visit thee?' ⁴⁰ And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me.'

MEDITATION

This is one of Jesus' last sections of teaching in Matthew's Gospel.

Jesus says how we treat "the least of these"—the most vulnerable in our society--is surely how we treat Jesus himself.

How do we treat those who are hungry and thirsty?

How do we truly welcome the one who is a stranger in our midst?

How do we treat those who are dressed in a way that does not meet our standard—that is, our standard of cleanliness or our standard of appropriateness?

How do we care for those who are infirm, who are differently abled, who may struggle with mental illness?

We have a huge number of people in our country who are incarcerated. Presently, as a congregation, we are not engaged with them. However at presbytery we listened to the testimony of members of Southminister PC who are engaged in supporting the library services at the area prison. They started small, but have increased their involvement there—providing appropriate gift bags for prisoners and seeing that simple items are available to them.

Today we will be supporting Plateau Outreach Ministries food bank with dry soup mix, supplying items for "blessing bags" to be handed out to those on street corners or off-ramps, creating cards that will be used in a variety of ministries, doing some yard work and upkeep around this facility, as well as our singers, along with Pastor Cindy who will be bringing worship and music to three senior/retirement facilities here in town.

These are all worthy activities. What is interesting too is that these are things that nearly anyone can do. It does not require a college degree or any special qualification to share our love of Jesus with those who are hungry, thirsty, or lonely. It requires simple obedience.

Furthermore, when the day of judgement comes and Jesus comments that those who did these things are blessed and welcome, their response is:

When did we see YOU hungry and feed you,

When did we see YOU naked and clothe you, etc.

They responded to people in this way, un-self-conciously. It was their modus opernendi...their way of being in the world...and Jesus rewards them for it...for acting as Jesus himself would act.

And so today and every day I trust we shall be simply obedient to God's word. Nothing more, nothing less.

That is why every day is "faith in action" day!

Let us pray: Lord we commit ourselves to your service each and every day. Thank you for those who have prepared the meal for us, and bless the food that it may energize us to serve you better.
