayers on Sunday and our service to our neighbor every day after. We are heaven-bound because Jesus has died for our sins and the father has claimed us as his own children. We don't just pray that God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven, we work for it. We work to make this place look more and more like the place Jesus described. There is heaven, there is life after this one, there is more to this world that we see now. Let that hope fill your heart, comfort your soul, and guide you in all that you do. Amen.

Applications for eviction prevention and temporary shelter increase each month. They received hundreds of applications in October. With several agencies in Colorado Springs reducing capacity or programs, the need continues to grow while services are being cut. Family Promise remains committed to keeping families facing situational homelessness together and off the streets.

As you know, we no longer house families here on the First Lutheran Campus. That doesn't mean they don't need our support. FLC is designating our January In-Gathering to support Family Promise of Colorado Springs. We plan to support Family Promise three different ways during the month of January 2026. THE EMMAUS WAY

"Spiritual discipline involves following the Lord, in the sense of becoming who he says we are, making true what is true, that is, claiming our connected relationship with God and one another and living it out...."

- Henri Nouwen

As we begin the turn from 2025 to 2026, I thought it might be good to briefly touch again on discipline and a Rule of Life. A Rule helps us walk closely with the Lord on our life's journey, growing in knowing who he says we already are. Have you spent much time thinking about who God says you are? If not, maybe now is a good time to start. What we believe about who we really are matters, because how we see and love ourselves directly affects how we see and love our neighbors.

This past Sunday we began the Contemporary Service with the song, Who You Say I Am. The lyrics include:

"I was lost but he brought me in, oh his love for me...Free at last, he has ransomed me; his grace runs deep...I am chosen, not forsaken; I am who you say I am... In the Father's house there's a place for me... Who the Son sets free, oh is free indeed. I'm a child of

God, yes I am. "

Do you think of yourself as chosen by God, found by God, brought into God's family, free, loved? If not, will you take a moment now to close your eyes and imagine God seeking you, finding you, choosing you, freeing you, bringing you into God's house? Pastor Travis talked in a recent sermon about how God delights in you. Can you picture God's delight in you as he calls you his child?

Believe it or not, doing this qualifies as a spiritual discipline. Why? One reason is because it's not the kind of thing that most of us do naturally in our spiritual lives; the doing of it takes a conscious choice. And why would we make such a choice? Because it helps us in "making true what is true," as Henri says above. And it is in growing in making it true that we become more deeply connected to God and one another and are enabled to live those relationships out in love.

In Christ we are chosen, not forsaken. We are recipients of astonishing grace. We are free. We have a home in God. We are loved. We are children of God, yes we are. Let's walk together in making true in this world what God says is already true, living out our relationship with God and others in love.
