

1. A Message from the Priest's Heart: Walking Together in Faith

Dear all,

Loving Greetings!

One of the most well-known stories in the Bible is the parable of the Good Samaritan. The Samaritan is often celebrated, which is why the story is so widely recognized. Consequently, we tend to read, introspect, and reflect on this story primarily from the Samaritan's perspective. However, what if we shifted our focus and re-examined the story through the eyes of the wounded man? This alternative viewpoint could offer a powerful lens for understanding the Good Samaritan parable (Luke 10:25-37), especially in light of the increasing violence and war-related deaths in the world today. By imagining ourselves as the wounded victim in this parable, particularly against the backdrop of war and human suffering, we are likely to gain valuable insights and lessons.

As we read the story, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked..." we observe that the victim was simply traveling. In modern wars, civilians, children, and the vulnerable are often the ones who suffer the most. This story reminds us that being caught in violence is often not a choice, and it helps us cultivate compassion for war victims, refugees, and those who lack protection. The narrative continues with, "A priest... and a Levite... passed by on the other side." Imagine the wounded man, possibly conscious, witnessing people who should help walking away. This teaches us how deeply painful neglect and abandonment can besometimes even worse than the original wound. However, there is a twist in the story when the Samaritan enters the scene: "But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was..." From the victim's perspective, help came from the least expected source-someone from a hated or distrusted group. Today, peace and healing often come from unlikely peacemakers-activists, NGOs, or even ordinary people from "enemy" sides.

In a world where war dehumanizes individuals, this story reaffirms a fundamental truth:

every human life deserves dignity and care. The victim would have felt acknowledged, valued, and restored—something every war-torn soul yearns for. From the victim's perspective, the Samaritan didn't merely help-he took responsibility for the victim's recovery, even involving others (the innkeeper). War victims require more than temporary relief; they need sustained support, justice, and advocates speaking on their behalf. If you've been wounded, this story reminds you: you matter. And if you're observing from a distance, it calls you to move toward the pain, not shy away from it. In today's world, the "road to Jericho" traverses Gaza, Ukraine, Iran, India, Israel, Sudan, Myanmar, and even unsafe urban streets. The question is no longer just, "Who is my neighbour?" but perhaps: "Who will stop and see me, broken by the roadside?" And ultimately: "Will I be that neighbour for someone else's pain?"

Unfortunately, the church's silence or inaction in the face of violence against innocent people whether in war, conflict zones, or systemic injustice—presents significant theological, moral, and missional challenges. Victims of violence may cease to look to the church for hope or assistance. When the church remains silent during times of trauma, it appears distant, detached, or irrelevant. Jesus reached out to the marginalized, the wounded, and the oppressed—not to the halls of power to remain silent.

Yet another pressing question that emerges from this story is, "Will the church personify the roles of the priest and the Levite—or will it be the Good Samaritan?" For, silence in the face of violence against innocent people—whether in Palestine, Ukraine, Congo, Indigenous communities, or elsewhere—is not merely a moral failure, but a profound spiritual crisis. Jesus did not bypass suffering—He approached it, touched it, and redeemed it. His church must do the same. With love and prayers, Stephan

Knit a Square for Charity

"May the work of your hands bring joy to your soul." (Anon) Our group of knitters, crocheters, embroiderers and convivial friends meet every second Tuesday for a time of shared companionship, food and handicraft 9.00am - 12.00md. We also have some wonderful people who are unable to attend our gatherings but knit at home, sending in squares, strips of squares and completed rugs of their own creation. With winter approaching, we try to send as many rugs for distribution to people in need as we can make, as well as beanies and scarves, primarily supporting St John's Crisis Centre in Southport. So, we are putting out a call for help. And everyone is welcome. If you would like to help in this ministry, all you need is a set of 4mm needles or crochet

hook and some 8-ply yarn which we can supply. Cast on 42 – 46 stitches (depending on how tight your stitches are) and work as many rows in plain, stocking stitch or other to create a square in your chosen colour, then continue with a new colour or end off.

As a guide, squares should be approximately 20 x 20 cms.

We have a group member who will join squares or strips and edge the rug so made. If you would like further information, please text Jean on 0409 322 011.

Scrunchies and Hearts

The Holy Rood Craft and Conversation Group has been busy with sewing of late. In response to an urgent request from The Mater Mothers' Hospital in Brisbane, 100 Cuddle Hearts were lovingly made (and sent with a prayer) to give its tiniest patients the best start in life. The Neonatal Critical Care Unit was looking to restock the cupboards with the fabric hearts, which are two heart-shaped pieces of material (soft cotton or flannelette) sewn together. One fabric heart is given to the mother and placed on her chest to pick up her scent, with the other heart placed close to the baby for the same reason. The hearts are then swapped so mother and baby are left with each other's scented heart. The little cuddle hearts help a mother's milk come in when she is apart from her baby, while the scent of the mother also has a calming effect on the baby. The cuddle hearts link mum and baby and fill a gap when the two can't be together.

Our other project was 100 scrunchies for the Christmas boxes. These were made in a variety of colourful fabrics and given with much love to those who have so little.

Gunya Meta Inc is a non-profit Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisation, run by a board of local Logan City community members, employing local Indigenous staff. Gunya Meta's aim is to help Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families and communities to:

- Engage with schools and education providers to improve outcomes for Indigenous children;
- Build strong leadership.
- Target education and health-based programs
- Support community-schools partnerships.

Nungalinya College

Empowering Indigenous Christians Nungalinya is the premier Combined Churches Training College for Indigenous Australians. The College is formally supported by the Anglican, Uniting, and Catholic churches of the Northern Territory, and is situated in Casuarina, a northern suburb of Darwin.

Each year, men and women from over 100 different communities across Australia come to study at Nungalinya College. Our students are from both remote and urban communities, and their different cultural and language backgrounds are respected and included in campus life. Many students hold important positions of authority in their own communities.

At Nungalinya College, Indigenous and non-Indigenous Christians will work together in partnership. We will grow the gifts and calling of Indigenous people. In God's time, the College will be fully staffed by competent Indigenous people. They will have the languages, cultural knowledge, qualifications, and experience needed to perform their roles.

Anglicare Southern Queensland Officially Opens \$2.6 Million Specialist Dementia Care Program Unit in Southport

Anglicare Southern Queensland has officially celebrated the opening and blessing of its new \$2.6 million Specialist Dementia Care Program (SDCP) unit at the Abri Residential Aged Care Home in Southport. The SDCP unit will be delivered through funding from the Commonwealth Department of Health and Aged Care.

The occasion was marked by a morning tea celebration with residents and their families; Anglicare Southern Queensland Chief Executive Officer Sue Cooke; Chair of the Community Services Commission, Tracy Morgan; and, Archbishop Jeremy Greaves. Archbishop Jeremy Greaves officially opened and blessed the unit on Tuesday 27 May.

During the blessing of the unit, Archbishop Greaves said that the unit is an important part of the Church's mission and its service to the community.

"Inspired by the hospitality of Christ, this space will provide a place of care, connection, hospitality and rest," Archbishop Jeremy Greaves said. "We also acknowledge that we are stewards of the resources given to us and are grateful for the grant which has made it possible to build this unit.The care and support provided in this unit plays an integral part in the role of the Anglican Church in assisting people to live with dignity, empowering those we serve and strengthening community life."
