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The New Church Year

As a church, Red Hill Lutheran is committed to serving Jesus by proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus, and making disciples of Jesus who are being equipped to love and serve Jesus through their daily lives. This is the mission of Red Hill Lutheran Church and School. As we begin a new ministry year (September 2025-August 2026), it is vital that we understand the foundations upon which we build our ministry and facilitate our mission as a church. Red Hill's Purpose, Vision, Mission, Core Values, and Ministry "Targets," serve as the "guard rails" for our ministry plans, programs, and processes.

Purpose, Vision, Mission, Values, and Ministry Targets of Red Hill Lutheran Church

Both Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions affirm that in His love and mercy, God desires to redeem and reconcile the world through Jesus Christ. In order to carry out this salvific mission, Jesus has commanded His church to make and send disciples into the world. A disciple is one called through the Gospel to be a student, an apprentice of Jesus. In the Gospel of Matthew, we are told that as Jesus prepared to ascend back to Heaven, Jesus commissioned the church to make disciples, even describing the means of this disciple-making mission: teaching and baptizing in the name of the Triune God...:

Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28.18-20)

This "Great Commission" given by Jesus directs and defines the work of the church. In the New Testament, the word, "Church," comes from the Greek word, ἐκκλησία (ekklēsia). A compound word consisting of ἐκ (ek), meaning "out" or "from" and καλέω (kaleō), meaning, "to call." Consequently, ἐκκλησία (church) describes a community "called out" for assembling together. The church is the people of God called out from the world and assembled together for the purpose of making disciples through God's Word (teaching) and Sacraments (baptizing, Eucharist). All for the divine purpose of being sent back into the world to love and serve God and others.

As a church commissioned by Jesus, Red Hill Lutheran Church and School (RHLC&S) seeks to fulfill Jesus' commands to make disciples through baptizing and

> teaching in the name of the Triune God for the purpose of faithful living. As a distinctively Lutheran Church, our very identity is defined by these divine commands...

> ...(the)...one holy Christian church will be and remain forever. This is the assembly of all believers, among whom the Gospel is preached in its purity and the holy sacraments are administered according to the Gospel...It is as Paul says in Eph. 4:4-5 "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism." (*The Augsburg Confession*, Article VII).

In his explanation of the Third Article

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of the Apostles' Creed, Martin Luther describes how God calls people to follow Jesus, feeding and leading His church in the world...

I believe that by my own reason or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to him. But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, and sanctified and preserved me in true faith, just as he calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth and preserves it in union with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church he daily and abundantly forgives all my sins, and the sins of all believers, and on the last day he will raise me and all the dead and will grant eternal life to me and to all who believe in Christ. This is most certainly true. (*Luther's Small Catechism*)

At Red Hill, our *purpose*, vision, mission, core values, and ministry targets, describe the culture and climate we seek to create for the purpose of making disciples of Jesus.

Purpose, Vision, Mission, Values, and Ministry Targets of Red Hill Lutheran Church

Our commitment to making disciples is reflected in...

Our Purpose (Why We Exist): "Know Christ. Make Christ known."

Vision Statement (What We Aim to Achieve): "Making Christ Centered, Emotionally Healthy Disciples of Jesus, One life at a time."

Mission Statement (How We Will Achieve Our Vision): "Reach and serve our local community, Equip their hearts, minds, and souls, and Release them into the world to share God's love."

Core Values (Commitments that Guide Us)

• Worship through Word and Sacrament—We believe the heart of the church's ministry is the corporate Worship of the Triune God through Word and Sacrament. Through the corporate Worship services, God meets us and serves us

through His means of grace. Our commitment is to preach the Gospel in its purity and truth, and administer the Sacraments as prescribed by Scripture. (*Deuteronomy 6.4-5; John 4.23-24*)

- **Biblically Faithful** We believe the Bible to be the inspired and inerrant Word of God and His Word is the basis for all we do. (*John 8.31-32*; 2 *Timothy 3.16*)
- Lutheran Theological Identity We believe that the Lutheran Confessions, as explicated in the Book of Concord, are a pure exposition of the Word of God. As such the Confessions ground us in the Gospel: "Grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone, revealed through Scripture alone, for the glory of God alone." (John 10.27-30; Romans 3.21-26)
- Christ Centered We believe the church is called through the Gospel of God's grace received through faith; we are saved and justified through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. Everything we do must flow from our relationship with Jesus Christ. (Mark 1.14-15; Luke 9.23-25)
- Emotionally Healthy We believe that spiritual maturity and emotional health are inseparable. Emotionally Healthy Discipleship (EHD) is a commitment to the whole person—body, mind, and soul, through every stage of life. Emotional health involves our relationships with God and others, focusing on how our needs, vulnerabilities, patterns of communication, and ways of understanding our emotions impact those relationships. Emotional Health flows from one's identity in Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit transforming the deep places in the soul, where our true self, as created in the image of God, exists. (Matthew 5.21-48; Ephesians 2.11-22)

- **Disciples** We believe a disciple is a "student," an "apprentice," of Jesus—we are learning how to live our lives as Jesus would live them. We grow and deepen our discipleship through specific, spiritual disciplines (Worship, Bible Study, Biblical Community, Prayer, and Servanthood). As we grow as disciples of Jesus (Christ-Centered), and experience the Spirit's transforming power in our emotional lives (emotional health), we will be equipped to love God and others to the glory of God. (*Matthew 28.19-20; Mark 12.28-31*)
- Christian Maturity We believe in fostering spiritual growth through Worship, Bible study, Biblical Community, Prayer, and Servanthood/Evangelism. (Acts 2.42-43; Philippians 2.12-13)



- **Mission Driven** We believe in helping members achieve their highest potential to fulfill God's calling to reach out boldly to others. (*Matthew 28.18-20; Matthew 25.31-46*)
- Accountability to God and Others We believe that God blesses us with abundant spiritual and material gifts and out of love and gratitude; we use them effectively in service to Him and to each other. (Romans 12; 2 Corinthians 8-9)

Again, as we begin this new ministry year, please continue to pray for our church and school! I invite you to join us in our ministry and mission here at Red Hill! God is ready to teach us to observe all that Jesus commanded, and live lives of ever-deepening faith, hope, and love!



Fall Sermon Series "I Believe." Understanding The Nicene Creed

(September-November)



In 325 A.D., the Roman emperor Constantine called together church leaders throughout the Roman Empire to gather in the city of Nicaea (Modern day Iznik, Tukey). The purpose of this gathering was to settle theological and political controversies concerning the doctrine of the Trinity and the person and mission of Jesus Christ. This initial, ecumenical council produced a statement of essential Christian beliefs known as the Nicene Creed. The Nicene Creed (as well as the Apostles' and Athanasian Creeds) articulates and summarizes orthodox, Christian belief.

As the Nicene Creed became the essential confession of faith for the church¹, still, questions about the nature of the Trinity, the relationship of Jesus to the Trinity, the relationship of the Holy Spirit to the Trinity and Jesus, as well as other related theological questions, continued to be debated and refined by church leaders in later, ecumenical councils. As theologian, Kevin DeYoung describes...

What we know as the Nicene Creed actually comes from the second ecumenical council,

which met at Constantinople in A.D. 381. The Niceno-Constantinoplotan Creed (as it is sometimes called) expands on the earlier Creed of Nicaea (325) by including a much longer statement on the Holy Spirit, as well as new wording about the Virgin Mary, the crucifixion, baptism, the church, the resurrection of the dead, and the life everlasting...The Nicene Creed may be the most important Christian text ever written. Since the fourth century, the Nicene Creed has served as the most influential, most ecumenical, and arguable most widely used statement of faith in the history of the church.²

Importantly, all of the ancient creeds (Nicene, Apostles', Athanasian) articulate and reflect biblical truth and revelation. The creeds are "theological mirrors of the Bible's fundamental doctrine" and "are the product of many centuries of Bible study by a great company of believers. They are a kind

of spiritual 'road map' of the teaching of the Bible, already worked out and proved by others before us." As a means of spiritual formation, these creedal confessions of faith...

...provide a concise reading of the Christian story and . . . vision of reality, being instruments that can at once define the community of faith and challenge alternative stories and visions of reality.⁵

Using primarily the Nicene Creed as the focus, this sermon series will explore the basic beliefs of the Christian faith. We will examine the Biblical basis for our beliefs, how these beliefs shape our thinking (theology) about God, our world, our selves, and how God desires that we live and relate in our world today. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus affirms the importance of understanding and living His words (teachings/life) in our lives...

"Everyone then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house on the rock. ²⁵And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock." (Matthew 7.24-25)

As Jesus makes very clear, the Biblical and theological truths we believe as Christians are the foundation upon which we build our lives, lives that will stand strong in the midst of the "storms" of this world! As disciples of Jesus in this current, cultural moment, it is essential that we understand the truths we believe, why we believe them, and how these beliefs and truths shape and guide our lives in our world today!

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven; by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,

and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life.

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

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"Wednesdays in the Word." Wednesday Morning Bible Study "Anchored: The Book of 1 Peter"

Living the Christian life in this world is both an incredible blessing, and at times, not easy. While some periods in Christian history were more volatile than others, the truth is that Biblical, Christian faith, as well as the personal and social values that are informed by the Christian faith, will conflict with the dominant, cultural values of the current age.

In the early decades of the First-Century, the Apostle Peter himself experienced the tensions, conflicts, sufferings, and outright persecutions that came *because* of his relationship with Jesus Christ. Aware that many in the early church were facing similar circumstances, Peter writes to some churches in the provinces of Roman Asia Minor, encouraging them to <u>hold on and stand strong</u>, *anchored* to Jesus Christ! As one commentator notes:

The readers of the Apostle Peter's letter were confused and discouraged by the persecution they were encountering because of their faith. Peter exhorted them to stand strong, repeatedly reminding them of Christ's example, the riches of their inheritance in him, and the hope of his returning again to take them to heaven.¹

The book of 1 Peter is Peter's initial letter to these beleaguered churches. Paradoxically, what Peter discovered personally, and then encouraged his community (and us) to discover as well, is that our hope and power to live as Jesus' disciples are found in the *sufferings*, and ultimate resurrection victory, of Jesus Christ. The Christ who suffered is also the Christ who is now exalted (1 Peter 3:19–22). Through His death and resurrection, Jesus conquered sin, death and the powers of hell, as well as every power that stands behind this "unholy trinity," seeking to discourage God's people in this world.

In our study of 1 Peter, we will examine the history and circumstances of the early church and how God called His people then, and continues to call His people now, to be faithful and persevere through times of conflict, challenge, and even persecution. Just as Peter assured the church in their first-century context, Peter assures

the church today that we too can trust that, no matter what the circumstances we face, as Jesus' disciples, we can live *hopefully* and *confidently* because we know Jesus is on the throne! As New Testament scholar, T.R. Schreiner writes:

When believers live in such a way, they indicate that they are placing their hope in God rather than in the joys and comforts of this world. Another way of describing 1 Peter is to say that those who hope and trust in God and in his future reward will have the strength to endure whatever comes their way in the present. When believers set their hope on the future, they reveal that their salvation comes from the cross of Christ, who bore their sins (2:24; 3:18)... Since the end is coming soon, believers should imitate Jesus Christ and follow his example of suffering, for all those who suffer will also experience a great reward.²

The goals of this study will be to gain a deeper understanding of the context, content, and message of 1 Peter, as well as the challenges and threats the church faces in every age. And, through this understanding, to encourage and equip disciples of Jesus today, to persevere through the changes and challenges of this world through living godly lives, being good citizens in the community, and being a faithful worker, spouse, and friend.

We hope you can join us for this verse-by-verse study in the book of 1 Peter. As always, this study is also livestreamed as well as recorded and posted on our website so that you can participate at any time!

The overall purpose of all of our Bible studies is to gain a deeper understanding of Jesus so that we can be obedient to Him as His disciples in this world. We would love for you to join us in this task.

Bring your Bibles, bring your questions and bring your desire to learn more about Jesus and His plan for you. You are always welcome!

After reading the materials, contact the Donna in the Church Office to make an appointment to meet with Pastor Seth.

During your meeting with Pastor Seth, he will provide an overview of Christian Baptism and the Service of Holy Baptism as administered in the Lutheran Church, as well as an opportunity to ask any questions you may have from the readings. After this meeting, the Baptism can be scheduled during one of the two Sunday morning Worship services. (Sponsors are welcome to attend the meeting with Pastor Seth, but it is not mandatory)

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To Will One Thing





An Update from the Red Hill Lutheran Church & School Endowment Committee

In the second half of the year, please consider making a tax-deductible donation to the Red Hill Lutheran Church & School Endowment Fund.

For some background, in 2000, visionary members of our church set up an endowment fund as a means for people to continue their Christian stewardship during and beyond their lifetime. This model, widely used by Lutheran Churches across America, is designed so that all the gifts received are left intact and cannot be spent – the fund keeps growing with each gift. Since 2000, there has been over \$1M of gifts received.

One of the best ways to give is through a will or living trust. A person may allocate a gift in the form of a percentage of the estate, a specific asset, or a stated dollar amount.

The committee prudently invests those gifts in cash accounts and marketable stock and bond funds with the intention of receiving annual appreciation. For example, over the last five years, the investment returns are greater than \$250K.

The committee distributes up to 75% of the annual investment income to worthy causes that help fulfill our Red Hill Lutheran Church Vision – Make Christ Centered, emotionally healthy disciples of Jesus – One life at a time. And our Mission – Reach and serve our local community, equip their hearts, minds and souls, and release them into the world to share God's love.

Over the last few years, these proceeds helped fund worthy causes such as: youth mission trips, RHL School needs-based scholarships and youth service awards, Christian character awards, tuition sponsorships for students attending Christian Universities, worship music for Christmas, Easter and special Sundays, musical instruments and smart technology systems for our praise band and many more important needs that aren't covered by the annual church budget.

Please give this worthwhile cause some prayerful thought. We'd be happy to provide you with more information. God bless you and may God continue to bless Red Hill Lutheran Church and School.

Regarding Congregational Care

As Stephanie outlined in her article about Congregational Care, the spiritual, emotional and physical care of our congregation will continue to be one of our highest priorities here at Red Hill Lutheran Church and School.

In times of crisis, grief, transition, and confusion, we believe and trust that God is with us and will never abandon us. I, our staff, and volunteers are available to offer appropriate care, prayer and support for you through the difficult and painful times we all will face.



At the heart of Pastoral Care is Jesus Christ—as the source of comfort, healing, forgiveness, and hope. Pastoral Care is not primarily

about solving problems but about proclaiming Christ in the midst of suffering, doubt, or sin. I encourage you to set up an appointment with our church office when:

- You are anticipating or have experienced the death of someone near to you.
- You or someone in your family is sick, hospitalized, and/or will be having surgery (Hospital/home visitations).
- A child is born. We can visit in order to welcome and bless this new life and gift from God!
- You are struggling with a significant decision about health care and faith.
- You lose a job, home, important relationship, and/or are facing a significant transition in your life.
- You are deeply questioning your faith.



In addition, we also have referrals to competent, Christian Counselors and other resources for longerterm counseling or spiritual direction needs.



What is our Deacon Ministry Team?

At Red Hill, we desire to be a church that expresses mercy and care for others—inside and outside our church. While every Christian is considered a priest (1 Peter 2.9) and is expected to offer mercy to their neighbor, historically the church has called, trained, and set-

aside, certain leaders who have spiritual gifts of mercy. In the New Testament, these leaders were known as *Deacons*, taken from the Greek word, *diakonos*, which means "servant." These servants, or *Deacons*, were charged with caring for the needs of the local church through acts of mercy and kindness.

At Red Hill, the responsibilities of the Deacon Team are:

- Visitation of our members who are hospitalized and/or homebound; Bringing Holy Communion to those who are unable to attend weekly Worship at Red Hill.
- Anointing with Holy Oil and praying with and for those who are in need of prayer for any reason.
- Sitting with someone and talking about life issues and challenges such as losing a job, a difficult relationship, or significant changes in one's life.
- With staff assistance and church resources, helping church members with possible financial needs and concerns.

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If you would like to serve as a Deacon, you are invited to contact Stephanie McArthur or Pastor Seth to discuss the next steps in this process, and to be a part of our Deacon Training class.

Lastly, I want to encourage you to share your prayer requests with us. We have a true desire to know what is happening in your life, and how we can come alongside you in prayer and praise. Here are ways can request prayer, and how we are here to support you as a church family.

- worship "Connection Cards." (In the sanctuary and online) On the "Connection Card" there is a place to request prayers. You have the options of having your prayer requests included in the Sunday Worship Bulletin and/or forwarded to our Cordon of Prayer or restricted to confidential pastoral prayer only.
- Cordon of Prayer. This "prayer chain" has been an instrument of intercessory petitions at Red Hill for 47 years! Current members receive prayer requests via email, praying daily for those in need. Prayer requests for the Cordon of Prayer can be given to the church office by contacting Donna Kunz, Executive Assistant to the Senior Pastor at 714.544.3131 ext.100 or dkunz@redhillchurch.org, who will then forward the requests to the Cordon.

Please note that all prayer groups abide by rules of confidentiality.

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Wholehearted: Loving God with All We Are

This year, our theme at Red Hill Lutheran School is **Wholehearted**—a simple word with a big challenge: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength." Mark 12:30

During our back-to-school week, teachers and staff came together not just to prepare classrooms, but to prepare our hearts for the year ahead. Here's a glimpse of how our days reflected each part of this verse:

We then gathered in worship, led by Pastor Seth, dedicating the school year to the Lord. The morning continued with grade-level partner meetings, where teachers encouraged one another and planned for their students. In the afternoon, our faculty session—A Wholehearted Year Ahead—set the foundation for the year. We focused on aligning our mission, ministry, and mindsets, discussed updates on accreditation, and revisited the Habits of Mind that will shape our instruction. This day reminded us that the heart of RHLS is not just in what we teach, but in the love we pour into our students and community.

★ Soul – On Tuesday, we turned our focus to the soul of teaching—discipleship. The morning session, *The Habits of a Wholehearted Disciple*, was led by different members of our leadership team. Each

one shared practical ways that the 16 Habits of Mind connect to spiritual growth and faith-filled living. We discussed what it means to be teachers who don't just teach subjects, but who shepherd students toward Christ. The conversations were uplifting, reminding us that our own walk with the Lord shapes how we guide children daily. After enjoying lunch together, we shifted to important safety

and medical training to ensure we are ready for any emergency. The day ended with classroom preparation time—where teachers put their souls into creating warm, welcoming spaces that reflect God's love.

We explored Universal Design for Learning! We explored Universal Design for Learning (UDL) alongside an overview of MTSS (Multi-Tiered Systems of Support), both designed to help every child flourish. These tools equip our teachers to meet the needs of all learners—stretching minds, encouraging growth, and ensuring no student is overlooked. The afternoon was spent in Atlas curriculum mapping, aligning lessons with excellence and creativity.

Strength – On Thursday, we rolled up our sleeves for safety training with Safe Kids, Inc., ensuring we are equipped to protect and care for our students. We also poured our energy into classrooms—arranging desks, organizing supplies, and preparing spaces where children can learn and grow.

Why do we give our *heart, soul, mind, and strength* so fully? Because we know our work is for the Lord. As Colossians 3:23 reminds us: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord."

Now, we look forward to sharing this *Wholehearted* theme with our students and families. Together, may we learn what it truly means to love God with everything we are—heart, soul, mind, and strength.



Church Membership: We Are the Body of Christ!

Why do we encourage church membership at Red Hill? Church membership properly understood reflects commitment beyond ourselves. Church membership is not an opportunity to say, "I'm a part of a club," or now "I am due religious goods and services," rather, membership is a scriptural expression of *covenant*; a personal commitment to a particular community in order to grow in faith and serve our Lord and His people. Additionally, we believe in church membership because:

Membership Reflects What the Church Is.

One of the primary metaphors of the church in Scripture is the human "body." Just as a body cannot afford one of its "members" saying, "I don't need this body," or "I'm not important in this body, neither can Jesus' "body." Again, quoting Stetter, he believes that "too many churches or Christian gatherings look like piles of dismembered body parts, not a body knit together as God's agent, his body, his kingdom, at work in the world. To reject the value of membership is to deny what God has already established in fact."

Membership is Biblical

The Scriptures speak a great deal about our need for spiritual authority (See *Hebrews 13:7, 13:17, 1 Thessalonians 5:10-12*). Unlike our culture that questions any type of authority, and views such authority as limiting our "freedom," the New Testament sees true, Biblical authority as a primary means *for our freedom*.

The letters of Paul particularly, considered a believer's incorporation into a local church community as indispensable to spiritual maturing and discipleship. In fact, removing a person from "membership" in a local church family was Paul's ultimate means of church discipline.

God has created us in such a way that we need the guidance and stability that only a larger community and the spiritual authority of leadership within a local church can provide. This leads us to a third consideration:

Membership Serves as an Anchor of Stability

Being part of a church family and community will help you to remain faithful when bad times, fatigue, and disappointments come your way. When you are a part of a church family, you are known, loved, cared for and prayed for! And, you offer the same care and prayer for others! The issue of stability; not jumping from one church to another, is a critical discipleship issue. The church needs you; you need the church.

The Reformation

Sunday, October 26th is Reformation Sunday, celebrating the Day of Reformation that occurred on October 31st,. The Lutheran Reformation, and subsequently, Lutheran theology, was founded upon the Bible as God's Word and our highest authority for Christian thinking and living. How did it all begin?

In the little town of Wittenberg, Germany, on October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, an Augustinian Monk, nailed a document to the village church door, challenging the church's leadership to debate some theological principles. Later referred to as Luther's, "Ninety-Five Theses," Luther desired that his church address some issues of theology and Biblical truth, particularly, the church's sale of indulgences, which were guarantees of escaping purgatory. No one may have noticed then, but within the week, copies of his theses would be discussed throughout the surrounding regions; and within a decade, Europe itself would be shaken by his simple act. However, was it Luther's intention to shake up the world and the church? Just what did Luther think he was doing at the time? To answer these questions, we need to understand a little about Luther's own spiritual journey.

As a young man in Germany at the beginning of the sixteenth century, Luther was studying law at the university. One day he was caught in a storm and was almost killed by lightening. He cried out to St. Anne and promised God he would become a monk. In 1505, Luther entered the Augustinian monastery, and in 1507 became a priest. His monastic leaders sent him to Rome in 1510, but Luther was disenchanted with the ritualism and dead faith he found in the papal city. There was nothing in Rome to mend his despairing spirit or settle his restless soul. Consequently, he felt alienated from God, and could not seem to find an answer that would address his "anfechtung;" a German word for an inner anxiety and feeling of hopelessness.

Hoping both to ese his spiritual anxieties, as well as to utilized his evident intelligence, Luther's superiors sent him to teach theology at the University of Wittenberg. In 1515, he began teaching Paul's epistle to the Romans. Slowly, Paul's words in Romans began to break through the gloom of Luther's soul. Luther wrote

My situation was that, although an impeccable monk, I stood before God as a sinner troubled in conscience, and I had no confidence that my merit would assuage him. Night and day I pondered until I saw the connection between the justice of God and the statement "the just shall live by faith." Then I grasped that the justice of God is that righteousness by which through grace and sheer mercy God justifies us through faith. Thereupon I felt myself to be reborn and to have gone through open doors into paradise. The whole of Scripture took on a new meaning...This passage of Paul became to me a gate to heaven.

The more Luther's eyes were opened by his study of Romans, the more he saw the corruption of the church in his day. The glorious truth of justification by faith alone had become obscured by greed, corruption, and false teaching. However, as the church sought greater and greater reform, the truth of the Gospel, that human salvation based on God's grace alone through Christ alone, received through faith alone, became the doctrine upon which the orthodox, Protestant church now stands!

What began as a humble desire to debate theological concerns, became a world-wide movement that reflected the power of God's Word. As Luther himself responded to the leaders of the church in his time, when told to recant his writings and teachings, Luther replied:

Unless I am convinced by the testimony of the Scriptures or by clear reason (for I do not trust either in the Pope or in councils alone, since it is well known that they have often erred and contradicted themselves), I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience. Here I stand. I cannot do otherwise. May God help me. Amen.

May the church today continue to stand upon the Word of God!

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

Honoring Our Heroes: The Meaning and History of Veterans Day

Each year on November 11, communities across the United States pause to honor the men and women who have served in our nation's armed forces. Veterans Day is more than just a date on the calendar—it is a day of gratitude, reflection, and recognition for the sacrifices made by those who have answered the call to serve.

What Is Veterans Day?

Veterans Day is a federal holiday set aside to honor all U.S. military veterans—those who served in times of war and peace, whether active duty, retired, or discharged. It is a day to say "thank you" to those who have served and to acknowledge the role they've played in securing the freedoms we often take for granted.

It is important to note that Veterans Day is different from Memorial Day. While Memorial Day (observed in May) honors those who gave their lives in military service, Veterans Day celebrates all veterans, living or deceased, who have served honorably.

The Origins of Veterans Day

The roots of Veterans Day go back to World War I, which officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed in June 1919. However,

the fighting had ceased several months earlier when an armistice went into effect on November 11, 1918, at 11:00 a.m.—"the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month."

In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed

November 11 as Armistice Day, a day to honor the bravery of the American soldiers who served in World War I. In 1938, it became a federal holiday, still known as Armistice Day.

Following the immense sacrifices of American troops in World War II and the Korean War, the U.S. Congress, at the urging of veterans' organizations, amended the holiday in 1954. That year, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed legislation renaming it Veterans Day—broadening its purpose to include all veterans, from every branch and every era of service.

A Time for Gratitude and Prayer

In our church community, Veterans Day is a time to

reflect on the values of service, sacrifice, and faith. Many of our veterans carried their faith with them through difficult deployments and continue to serve others in our congregations today.

Let us take this opportunity to not only thank them for their service, but also to pray for their well-being, for the families of those still serving, and for peace in our world.

friends." — John 15:13 (NIV)


