Dear Trinity Friends,

When we were asked to write a stewardship reflection, we had no idea what a pleasure it would turn out to be. We ask that you pray with us at our annual gathering of gifts and gratitude on Sunday, November 13th and consider how you will contribute your gift of Work, Wealth, and Wisdom.

Our More Than Enough campaign theme this year reminds us of the American singer-songwriter Zak Brown who sings in his song Homegrown: "I've got everything I need, and nothing that I don't."
