Your Pastor Is Attending Summer School?

Yes, I am attending summer school! Beginning in June, I will be taking two courses through Calvin Theological Seminary (CTS) as part of the Ecclesiastical Program for Ministerial Candidates (EPMC). The two courses I am taking are CRNCA Church Polity and CRNCA Church History. These courses are completed online over a 10 week period. The coursework involves reading, participating in weekly online discussions, writing papers and completing a final exam. I recently successfully completed my first course at CTS, Reformed Creeds and Confessions, in April. This summer, during the week prior to Labor Day weekend, I will travel to Grand Rapids to meet the director of the EPMC program and complete a psychological assessment process with trained CRC psychologists.

Why?

You may be wondering why I am doing all of this. After all, I have already earned a Masters of Divinity Degree (M.Div.) from an accredited seminary and served as an ordained minister in a Reformed denomination. The reason I am doing this is because the CRCNA is (rightly) concerned about making sure that its ministers are well trained and properly assimilated in the life and culture of the denomination. For those ministers who are trained at CTS, this is a quite easy thing for the denomination to verify, but for outsiders like me there is a proper need to provide a pathway to accomplish a similar end. The EPMC program is the denomination's effort to do that.

How Long?

You may also be wondering how long this will take. Generally, completing the EPMC program takes 24 months. However, it is possible that it can be completed in 18 months. I am trying to complete it in 18 months, but it remains uncertain as to whether this will be possible. The minimum amount of credits I need from CTS is nine credit hours. Assuming I successfully complete the two courses this summer, I

will have six of those nine hours completed. I expect to take a one credit course on using digital tools in the ministry in September and completing the last two credit hours (a course on Reformed Hermeneutics) in the spring of 2019. I will need to make a second trip to CTS to be reviewed and approved by the faculty. Hopefully, the faculty will recommend me to be eligible to receive a call as a Minister of the Word at the Synod of 2019. It is possible that the timing will not all fall into place and that I will have to wait until the Synod of 2020 to complete the process.

A Request for Prayer and Patience

As you can see, this is process involves quite a robust framework with a variety of milestones. I covet your prayers for the completion of this process. My

greatest struggle is with the time I need to allocate to this process. I am quite aware that the time I am spending on this takes me away from other things I would like to be doing in the life of the congregation. It adds significantly to my workload, but its value is not immediately apparent to the congregation. Although I sometimes struggle with this, the process is based on sound principles and is ultimately valuable in that it helps to protect the congregation by making sure I am trained and properly vetted. Another side benefit is that the EPMC program helps to plug me into the CRNCA network and provide for broader exposure to denominational life. In addition to your prayers, I also request your patience. There may be times when I need to focus intensely on this process and it will take me away, albeit briefly, from my common pastoral duties.

The good news is that, while this path is long, I am able to fully serve the congregation as its pastor. As you know, I was examined at the April Classis meeting and approved for ordination to the office of Commissioned Pastor. I was publicly ordained to this office during our May 13, 2018 morning worship service. This office, while a stepping stone to the office of the Minister of the Word, allows me to do everything a pastor can do except take a call to another congregation and participate in the pension plan! I am very grateful that the denomination has created this pathway to ordination in the CRCNA because it made it possible for me to serve as your pastor. That is the most important thing to me and that is why I am going to summer school!

COUNCIL NOTES: MAY 2018

True story: I once had a friend who fasted for forty days. He was a solid believer from a Four-Square background, and was using this as a way to re-center and fight some spiritual battles which had been plaguing him. He was careful of his health, and allowed himself juice and broth.

Started out only slightly north of his correct weight, and we, his friends, got to watch him descend through а healthy weight to something envied only by marathon runners. When he came out of the fast, he had gotten where he needed to be spiritually, but he was physically weak and recovery took time. A church vacancy is a little like that. At the end of our vacancy we were where God wanted us to be, but weak, and rebuilding takes time.

Rebuilding is all about focusing on our vision. The vision which Pastor Anthony has presented to the Council is one of growth, both growth of our church family as well as spiritual growth. We fan the flames of the Spirit by feeding resources to the ministries that are working, and try to identify things which need to be updated.

In May, Council focused on two of our healthy ministries. The first was Worship Committee, chaired by Susan Gilbert-Collins. Our church has a history of careful, thoughtful worship, and much of this is due to the attention paid by the Committee. Worship which coordinates with Pastor Anthony and the rest of the Worship Planning Team. The Worship Committee is responsible for the mechanics of worship, review of services, oversight of music and liturgy, and all the elements which enter into our Sunday morning worship. Among the more delightful changes on the committee has been the addition of Kevin Smith, who represents a younger point of view.

We also met with Pastor Cornelison, who coordinates the vast Fellowship Committee. This committee oversees a broad range of activities, from Wednesday Koinonia nights to fellowship hour to Primetimers. It is truly awe-inspiring to see all they do. The exciting thing on the fellowship horizon is the church picnic, which will be held on church grounds after worship service on Sunday, June 3rd--mark your calendars!

Three other things are worthy of note. First,

Council discussed an invitation to host a K-2 Christian school which is attempting to get off the ground in 2019. We decided that this would weaken our focus, and didn't have sufficient overlap with existing ministries. Second, we continued our discussion of the process for identifying and drawing into service next year's new elders and deacons. Finally, we are actively working on a "safe church" policy. Churches face threats from the outside. Church shootings are very rare, but it pays to have thought about them ahead of time. Churches, and especially children in churches, sometimes face threats from within the church, and we are determined this not happen at RCRC. For this reason, all those who work with children in our church undergo background checks. Council is working on a policy which thoughtfully unites these threads bearing in mind the size and constituents of our congregation.

WHAT ARE THEY UP TO? CHECKING IN WITH OUR YOUNG ADULTS

Note: This article is part of a continuing series of profiles of our post-high school young adults (up through about age 25). For this issue of the newsletter we catch up with Jiaqi Shao and Bethany Cok, who both have June birthdays. Let's remember to pray for all of our young adults in their walk with the Lord and as they think about their plans for the future.



Jiaqi Shao is currently a student at the Eastman School of Music. We're grateful that she is able to fit being our church organist into her very busy and demanding schedule! Jiaqi has just finished her junior year and completed her move out of the dorms and into an apartment, and now has time to take a few deep breaths and savor at least a little relaxation time this summer.

Jiaqi was born and grew up in Shanghai, China, and moved to Rochester a few years ago to start her studies at Eastman. She began learning the piano at the age of four, and then took up studying the organ when she was

13. At the age of 16 she went to an organ festival in Leipzig, Germany, where she attended a master class and recital given by Eastman organ professor David Higgs. Eventually she decided that she'd like to study with him, and now here she is in Rochester, doing just that.

When I asked Jiaqi what she misses about life in Shanghai, she replied instantly, "The food!" and after a few more seconds added, "and the weather." American Chinese food doesn't have quite the same appeal for her, and she's not a great fan of the snow and cold. Still, she knew what she was getting into with the weather at least, since it was blustery and cold with lots of snow on the ground when she first visited Rochester for her Eastman audition. But she decided to brave life in Rochester anyway, and we're glad!

For the next six weeks or so Jiaqi will be practicing for her upcoming recital at the American Guild of Organists national convention in Kansas City in early July. She and six other young organists who were all regional winners in an AGO competition will be presenting recitals at this convention. The rest of the time this summer, she'll be catching up on sleep (a priority for college students during the summer months!), relaxing, practicing, and reading. She says her favorite reading is in history, philosophy, geography, politics, and traditional Chinese literature. She's planning to spend the month of August in Shanghai with her parents.

Jiaqi's birthday is June 23. Be sure to wish her a happy birthday! And pray that God will bless and speak to Jiaqi through our worship services, just as she is a blessing to us through her music.

Bethany Cok graduated from Calvin College in May 2016. Since then she's been living and working in Guatemala, in the city of Quetzaltenango (known more commonly as Xela, pronounced "Shayla"). Her first year there she was part of World Renew's Global Volunteer Program. World Renew is the CRC's relief and development organization. Currently Bethany is on the staff of a new organization called Sonido del Movimiento (SDM), which uses music and dance to support children living in a context of poverty, violence, and family challenges. She continues to do some work for World Renew as well.

Xela is located in Guatemala's

western highlands and sits at an altitude of 7,500 feet. It is surrounded by mountains and volcanoes, including the active Santa Maria volcano, which last erupted in August 2013. Bethany occasionally hikes up volcanoes on free weekends. In the evenings she often goes out for coffee with friends. She also enjoys reading and keeping in touch with friends in the U.S. Bethany is taking violin lessons from a Guatemalan violinist in Xela who studied in a conservatory in Spain with a Russian violin professor.

One of Bethany's favorite things about living where she does is the opportunity to get to know lots of people from very different backgrounds. Whenever she comes back to the U.S. for a visit and takes her first hot shower with good water pressure, though, she wonders briefly why she's living in Guatemala... But then she remembers all that she appreciates about her life in Guatemala and after a brief respite is ready to go back to the work she is called to be doing.

Summer plans for Bethany include attending a close friend's wedding in Manitoba and climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania with her dad and sister.

Bethany's birthday is June 11. Please pray for Bethany in the challenges of her work and her daily life. She is so grateful for the love and support of her church family at RCRC.

SUMMER VACATION

What are your plans for the summer? With Memorial Dav weekend the unofficial start of the summer, the completion of college's spring semester, and secondary schools winding down within the next month, many families will be going on vacation. Our family typically spends one to two weeks camping with our travel trailer. Over favorite camping destination over the last 5 -plus years has been Cape Cod with sandy beaches, tasty seafood, varied recreational activities, and Cape Cod League baseball.

The Deacons noticed that the weekly offering also seems to go on vacation during the summer which months makes sense. If most members contribute each week through the offering basket then fewer members at church during the summer means lower weekly contributions as well. It is important however for steady contributions throughout the year since expenses don't take summer vacations.

Electronic giving allows for consistent weekly contributions throughout the year. At the beginning of the year the Deacon's distributed the offering schedule which also asked each family to prayerfully consider what their firstfruit giving should be in 2018. With electronic giving, either through your financial institution or through the church website, automatic contributions can be scheduled on a weekly basis to help meet that commitment. One benefit of using electronic giving through your financial institution. sometimes referred as online bill pay, over the church web site is that your bank or credit union doesn't typically charge a transaction fee which means your entire contribution is donated to the church. Regardless of which method of electronic giving used, always include your envelope number and the offering cause being contributed to in the memo field. If no offering cause is specified in the memo field then general ministries is assumed.

These days many forms of technological advancements make it easy to exchange funds without cash or checks. Don't worry, the Deacons won't be installing chip card readers at the doors anytime soon and will still be passing the basket down the aisle to collect cash and checks which are always welcome. However, consider electronic giving as a simple means of giving and of fulfilling our stewardship responsibility as a congregation throughout the year.

The Deacons pray that God's hand of safety is on your family wherever you travel this summer. Thank you for faithfully supporting the ministries of RCRC and seeing our budget as investments in God's mission.

ANTICIPATION...



It's that time of year again - the end of the school year? The beginning of summer fun? Yes, all of those things, but also time to start thinking about new elders and deacons for the fall! We get excited with anticipation about a lot of things – a trip we are planning, a night out at a new restaurant, or getting tickets to a theater or sporting event that we are eager to see. But we tend not to have that anticipation for being part of what God is doing in his church! Sure, we might get excited about the Haiti trip, or even good news from Doug and Priscilla about progress on a new translation project – but at RCRC?

I have had the privilege, as a deacon and as a member of the Search committee, of having a front row seat to some pretty amazing things that have been happening at RCRC during the past three years. Council, the Elders in particular, have stepped up in a more active role of leading spiritual growth while we were without a full time pastor – a devotional booklet on prayer, encouragement for involvement in groups, and a focus on being in the Word through regular Bible reading. If you talk with anyone who was on the Search committee you will hear stories of doors being opened and closed as we searched for a pastoral candidate. Throughout the Bible references are made to God's mighty work of salvation and his calling a people to himself - the big picture of the Gospel story. But within that big picture are smaller pictures, pictures intimately connected to the big picture, yet some of these pictures include our own witness to God's grace in action.

Stop by the church any day of the week and you will likely find many people quietly doing the jobs that need to be done to keep RCRC ticking. We cannot function without them! There are other people that our fellowship needs in order to function at peak efficiency, but are less connected. A long term attender who just never got around to joining, but as a consequence is not able to serve on Council. Or people who say, "No", when asked to serve on Council, even though they may have gifts to lead, teach and challenge us in areas where we have grown lazy. Paul makes reference to the need to have all parts of the Body active. We may question the wisdom of taking the next step to membership, or seriously considering whether we might might say, "Yes", when asked to be on Council.

1 Cor 12:21 The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!"

You may be right to say, "No". You may be exactly where the Lord needs you. On the other hand, if you are burying your talent for any number of "perfectly logical" reasons that keep you from investing fully in the Kingdom, please reconsider. CLASSIS SUMMARY AND PRAYER REQUESTS

In the April issue of Church Life, Gary Harris educated us on the organizational structure of the CRC. and that we (Rochester CRC) are one of 22 churches in the CANE (Classis Atlantic North East). On April 18 and 19, Pastor Anthony, Pastor Tineke, David Dill, and myself attended the CANE meeting in Pittsfield, MA. Have you ever wondered what goes on at these meetings? Read on . . .

Once we arrived at the Lakeside Retreat Center, we found our rooms, had dinner together in the dining hall, and began meeting one another. Once we returned to the meeting room, it was time for a welcome, worship, prayer, and business. We heard various reports that would be typical of a business meeting. Highlights you may be interested in knowing follow. The Classis Interim Team (CIT) reported on the election of delegates to Synod 2018 in June. Our own, Neil van Barneveldt, will be attending as one of four from CANE. The Church Renewal Team (CRT) informed Classis of some changes to church counselors for RCRC and Trinity CRC (Richfield Springs), as Pastor Nick Monsma (East Palmyra CRC) has accepted a call in California. Our new church counselor is Pastor Kurt Monroe from Valley CRC in Binghamton. The evening session was concluded with worship and prayer. A time of fellowship was shared before retiring for the night.

Thursday began with the surprise of snow on the ground! Good thing I wore appropriate shoes/ boots! The retreat center is located on a pretty lake (see picture)! Thankfully, the mid-April snow melted by lunch time! Off to breakfast we went before beginning the days' meeting, which encompassed why we, from RCRC, were so eager to be there! It was the day of Pastor Anthony's examination! We

were responsible for the sermon evaluations. Pastor Anthony was examined here at RCRC on February 11. Did you know there were such visitors at our service that day? The next part of the exam was conducted concurrently with both candidates. They were asked to share their spiritual background and journey. The exam consisted of knowledge of church standards, Church Order, practical matters, Scripture, and Reformed doctrine. They were questioned about their sense of call, appreciation of Christian Reformed polity, love for the Church and their congregations,

In my conversation with him after the meeting, he said they would welcome prayers from our congregation.
- Justin Ruddy (the other examinee) gave an update of the church plant in East Boston, MA. The church will be called Resurrection Christian Reformed Church. They hope it will be a multiethnic, English-speaking church, and will begin holding public worship by Fall 2019. Justin and his wife, Sarah, ask us to join them in prayer during this time of beginning. They ask for a close relationship

with God and that God may make himself known to this church; for faith, trust, courage, friendship, reconciliation, tact, tenacity, prudence, energy, partners, co-dreamers, and co-laborers as they move forward with this work.

- James Kim of the Syracuse Grace church plant sent a written report and we were asked to pray for James and his family, as they have gone through a very difficult time recently.
- Joe and Karisa Paravisini gave an update of their church plant, The Neighborhood, in Providence, RI.
