From the desk of Fr. Peter Patrick:

Love for Life

When I celebrate children's baptisms, the first thing I do is thank the parents for saying yes to life and appreciating the step they have taken in their journey. Also, when I celebrate school Masses, I end by calling all those who are celebrating birthdays that week. This is the prayer I say: "Thank you, Lord, for the gift of life and mostly for our sisters and brothers who are celebrating their birthdays this week. Thank you to their parents for saying yes to life. Bless our sisters and brothers as they begin this new year in their lives. Let it become a blessing for them and a blessing to all they encounter." Amen. Life is a gift from God, and so precious that it should be protected at all stages, from the moment of conception to natural death.

In the Catholic Church, October is known as Respect Life Month, but I prefer to refer to it as Love for Life. Once, a Moral Theology professor said something that made sense: if we love life, then we will protect it. Sometimes, you may wonder why there are different groups within the Church advocating for various causes. To me, it's because they have been forgotten, and we are being reminded of them. Respect Life Month doesn't only advocate for the unborn, but for all lives, from the moment of conception to natural death. We also have other groups that advocate for social justice issues, which they feel have been overlooked.

Last month, we held the Fall priests and parish directors' day, with the topic being Respect Life issues. The director, Deacon Jim Matthias, touched on all stages of life. He emphasized the importance of protecting the unborn and supporting young mothers in their struggles. Toward the end, he discussed the new ministry for individuals transitioning out of jail and how to help them cope with life outside prison.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Corrections, approximately three out of every 10 men released from a state prison will be rearrested for a new criminal conviction within three years. One group is hoping to reduce recidivism by giving the formerly incarcerated a place to thrive. Here in Milwaukee, we are blessed to have Joseph's House in the Halyard Park neighborhood. At its open house in March, Milwaukee's archbishop blessed the structure and endorsed its mission. "We're supposed to be about new beginnings and new opportunities and opening a new chapter and moving beyond the past," Archbishop Jeffrey Grob said. "We have to make those tangible."

This house provides men leaving prison with a place to live, study, and recover. "This is not a flophouse," said Rev. Zach Presutti, the founder of the concept. "This is not a city shelter. This is a home." Presutti opened the first two "Thrive for Life" homes in New York City, where he's based. When he decided to open a house outside New York, he chose Milwaukee. We appreciate Rev. Presutti's effort. Everyone deserves a second chance. If you know someone coming out of prison who needs a place to stay, direct him to Joseph's House, across from St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Milwaukee.

As we continue to discuss life issues, last month, the week of September 22-28, was dedicated to celebrating National Migration

Let us all love life in all its stages.





RESPECT LIFE MONTH STATEMENT

October 2025

Most Reverend Daniel E. Thomas Chairman, USCCB Committee on Pro-Life Activities

With great joy we celebrate October as Respect Life Month amid the Church's Jubilee Year of Hope. This Jubilee Year "offers us the opportunity to appreciate anew, and with immense gratitude, the gift of the new life that we have received in Baptism, a life capable of transfiguring death's drama."1 The life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ is the foundation of our hope. Through Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious. Yet, the daily headlines remind us of how desperately our world is thirsting for the hope that only God can provide. Every day we witness the overwhelming disregard for human life: through rising rates of abortion and assisted suicide; the killing of innocent school children, even at prayer; the mistreatment of our immigrant sisters and brothers as they endure an environment of aggression; and political and ideological violence inflicted against unsuspecting victims. These attacks threaten life precisely when it is most vulnerable and in need of protection. Despite these realities, the gift of human life exists as a sign of hope to our world today, defying the powers of darkness and the culture of death. It is of the utmost importance that we work to ensure that every life, in every stage and circumstance, is protected in law. Earlier this year, history was made when Planned Parenthood and other big abortion businesses were banned from receiving federal Medicaid dollars for one year. I thank Catholics across the country who

have embraced a nationwide call to prayer for the end of all taxpayer funding of abortion centers, and I ask that we continue those prayers throughout the month of October. This Jubilee Year we are challenged to be agents of hope to those whose hearts are burdened by trial, difficulty, or suffering, offering them the hope that comes from Christ Jesus alone. Walking with Moms in Need and Project Rachel Ministry are just two examples of how the Church continuously reaches out with love, compassion, and mercy to those most in need of a message of hope. As we begin Respect Life Month, together we embrace the words of Pope Leo XIV, "How important it is that each and every baptized person feel himself or herself called by God to be a sign of hope in the world today."2 Each of us is called to be a witness to the Gospel of Life, proclaiming in word and deed the innate goodness and dignity of every human person. HELP US BUILD THE ST. SEBASTIAN ARCHIVES AND YOUR FAMILY STORY

In 2019, a dedicated group of volunteers developed the St. Sebastian Archive Team a.k.a. the A-Team, a ministry that gives attention to the who, what, and when of parishioners and alumni alike. The A-Team has categorized and systemized thousands of documents and images into a manageable and accessible format.

It is evident that the stories of parish involvement, like small newspapers of yesteryear, give one a window into the life of family members. Times when young 'n's were busy attending school, passionate parents invested in their child's school community, while others whose children had grown or joined because of the vitality of the parish, dedicated themselves to a lifetime of service to their home parish.

Parish and school resources are rich in filling in the family story gaps, but few parishes are able to develop a system that is secure, yet story filled managed by volunteers. Privacy protections are in place to confirm a researchers' identity, and the archive team, much like librarians, conduct the actual research.

How can you help us build our story?

What parish documentation or pictures can you pass on from your family archives? By dropping off your files, binders, or boxes of related materials, you will help us build our resources.

FROM THE ST. SEBASTIAN ARCHIVES: DO YOU SHOW YOUR MEMBERSHIP CARD AT THE DOOR?

Excerpt from St. Sebastian's Chronicle | April 1928 By Geo J. Franke, Secretary

When the new St. Sebastian's plan was decided upon by the Parish Board of Consultors a year ago, it was done so only after careful study and thorough discussion of all the phases pertaining to the working problems connected with the plan.

The old system of pew rent payments of periodic drives for funds to cover deficits or new building programs, yearly bazaars and picnics, while they affected the desired results, was unsatisfactory and entailed a considerable amount of work for just a few.

The right of each parishioner to his individual sitting assigned to him when he paid his pew rent, was often infringed upon by others, thus causing resentments and excited tempers in a place and at a time when such mental dispositions should have been least thought of. It was an unsatisfactory situation also because too many people never rented a sitting and could not be reached in any other way to contribute toward the financial support of the Congregation.

It was therefore, first, in order to make seats available to everyone in the order of arrival, and secondly, to get the financial support of everyone attending that the membership plan and payment at the door plan and payment at the door substitute, was inaugurated.

In order that we might get everyone in the parish to contribute, an appeal was made during all to take out a membership, either at the nominal fee of \$15.00 for married people, or \$5.00 for single people 17 years of age.









Masonry Restoration East & West Elevations


Earlier in 2025, the Finance Council, Pastoral Council and Pastor approved contracts for the remaining construction work that is being funded by the current LOA capital campaign. Included are a new floor membrane for the bell tower cupola, extending the interior bell tower scaffolding/stairs to reach the cupola and the restoration of the arches, steel lintel beams, coping stones and tuckpointing of the East and West elevations of the church, similar to the recent work on the south elevation. Work has commenced on the east elevation and the southern portion of the west elevation. Work will pause for the winter months and finish in 2026. Upon completion of this phase, the entire exterior masonry of the main church building will have been inspected, tuckpointed, rebuilt where necessary and cleaned. This restoration represents a significant investment in the longevity of this magnificent structure. Landscape restoration will take place upon completion of the exterior masonry work in 2026. The extension of the interior bell tower scaffolding to reach the cupola was recently completed.

SPIRITUAL DIRECTION AT ST. SEBASTIAN

As Catholics, we believe that God is present and active within our lives and yet, it's all too easy to miss. Spiritual direction offers an opportunity for you to intentionally slow down and notice that which reveals itself as Sacred within the concrete particulars of your days. In this paying attention, you can begin to savor and clarify your awareness of the way in which the Spirit is moving within you and within your world and thus deepen your relationship with the Divine Mystery.

Spiritual direction is also a place in which you can consider how your upbringing, your faith tradition, the joys and sorrows of your personal history, and your present-day reality connect you to the Sacred. It can be a place where you can navigate transitions, grieve, and discern. It's a place where you can question and engage and discover. As a monthly spiritual practice, spiritual direction seeks to illuminate and enliven this relationship between you and All That Is, thus distinguishing it from counseling, therapy or life coaching.

A spiritual director offers the experience of "holy listening" in that it takes you where you are at. Grace, healing, and growth are sought through these times of active listening, reflection, and prayer during the session and in the days that follow. Consider this an invitation to explore this as a spiritual practice for yourself.

The "Spiritual Reflection Room," on the second floor of the Parish House, hosts spiritual directors trained in various lineages (Jesuit, Franciscan, and Dominican, for example) to meet with individuals desiring to explore their own unique sacred journeys. These one-on-one sessions are generally scheduled once a month and last for about an hour. Compensation, intake information, and meeting times are negotiated individually between you and your chosen spiritual director.

HIGHLIGHTING OUR CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING: CALL TO FAMILY, COMMUNITY, AND PARTICIPATION

Each year, our Human Concerns Committee selects one principle of Catholic Social Teaching to highlight. This year, we turn to **Family, Community, and Participation**.

The Church reminds us that every human person is both sacred and social. God created us to live in relationship with one another. At the heart of society is the family, rooted in the lifelong marriage of one man and one woman. When marriages are strong and families are supported, communities flourish and the dignity of each person is upheld.

This principle also calls us to recognize the duty each of us has to work for the common good. Every person should be able to participate fully in social, economic, and political life—especially the poor and vulnerable.

Much of the information we share here comes from the **Wisconsin Catholic Conference (WCC)**, the public policy voice of Wisconsin's Catholic bishops. From the time of the Apostles, the Church has sought to relate the Gospel to the conditions of each age. Inspired by Jesus' call to serve the hungry, welcome the stranger, and care for the sick and vulnerable (cf. Mt 25), the bishops urge lawmakers to shape policies that strengthen families and protect human dignity.


Some key areas the WCC highlights include:

- **Encourage and strengthen marriage.** Lifelong marriage is essential to the stability and prosperity of families and society.
- **Respect and promote family life.** Families need the flexibility and resources to care for their children, especially in times of illness, loss, or transition.
- **Protect children.** Every child deserves safety, dignity, and love. We must safeguard them from abuse, neglect, poverty, and anything that harms their natural growth.
- **Support adoption and foster care.** When families cannot remain together, children deserve supportive, loving homes and the care needed to thrive.
- **Uphold parental rights in education**. Parents are the first teachers of their children and should have the freedom to choose the educational path best suited to their family.
- **Promote strong schools and responsible formation.** Education—academic, moral, and spiritual—prepares children for full participation in society.
- Accompany veterans and farmers. Families who serve our nation and those who sustain our rural communities deserve ongoing support and respect.

As a parish, we will reflect on this principle throughout the year and look for ways to put it into practice. Together, let us commit ourselves to building a community where families are strengthened, children are cherished, and all people are able to participate in the life we share.

Sacramental Preparation

The preparation for Reconciliation and Eucharist (often called First Communion) is family-centered and shared between St. Catherine and St. Sebastian parishes. We invite children who have completed at least one year of Faith Formation, either through our parish schools or faith formation programs, to begin the formal process of preparing for Reconciliation and then Eucharist.

The sacramental process has three major elements:

- 1. Lessons and example learned at home within the family,
- 2. Activities and lessons shared with other families preparing to celebrate the sacraments, and
- 3. **Formal lessons** related to the sacraments which are part of the parish or school faith formation programs.

Family involvement is integral to sacramental preparation. Parents and families have an essential part in the preparation of children for sacraments:

- They make regular participation in parish liturgy and sacraments part of their family life.
- They model faith and religious practice for their children.
- They assist in the activities and lessons related to sacraments.
- They help determine whether their child is ready to participate fully in the sacramental life of the Church.

First Reconciliation Preparation – Fall 2025

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is ablessing and gift of God's peace. As sons and daughters of a loving God, we are all invited to celebrate the healing grace that is offered through this sacrament.

Reconciliation is a powerful example of God's presence in our lives. Jesus taught us through parables such as the Good Shepherd and the Prodigal Son that God longs for our presence and is always waiting for and welcoming us when we lose sight of God's way.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation grows out of the act of communal reconciliation we practice each Sunday at Mass. In this sacrament we come to God with the knowledge that we sin, that our sin hurts our community and ourselves, and that God is anxious to forgive and heal any broken bonds. Our emphasis on the family's role in reconciliation grows out of the reality that it is within the home that most of us learn to love, to forgive, and to be forgiven.



First Eucharist Preparation – Spring 2026

The celebration of Eucharist is at the heart of who we are and what we believe as Catholics. Eucharist teaches us who we are and what we should become. The process through which our children come to the Table and partake in the Body and Blood of Christ is both a parish and family celebration. This "food for the journey" unites us in many ways with Christ and those who share our faith.



The Sacrament of Eucharist is an intimate communion with Christ and with those who share our table. It is also a sign for us that we are all servants to one another.

Children who celebrate this sacrament are most often in 2nd grade and are at least seven years old. The parish communities of St. Catherine and St. Sebastian invite children who have completed at least one year of faith formation, either in the parish schools or a faith formation program, and who have celebrated Reconciliation, to begin preparation for First Eucharist. It is the policy of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee that children preparing for First Eucharist must first prepare for and celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Registration for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist

Families who wish to have their children celebrate Reconciliation and Eucharist are asked to follow these steps:

- Complete the Reconciliation and Eucharist registration.
 - ★ Sunday Faith Formation & Sacramental Preparation (click HERE to register) **OR**
 - ★ Sacramental Preparation only (click HERE to register), if attending a parish day school
 - ★ If your child was baptized at St. Sebastian or St. Catherine, we can verify it internally.
 - ★ If your child was baptized at any other parish, please attach a copy of the Baptismal Certificate in the registration form or send a scanned copy via email.
 - ★ If you need assistance with registration, please contact Patrick Schley at <u>pschley@saintsebs.org</u> or 414.453.1061 x149.
 - ★ N.B.: There is no cost to receive any of the Sacraments. The parishes do ask that families cover the fees for materials, administrative costs, etc. We do not keep children from Faith Formation due to financial needs. If you have a financial concern, please contact Joe Sheehan (jsheehan@saintsebs.org) about options and scholarships.
- Participate in Sunday Mass regularly as a family.
- Participate in faith formation in either our parish Catholic schools or a faith formation program.
- Attend the two orientation sessions (Fall and Spring), at which all materials will be distributed.
- As a family, work through the sacramental preparation book and complete the review pages.
- Attend the Parent/Guardian & Child programs together.
