

## BIBLE TEXT | PROVERBS 23:1-21

- When you sit down to eat with a ruler, observe carefully what is before you,
- and put a knife to your throat if you are given to appetite.
- Do not desire his delicacies, for they are deceptive food.
- Do not toil to acquire wealth; be discerning enough to desist.
- When your eyes light on it, it is gone, for suddenly it sprouts wings, flying like an eagle toward heaven.
- Do not eat the bread of a man who is stingy; do not desire his delicacies,
- for he is like one who is inwardly calculating. "Eat and drink!" he says to you, but his heart is not with you.
- You will vomit up the morsels that you have eaten, and waste your pleasant words.
- Do not speak in the hearing of a fool, for he will despise the good sense of your words.
- Do not move an ancient landmark or enter the fields of the fatherless,

- for their Redeemer is strong; he will plead their cause against you.
- Apply your heart to instruction and your ear to words of knowledge.
- Do not withhold discipline from a child; if you strike him with a rod, he will not die.
- If you strike him with the rod, you will save his soul from Sheol.
- My son, if your heart is wise, my heart too will be glad.
- My inmost being will exult when your lips speak what is right.
- Let not your heart envy sinners, but continue in the fear of the Lord all the day.
- Surely there is a future, and your hope will not be cut off.
- Hear, my son, and be wise, and direct your heart in the way.
- Be not among drunkards or among gluttonous eaters of meat,
- for the drunkard and the glutton will come to poverty, and slumber will clothe them with rags.





## **DEVOTIONAL FOR PROVERBS 23:1-21**

Growing up in both Spanish cultures and English cultures, I have had the cool privilege to hear a lot of sayings. From the English side I have heard: "The two things that are for sure in life are death and taxes." Maybe you've heard: "Many hands make light work." There are also a lot of sayings that are almost word for word in both cultures. "Curiosity killed the cat," "we are on the same page," etc. On the Spanish side, there are afew that I've heard, though I haven't heard them in English. One of the ones that was shared with me as a kid that I'll never forget and will share with my kiddos as well is: "If you don't see a donkey, you aren't wanting a ride". In essence, it's not until you see something that you, all of the sudden, have the urge to have it. This is a very popular one to use since kids who don't think about having a lollipop, all of the sudden, feel like they need one due to seeing another kid with one.

A lot of times in my walk with God, these "proverbs", though not necessarily biblical, can be proven to be true day in and day out. They are practical and great to use in life, for the most part. But the Proverbs we get to read through together from God's word, I believe, are very important. I'll share one below that stands out to me more than the other ones in this passage.

As a father, I take verse 13 to heart. A pastor explained that if you discipline your sons with a rod and it hurts them for a bit, it is better to show them now that it's better to hurt for a minute than for eternity. In a way you are showing them that when the rules are broken, there are consequences. Eventually when they mature and their spiritual life begins, they might remember that the consequences they endured as kids will transpire from physical pain to spiritual pain as adults. We see in Hebrews 12:3-11 that pain through discipline for a couple minutes is better than pain for a lifetime, or an eternity.
