Here's what we've got planned:


- We've got some new Grow Classes beginning this month (there's still time to sign up for the Bible Study on the book of Hebrews!). We'll also begin a new sermon series on Jesus' love and concern for the poor and marginalized based on the Gospel of Luke.
- We're also preparing for Celebration Sunday on June 1! We'll give thanks to God for a great year of ministry. We'll celebrate our confirmation class and welcome some of our youth as members our our congregation. A few of them may even get baptized! We'll have a BBQ to celebrate and our youth will host BINGO to help raise some additional funds for their mission trip.
- Beginning on June 1st, we'll shift our worship schedule to one service at 10 AM. Our church voted to make this shift last year for the first time and it was well received. During the summer, our worship attendance dips as folks go on vacation and do more traveling, so moving to one service helps our sanctuary feel nice and full. It's also nice to worship together as one church and see folks in worship who usually attend a different service.
- The last week of Sunday School will be May 25th. Beginning June 1st, kids are invited to join us for worship! We'll have a children's message in church and will have coloring pages and other activities for them to do while in service.



FROM THE CONGREGATIONAL CARE PASTOR

"Easter...Now What?"

Dear Friends,

I love Easter. I always have, even long before I fully understood its meaning. As a child growing up in a farming family and community, Easter always seemed to mark a new beginning. New crops got planted, the pastures were full of newly born calves and colts, and fields and forests turned green again as warmth returned.

Then, as I got more involved with the life of the church and more deeply invested in my spiritual walk with Christ, Easter's impact took on a whole new meaning. Now, so many years later, I take the occasion of Easter to ask again: "now what?" Christ is risen... "now what?"

I remember well the refrain from one of the first Easter hymns I can recall singing, "He Lives":

"He lives, he lives, Christ Jesus lives today!

He walks with me and talks with me along life's narrow way.

He lives, he lives, salvation to impart!

You ask me how I know he lives? He lives within my heart."

That's the true miracle of Easter — Christ living on and on in the hearts of all who embrace him.

Martin Luther was known to refer to Christ followers as "little Christs"...not the mini statues of Jesus we stick in our pockets and purses, but day-to-day flesh-and-blood human types who invite the presence of the risen Christ to walk around in us, doing his work, and sharing his love. And I've learned over the years that often we don't even know when this work is being done, when his presence is being shared through us.

As you might suspect, I have a story: When I was 28-years-old and in my final year of seminary in New Jersey, I received a letter from someone I hadn't really thought about for years. Seven years prior, when I was beginning my senior year of college at Seattle Pacific University, I had taken a position as Youth Director at a Presbyterian Church in South Seattle. Among the many kids I got to know and work with, there was a 14-year-old young man named Karl. Karl was a part of our Youth Group not by his choice, but rather by his parents' insistence. Frankly, he was less than a delight to have in our meetings.

Karl was kind of sneaky disruptive, finding lots of ways to express his displeasure at being there. Quite honestly, I didn't make a special project of

reaching Karl, I just kept inviting him to be a part of things. If I was taking a small group miniature golfing on a Saturday, I'd give Karl a call too. If I had a hike planned, or a service project, I'd check in with Karl and make sure he knew about it. And to my surprise, he almost always showed up, even to the things his parents wouldn't have insisted on.

I finished my year at the church, got my degree, and moved on to other things. Then, seven years later, came this letter. Karl was now 21 years old. He had just attended a Christian Student Conference in Texas, and he had done a lot of reflecting on his young life at that conference. In the letter, he thanked me for (I quote) "saving [his] life!"

Karl explained that at the time I'd known him, he was unhappier than anyone knew...so much so that he had even contemplated taking his life. He said that my consistent reaching out to him, including him, being present for him, had been the difference maker in what was otherwise the darkest year of his life.

Honestly, I had little idea that Karl was in such a dark place. He was just a kid who I thought needed a little extra love and attention. I'd not made any heroic gestures Karl's direction — I'd just made sure he felt included and cared about. Then came that letter.

Karl's letter reminds me that Luther was so right — we are to be "little Christs" to and for one another. The Easter promise is that Christ wants to live in us and through us in ways that often we don't even realize, to touch and heal. The "now what?" of Easter is to open ourselves to the living of this life that, to quote another hymn, "walks with me, and talks with me and tells me (and others) that we are his own!"

That, as the letter I received over 50 years ago, is the ongoing miracle of Easter.
