From the desk of Fr. Peter Patrick:

Spiritual Well-being

I hope you and your families are enjoying the summer. Some of you may have gone on vacation, while others might be staying at home. The most important thing is to be intentional about creating family time. Ultimately, family is the most important thing, even though we sometimes have our own differences, which is okay. No family is perfect. I like revisiting Pope Francis' words: "Perfect families do not exist. This must not discourage us—quite the opposite. Love is something we learn; love is something we live; love grows as it is 'forged' by the concrete situations which each particular family experiences. Love is born and constantly develops amid lights and shadows. Love can flourish in men and women who try not to make conflict the last word, but rather a new opportunity. An opportunity to seek help, an opportunity to question how we need to improve, an opportunity to discover the God who is with us and never abandons us. This is a great legacy that we can give to our children, a perfect lesson: we make mistakes, yes; we have problems, yes. But we know that that is not really what counts. We know that mistakes, problems, and conflicts are opportunities to draw closer to others and to draw closer to God.

No family is perfect, but they are still your family. This means that even though there will be disagreements, arguments, and moments of distance, the love and bond within a family ultimately prevails. As I mentioned, no family is perfect; we argue, we fight, and we even stop talking to each other at times, but in the end, forgiveness, understanding, and acceptance are key to navigating the complexities of family life. A family doesn't need to be perfect; it just needs to be united! Family is family... the love will always be there, and that's the core of its well-being.

Besides biological or blood relatives, we have other families that we choose to belong to. Thank you for choosing Saint Sebastian Church as your family and **home.** For those who have been here for a long time, we appreciate you for being pillars; for those who have recently joined, welcome, and we are happy you are part of the Sebs family. Church is where we come to be spiritually nourished with the Word of God and the Holy Eucharist. Eucharist means thanksgiving and is the source and summit of our faith. On Wednesday, June 23, I had the privilege of flying with Clergy Flight Air Refueling. It was fascinating to see how they refuel fighter jets mid-air. Mid-air refueling, also known as aerial refueling or air-to-air refueling (AAR), is a vital military operation that allows fighter jets

and other aircraft to extend their range and mission duration without needing to land. The tanker aircraft extends a rigid, telescopic boom with control surfaces, located at its rear. A boom operator inside the tanker manages the boom's movement and guides it into a receptacle on the receiving aircraft. Once connected, pressurized fuel is pumped into the fighter jet. It offers a much faster fuel transfer rate compared to the probeand-drogue method. This technique is primarily used by the US Air Force for its fighters and bombers.

As I watched the refueling operation, it reminded me of the Church, with the tanker aircraft representing the Church and us, the Christians, as fighter jets. The tanker refuels the fighter jet, meaning that if the jet doesn't get refilled in midair, it will be forced to land, which could make things worse and possibly lead to it being attacked by the enemy. Remember, it's not the tanker aircraft coming to the fighter jet, but the fighter jet coming to the tanker for refueling. Think about it: as I mentioned earlier, we come to Church to be refilled so we can continue our spiritual journey to face or overcome the challenges in our lives. If we want to stay strong in our faith, we need to attend Sunday liturgies to remain spiritually strong.

If we want a physical transformation of our body, we don't go to the gym just once. The idea that a single visit to the gym can't lead to physical change also applies to one's spiritual journey. Consistent effort, dedication, and a commitment to regular practice are essential for both physical and spiritual growth. Spiritual journey: This involves consistent engagement with spiritual practices, exploring various aspects of spirituality, facing inner challenges, and developing deeper faith, peace, and purpose over time. Together, we can grow strong as a faith community. See you at Mass, and enjoy the rest of the summer. Let this summer count. • Fr. Peter-Patrick


CATHOLIC CLASS!!

ST. CATHERINE'S FOOD PANTRY RECEIVES \$15,000 GRANT!

We are thrilled to announce that the St. Catherine's Food Pantry has received a \$15,000 grant from The Greater Milwaukee Foundation.

What is the food pantry? The pantry is open to the public on the second and fourth Saturdays in St. Catherine's Community Center, from 9 to 11 am. The pantry is completely volunteer-run and has been made possible by donations of food and money from parishioners like you.

Why is this grant a big deal? Over the last 4 years, the total number of food pantry shoppers has almost *doubled* - from 2,864 in 2021 to 5,514 in 2024. This trend has continued in 2025 as well and we are anticipating over 7,000 shoppers from July 2025 to June 2026.

Does this grant mean the food pantry is set and doesn't need any more donations? Alas, no. This generous grant from The Greater Milwaukee Foundation (Wisconsin's largest community foundation and among the first established in the world) is intended to supplement donations from parishioners to meet the growing need. Only with continued parishioner donations of food and money will we have enough bread, meat, and shelf-stable foods to feed the hungry among us.




ST. SEBASTIAN ARCHIVE MINISTRY

THE ALTAR

Excerpts from St. Sebastian Chronicle | August 1927

On entering a Catholic Church the first thing that strikes the eye is the Altar. The altar stands forth prominently as the necessary emblem of the religious rite, because upon it sacrifice is offered.

The altar is made of a single slab of stone, joined by cement to the supports, so that the table and support make one piece. On the table of the consecrated altar five Greek crosses are engraved, one at each of the four corners, and one in the center. In the middle of the altar is cut a 'cavity,' in which are placed the relics of two canonized martyrs, and to these is sometimes added, when possible, a relic of the saint in whose honor the church is dedicated. This enclosed 'cavity' where the relics repose, is the spot kissed so frequently by the priest during the celebration of the sacred mysteries. In addition, over the main altar in the church, is erected a canopy or baldachino as a protection to the tabernacle itself.

The steps leading up to the altar have no particular liturgical meaning. According to a pious belief they typify the mount of Calvary, up which our Lord walked to His death. They may be made of wood or marble.

The symbol of the vine and leaf is repeated all over the Altar. Look closely and notice they are continuous leaves in bud to burst into bloom. The vine and leaf symbolism is found in all Gothic Cathedrals; the leaves usually climb over the arches. At the top of the Altar is the vine and clusters of grapes, the oak leaf and the acorn. The acorn is the symbol of rebirth.

Notice the medallions on the side of the Altars. They are little squares and triangles. In the middle of these are little circles and radiating from the circle are three or four vine leaves. The symbols of the Seven Sacraments in mosaic are found on little shields along the panels of the Altar. Above each is a medallion leaf motif.

The symbols (left to right), the Baptism font representing Baptism, - the keys, Sacrament of Reconciliation (Penance), the descent of the Holy Spirit in Confirmation. Then a Ciborium to represent the Eucharist and continue to the right of the clasped hands of Matrimony. The stole of Holy Orders and Oil Stock symbolizing the Anointing.

The leaf motif is carried through the windows with the lily or Fleur-de-lis in many places as a symbol of Purity, Baptism and Resurrection.



SPIRITUAL DIRECTION AT ST. SEBASTIAN

As Catholics, we believe that God is present and active within our lives and yet, it's all too easy to miss. Spiritual direction offers an opportunity for you to intentionally slow down and notice that which reveals itself as Sacred within the concrete particulars of your days. In this paying attention, you can begin to savor and clarify your awareness of the way in which the Spirit is moving within you and within your world and thus deepen your relationship with the Divine Mystery.

Spiritual direction is also a place in which you can consider how your upbringing, your faith tradition, the joys and sorrows of your personal history, and your present-day reality connect you to the Sacred. It can be a place where you can navigate transitions, grieve, and discern. It's a place where you can question and engage and discover. As a monthly spiritual practice, spiritual direction seeks to illuminate and enliven this relationship between you and All That Is, thus distinguishing it from counseling, therapy or life coaching.

A spiritual director offers the experience of "holy listening" in that it takes you where you are at. Grace, healing, and growth are sought through these times of active listening, reflection, and prayer during the session and in the days that follow. Consider this an invitation to explore this as a spiritual practice for yourself.

The "Spiritual Reflection Room," on the second floor of the Parish House, hosts spiritual directors trained in various lineages (Jesuit, Franciscan, and Dominican, for example) to meet with individuals desiring to explore their own unique sacred journeys. These one-on-one sessions are generally scheduled once a month and last for about an hour. Compensation, intake information, and meeting times are negotiated individually between you and your chosen spiritual director.

The following parishioners are trained guides who offer spiritual direction here at the Saint Sebastian Parish House. Please contact via email to explore the opportunity to work together.

The Human Concerns Committee is focusing on the CST (Catholic Social Teaching) **Call to Family, Community, and Participation** this new parish year.

How we organize our society - in economics and politics, in law and policy - directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. Marriage and the family are central social institutions that must be supported and strengthened. We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.

Nor can they fully know themselves apart from an encounter with other persons: 'I communicate effectively with myself only insofar as I communicate with others.' No one can experience the true beauty of life without relating to others, without having real faces to love. This is part of the mystery of authentic human existence."
