Of all the symbols and images of Christmas, none is more powerful, beautiful, or beloved than the symbol of light in all its many forms. Every year as the Christmas Eve worship draws to a close, we dim the electric lights and wait in darkness to receive the Light of Christ. The acolyte captures the flame from the Christ candle that was lighted at the Biblical announcement of the Savior's birth. That tiny bit of holy fire is passed from candle to candle, from person to person, in the smallest sweet gesture of a bowed head and a face aglow with joy and wonder. Softly the music begins and we sing the welcoming lullaby to the King of Kings, a vulnerable infant sleeping in a lowly manger in a stable far from home. Soon the entire worship space is filled with the brilliance of CHRIST*mas light, and the music swells with joyous *Glorias* and *Alleluias!*



Heavenly Light fills the space - from star to candle to the people who no longer sit in darkness. Christ is born! Emmanuel is here - *God With Us!*

In the Eastern Orthodox tradition of the Christian Church Mary is greatly revered, and is known as " $T\eta \epsilon o \tau o \kappa o \sigma$ " (Theo*tokos) meaning "God*Bearer" as Mary is the one who bears God into the world by giving birth to the Christ Child. It is her courageous faithfulness and humble readiness to let it be with her according to God's will that is celebrated and given reverence. She is The Light Bringer, the human vessel of the Divine Light. It is our duty and delight that we who have received and celebrated the birth of this Light of the World should now give thanks by continuing to pass it on. We are now the God-Bearers. We have received the most precious gift in all Creation, and we are now the acolytes called to gift more torchbearers with this "Joyous Light of Heavenly Glory." Just as the light from the Christ Candle was passed

from one person to the next on Christmas Eve, so the Light of Christ is to be shared, flowing from that humble manger out into the entire world. THIS is what it means to be *Evangelists* - messengers of the Good News of Christmas! Eventually, inevitably, the carols will be stilled, the candles extinguished, the holiday wrappings will be swept away. But The Light still shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not, cannot, WILL NOT overcome it.
