We asked Juli Elliot a question that you may be asking,

"Why Don't We Sing Christmas Carols During Advent?"

Another way to frame this question would be, "Why do we observe the Christian Year at RCRC?" To answer this, I'll rely upon a book I've enjoyed reading recently titled, "The Worship Architect: A Blueprint for Designing Culturally Relevant and Biblically Faithful Services" by Constance M. Cherry. Since its beginning, the Judeo-Christian tradition has been expressed in a recurring rhythm that celebrates how God has intervened in history in general and in the lives of his covenant people in particular. We mark days important to the faith as a way of remembering these many occasions. The Christian year tells the story of God. It relives and celebrates the events of history in which God miraculously intervened- the greatest story being of Jesus. As Jesus's disciples, we are on a journey, a spiritual pilgrimage in which we are transformed by the repeated rhythm of hearing God's story.

Most of us live by our secular calendars to responsibly fulfill our commitments. If we sincerely follow the Christian calendar year through our weekly worship, we will both ensure that Christ remains the focal point and all of the claims of the gospel will be communicated. Christmas is a time for celebrating the birth of Jesus, the incarnation. God's activity and major themes of

Advent include: the annunciation, anticipation of the incarnation, preparation to celebrate the coming of the Savior, the prophetic voice of John the Baptist, the Old Testament prophetic writings, often including the coming judgment as well as a recognition of the three comings of Christ- he has come in the incarnation, he is come in that his presence lives in and among us even now, and



he will come at the end of the age. So, we might miss the substance and message of Advent if we jumped ahead to sing of Christmas even as we know its story holds the hope of the world.
