Holy Week and The Easter Triduum

The Great Three Days during which the Lord died, was buried, and rose again.

Holy Week begins the last Sunday of March with Palm/Passion Sunday. It marks Jesus’ triumphal entry into Jerusalem while the crowds waved palm branches and shouted praises. The crowds, however, turned on Jesus.

The Easter Triduum, or The Great Three Days from sunset Holy Thursday to sunset Easter Day, are a unity—the climax of the Christian year—when we celebrate the saving events of our Lord’s passion, death, and resurrection. For most of us, a day begins and ends at midnight. This doesn’t hold true on a Jewish calendar, not in the time of Jesus and not today either. A Jewish day begins at nightfall and ends the following nightfall.

This helps us understand the counting of time for the Triduum. Beginning Thursday evening after sunset and lasting until sunset on Friday was the last day of Jesus’ life. During that 24 hours, Jesus ate the Last Supper with his disciples; prayed in the garden of Gethsemane; was betrayed and deserted by his friends; was convicted of blasphemy by the religious authorities; was tried and sentenced for insurrection by Pontius Pilot; was tortured by Roman

soldiers; and underwent crucifixion, death, and burial. All that is one 24-hour period, the last day of Jesus’ life. We will gather for worship at 7 PM the evening of Holy Thursday to remember that Jesus shared a last meal with his disciples and then was betrayed.

On Good Friday we will gather for worship again at 7 PM to remember Jesus’ betrayal, trial, sentencing, crucifixion, death, and burial.

This is the most holy, serious, and crucial three days of the year for Christians. Missing these days would mean missing the heart of our entire spiritual journey for the year. Therefore, it is best to organize our time and commitments in such a way that absolutely everything during these days is set aside so that we can center entirely and exclusively on our own participation in the suffering and death and resurrection of Jesus.

Our fantastic, community Easter Egg Hunt is Saturday, March 31 at 10 AM with over 5000 eggs, prizes, games, and lots more fun! That will lead us into Easter morning, April 1, the most joyous season of the Christian year. We gather to celebrate Jesus’ resurrection at 9 and 11 AM. This is a particularly good time to invite someone. These moments are to be shared and enjoyed with the world.

Discipleship Pathway

John Wesley,
the founder
of the Methodist
movement,

Our church’s mission is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Our Annual Conference, the connection of United Methodist congregations in Iowa, has set the goal of every church developing a process for intentionally forming disciples of Jesus by 2020.

At Salem we began this process with our Healthy Church Initiative consultation back in September 2013. We were given a prescription to develop a discipleship pathway for all ages. Therefore in 2014 we created and implemented a path for people to follow in order to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ, to become like Jesus.

We imagined Salem’s discipleship pathway as a meal, offering just a bite, a more filling portion, the entrée, and dessert. Each part of the meal has its place. So we created a menu of opportunities to be nourished by Jesus, the Bread of Life, throughout the year.

We also created a central path within the path. It begins with a greeting at the beginning of worship and an invitation for newcomers to fill out the Connection Card and attend Connecting Point, a once a month gathering with the pastor and other leaders. This leads to the next step, Connect, which is a four-week small group introduction to Salem and how we follow Jesus.

This has been an excellent beginning, however, with some years of experience along with some new learning, we’re ready to revise and grow our discipleship pathway, the method for becoming like Jesus. For instance, we are learning how all discipleship pathways in some way include reaching, connecting, forming, and sending.

Reach — the intentional action to get to those outside the church. This is not attractional, waiting for people to come, but rather going as a missionary to them.

Connect — the intentional action to bring together, leading others to commit their lives to God through baptism and profession of faith. At Salem we want to revise our pathway to make sure Connecting Point and Connect does this, leading newcomers to not only connect with the people of the congregation but to also commit to following Jesus through baptism or profession, opening the door to a whole new life and experience.

Form — the intentional action to shape and nurture the people of the church, especially with the Means of Grace, to grow in our faith, to become like Jesus. Our small groups, classes, and opportunities to develop and practice the spiritual disciplines are essential for our formation and growth as disciples.

Send — the intentional action to go outside the church again, bringing the process full circle back to Reach. In doing so, however, we practice what John Wesley called the Works of Mercy to do good, make a difference, and transform the world.

Interestingly, this entire process is laid out in our 2016 Book of Discipline in ¶122 The Process for Carrying Out Our Mission. It says we make disciples as we:

- proclaim the gospel, seek, welcome and gather persons into the body of Christ;
- lead persons to commit their lives to God through baptism by water and the spirit and profession of faith in Jesus Christ;
- nurture persons in Christian living through worship, the sacraments, spiritual disciplines, and other means of grace, such as Wesley’s Christian conferencing;
- send persons into the world to live lovingly and justly as servants of Christ by healing the sick, feeding the hungry, caring for the stranger, freeing the oppressed, being and becoming a compassionate, caring presence, and working to develop social structures that are consistent with the gospel; and
- continue the mission of seeking, welcoming and gathering persons into the community of the body of Christ.

Our Leadership Board is working towards aligning our staff to accomplish our mission. This includes among others a new staff position, Director of Discipleship, to oversee this pathway and more.

The question for you to consider is, Where are you on this discipleship journey? Have you connected through baptism and profession of faith? Are you being formed like Jesus and continuing to grow through discipleship practices (worship, holy communion, prayer, scripture, fasting, small group conferencing)? Are you continually going into the world to do good and make a difference? Where are you on this pathway?

Worship Series for Lent — *Final Words from the Cross*

Lent continues in March with the celebration of Holy Week during the last week. Our worship series, *Final Words from the Cross*, continues, focusing on the last words Jesus spoke on the cross before he died. Most of our small groups and classes are focusing on these same words during each week. The liturgical color is purple during Lent.

Holy Week begins March 25 with Palm/Passion Sunday. We will remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem as well as the final words he spoke before dying. The choir will present a powerful cantata, *At His Name*, in both services. The liturgical color is scarlet red during Holy Week.

The Great Three Days from sunset Holy Thursday to sunset Easter Day are a unity—the climax of the Christian year. This is the most holy, serious, crucial, and joyous three days of the year for Christians. Missing these days would mean missing the heart of our entire spiritual journey for the year. Therefore, it is best to organize our time and commitments in such a way that absolutely everything during these days is set aside so that we can center entirely and exclusively on our own participation in the suffering and death and resurrection of Jesus. This is the most special time of worship in the entire Christian year. The liturgical colors are white and gold. Come and worship!



Adora S. Jones Ministerial Trust Scholarships

The Adora S. Jones Ministerial Trust was established by a lovely lady, who was a school teacher and a longtime member of Salem Church. It was Adora's wish to use the income from the trust to provide scholarships to seminary students from the State of Iowa who desire to preach the gospel. Salem members Bob Thompson, Tim King and Nancy Rawson are the selection administrators for these scholarships.

This year fourteen students were selected to receive awards. They are **Laurel Fraser, Fredrick Killian, Robert Lanphere, Leandra Martins, Patrick Mulloy, Wendy Musgrave, Keith Pitts, Kristina Roth, Deborah Svec-Carstens, Alex Tibbott, Trevor Vaughn, Linda Westerhold, Brian Williams, and Lana Williams.** They are studying at various seminaries such as Garrett-Evangelical Theological, St. Paul School of Theology, Perkins School of Theology, The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wesley Theological, Iliff School of Theology, University of Dubuque Theological, and Duke Divinity School. A total of \$9,800 was awarded this year by the Trust. Over the past 19 years, 225 scholarships have been awarded with a total of \$291,536 distributed.

Report of the Leadership Board

Following the subcommittee meetings at 5:15 PM, the full board met at 5:43 PM. Chair Nancy Rawson led the meeting. She opened with prayer and shared a scripture reading from Psalm 139:13-16 regarding prevenient grace. The LB members also shared God sightings (times in their everyday lives when they saw God at work).

Treasurer's Report – Linda Curson reported on the final income and expenses for 2017 and presented the 2018 budget. Changes in the budget from last year were discussed. Income and expenses for January were also reviewed. Giving was lower and expenses were higher than the budgeted amounts for the month. We expect to make up this deficit in the months ahead.

Leadership Board Development/Training – This year the LB will pursue an opportunity for leadership development by reading and studying a book together. The book selected is *Canoeing the Mountains: Christian Leadership in Uncharted Territory* by Tod Bolsinger. Through this study, we are hoping to learn more about effective leadership in this ever-changing world.

Pastor's Renewal Leave – Pastor John gave an update on his renewal leave and thanked the church for this opportunity for reflection. He used his time to write about the impact of the 2008 flood on Salem Church and how Christians can respond when disasters strike.

Chrysalis Weekend – The Cedar Rapids Emmaus/Chrysalis Community will hold a Chrysalis Flight July 27-29. They have asked Salem to allow the event to be held at our facility. This three-day weekend event is a time of spiritual renewal for youth (sophomore in high school through age of 21). Some of the logistics of holding the event at Salem were discussed and there are additional concerns that would need to be worked out. However, the LB was in agreement to hosting the Flight if the Chrysalis Community so desires.

Memorial Gifts – Memorial gift procedures were reviewed including a reminder that memorial gifts (other than monetary) must be approved by the LB before they are received.

Meeting Notes 2-20-18

Trustees – *The Cedar Rapids Walk to Emmaus Community is working to update their insurance coverage on their 16 foot trailer of supplies for the walks before they will be in a position to store it on Salem property. The Trustees will get quotes for the pouring of a concrete slab (for the parking of the trailer) and they will check into any applicable neighborhood covenants. * The majority of the security system has been installed. A relay switch is needed to allow the handicap accessible door to work in conjunction with the system. *The LB approved the purchase of LED lights for the sanctuary cross. This will allow the cross to remain lighted at all times. *At the Fire Marshal's recommendation, the LB approved the purchase of carbon monoxide detectors to be installed in the maintenance closets. *Bud Carnahan has agreed to repair the wood finish of the communion table in the sanctuary. *The Trustees provided an update on lighting work at the church that is ongoing. *The status of the outbuilding continues to be a topic of discussion.

Stewardship – *The Stewardship Subcommittee reviewed a report from the Mission Team regarding Salem's mission giving in 2017. Some of the beneficiaries of this funding included the Linn County Food Bank, Helping Hands, Books without Borders, missionaries Jane and Larry Kies, and Heifer International. The full report will be included in the church newsletter. *A final version of the policy for handling money will be discussed at the March meeting. (Continued on page 11)

SPRC – *Kory Thomas and Melinda Gipple (who stepped in to serve as co-custodians effective February 1) have asked to be relieved of these extra custodial duties. They both serve (and wish to continue to serve) the church in other roles as Building Superintendent and Administrative Assistant, respectively. The job description for the custodian was reviewed and will be posted as soon as possible. Information on the cost of a cleaning service will also be obtained. *The SPRC is working on the development of job descriptions for the Director of Discipleship and the Worship Producer. *The subcommittee will also continue their work on the creation of an employee handbook/staff reference book.

Other Items - *As part of a discussion on community outreach, an example of another church's door hanger was reviewed. *A collection of materials on Salem's history has accumulated in Room 6 downstairs. The Trustees were asked to oversee how these materials will be handled. *The showing of the sign of peace during worship services was discussed due to the high number of influenza cases this year.

Closing –Nancy Rawson closed with prayer. The meeting adjourned at 7:44 PM.
