JANUARY 21, 2024
MARK 1: 21-28
EXORCIZING THE DEMONS
THE JESUS IMPACT

Brothers and sisters in Christ grace, peace, and mercy to you from Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior.

It was just a regular Sabbath morning in Capernaum and the people were gathered for worship. They might have been sleepy, just pulling themselves out of bed, going because it was the right thing to do when really they wanted to stay in bed after a long week. Some were likely irritable for any number of reasons and as they approached the synagogue. A few might have argued with kids or a spouse on the way over, telling them to knock it off, we're on our way to church for pete's sake.

But it was the Sabbath, so they continued on the way. The people gathered together from all different backgrounds, different stations of life, different struggles from the week that they still carried, emotions running high or maybe not running at all. But they showed up because it was the Sabbath and that's what they did, moving through the liturgy and the songs, reading the Word, and then heading back home to spend the day as you would starting with a noontime meal.

But on this day, there would be a guest in the synagogue. The usual preacher was not there, it was Jesus of Nazareth, and the morning would not be one they would forget. Most did not know who this Jesus of Nazareth was, and likely were not super excited or expecting much; he was from Nazareth after all. He started to teach, and it was fine; it was likely better than fine, but maybe they just couldn't put their finger on why it was different or why it perked them up to listen. He wasn't a dazzling speaker; his speech not complicated, but he spoke in a way that made you want to listen, even the teenagers looked less bored.

You could describe him as having authority. This man had authority.

As he spoke about God's Kingdom one could sense that he was intimately familiar with that kingdom, that he was indeed a part of it. The impact he had on the people gathered was not because of any degree he had, or a slick delivery of sermon, this man was the flesh of the message he would proclaim. The people gathered likely didn't know what to do with this man. They listened intently, maybe nudged one another to see if those around them had the same feeling. Who was this man that brought the Word of God and was the Word of God, they were amazed on this otherwise normal Sabbath morning.

And just as the people were turning to one another from the back row, the yelling started. It was shrill and the people were likely startled and brought back to the reality of the day as the words of the preacher were overcome by the outburst in the back. "What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth?

Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, you are the Holy One of God!" I imagine it in a sinister voice, what one might imagine a serpent to sound like.

Well, this certainly wasn't the average Sabbath in synagogue now was it?

And Jesus didn't back down or shrink into his space, he commanded back, "Be quiet!" The people were glad that Jesus said it because then they didn't have to. I mean really, an outburst like that in church? Have people no manners?

But no sooner than Jesus had said "be quiet" he followed up with "come out of him!" The man sputtered and shook, likely collapsed in an exhausted mess and then was better. The craze in his eyes gone, and a calm overtook him. Well, you can bet he was the only one that was calm, the rest must have been picking their jaws up off the floor and trying not to stare.

This certainly was a different week at church. Usually by now in the service people have begun to think about the next part of their day, what they were going to have for lunch, and when were we going to be finished so we could get up to use the bathroom without people staring. But not today, today everyone wondered what was going to happen next because they had just encountered Jesus and he was all they were likely going to talk about for quite some time.

On this day, the Sabbath, the people went to church, and they encountered God. What they didn't know then was they had also encountered the very Son of God.

Each week, we gather here and bring all our things from the week with us. When we gather and we invoke the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit we know that they are present with us. But when was the last time that we were fired up by the presence of God among us? What is so bold as to make us exclaim that God is here, with us now, for us always? The people in Capernaum came to know Jesus in this first act of ministry, in this act of authority, in the exorcism of an unclean spirit. We shouldn't need that act of authority to know that Jesus is with us in worship. Worship is the center of our life together, then and now. Jesus is truly here with us and for us. Anything can happen and something lifegiving will always happen, every time.

Mark's Gospel is proclamation that Jesus is the Messiah and Son of God, whose death and resurrection paid the penalty for our sins and achieved victory over Satan, sin, and death. In this episode the authority of Jesus' teaching is paired with his dramatic and effective exorcism of the unclean spirit. Those who witness it are amazed both by the authority of his teaching and his authority over unclean spirits. The impact of his actions causes his reputation to grow throughout Galilee.

Jesus' first act in Mark might very well be one of the most important texts of our time. I don't know that we hear often enough that God's first feat after the wilderness is to confront evil. That it is Jesus exerting authority in both his teaching and his power over evil. God shows us that He will take on the demons that possess us, that he can cast out and silence the forces who attempt to sway us toward idolatry and blasphemy.

Today, right now, is the time to remember, to recognize and to believe that God has indeed reclaimed our existence. That when we hear the words of Jesus that cast out evil, we too might be empow-

ered to confront evil and demand its silence. We must trust that God always goes where we think God won't or can't — that God is in the places where evil lurks and beckoning us to find our way out, to reclaim who we are in Jesus Christ.

When the demon-possessed man disrupted the meeting, Jesus simply ordered the demon to leave, and it left. The people in the synagogue had never seen anything like it. Who could have such authority that even evil spirits have to obey his straightforward word?

Jesus, the Son of God, had all the authority in the world—in the universe. God created all things through him and put all things under him. So even these spirits that turned evil, were completely subject to him.

Yet Jesus did not use his incomparable authority the way we tend to use our ideas of authority. We tend to use authority to our advantage, a way of furthering or promoting oneself, of getting our own way, of suppressing the truth, and of getting and holding the power to keep doing those things. We have been witness to how many dictatorial regimes, corporate, government and church scandals, tyrannical parents, bosses, teachers, government officials and more.

But not Jesus, he has all the authority there is, and uses it entirely differently. Jesus acts when necessary. We live regular lives, and Jesus walks alongside of us. He doesn't act to keep out those who might look different from us, who might look unsteady and possessed. He welcomes all, and if a problem arises, he deals with it then. He doesn't expect the worst. But when the worst happens, when evil overcomes, he also doesn't overreact. There is no big show or berating, no screaming and no killing. He just firmly makes the demon go away. He also seeks no gain

from shutting down the impure spirit. He moves on with His teaching, serving with patience and mercy, letting us grow to see that we need him in our life and in our world.

Jesus uses his authority to help us, not to destroy us. He drives out the demons, not us.

Sin itself is an enemy that does us damage and holds it over us. Because we, too, are sometimes possessed by an "unclean spirit." And I suspect that sometimes we wonder and wait for things to happen, for the evil to go away, for the sin to stop being a temptation. And when Jesus acts, when we are open to letting Jesus in and releasing the evil or sin out; is it as dramatic as the story here? Actually, sometimes it is. Ask around and you'll find stories of people who have had dramatic and sudden encounters with grace and mercy, with release and relief. But sometimes it's not that intense moment we might be waiting for. Sometimes the road to healing and restoration takes time and company. Sometimes it's not about a single pastoral visit but the steady care of a grief support network, or an AA group in the church, or a prayer chain, or parenting group, or whatever it is you might need. God is at work in all these ways and so many more to free us from the unclean spirits, the evil, the sin that still possesses us. Turning towards Jesus, recognizing and relying on his authority and his ability to cast out evil results in healing and restoration for us and for the world. Where can you be open to the Jesus Impact in your life, what can you turn over to Him and let him cast out for you?


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HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH GATHERING PRE-TRIP MEETING February 11 12-1 p.m., Grades 8 – 12




SUNDAY ADULT SEMINAR
