Friends,

What a blessing it has been to worship with you for the past weeks! My family and I are grateful for all you have done to make us feel welcomed, and we are excited for what God is doing in and through the church's life.

As we begin this journey together, I invite you to reflect on your why. Simon Sinek, a best-selling author and motivational speaker, talks about the importance of being aware of our what, how, and why. In organizations and our personal lives, understanding the reasons behind our actions is crucial, as it brings us fulfillment.

Knowing our why helps us be grounded in the mission and the purpose of the church, and it can also help us build trust and authenticity.

Comedian Michael Jr. has a viral video about an important lesson in embracing the why we do things. In this video, he articulates that "When you know your why, your what has more impact because you are walking toward your purpose."

How often do we go through the motions while forgetting the 'why' behind what we do? In the life of the church, we become so busy with our work that we can lose sight of what initially drew us into this relationship with God and our faith community. Remembering the why provides us with focus, and it also helps us envision the future. When you recall your why, it transforms the impact of your actions.

We have begun building on a foundation that will be essential for developing fruitful ministries capable of advancing the church's mission in Lancaster and beyond. As we reflected in the worship series "Living Faith," our lives mirror who Jesus is to us and demonstrate what faith can achieve in people's lives. Throughout August, we explored the significance of sharing our faith and the various ways to invite others to live out their faith —acknowledging that God is with them and how their faith can positively influence their personal lives. How can we keep that in mind as we journey daily through this world and our faith?

Frederick Buechner wrote: "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." That is our calling. To be the intersection where faith and mission come together.

Let us be a church that recognizes how actively the Spirit of God works among us as we serve and pursue new mission opportunities, living out the mission of connecting people to Jesus so they can become Christian disciples who serve and change the world. Let us do so by loving boldly, serving joyfully, and leading courageously.





A PASSAGE TO INDIA by E M Forster

Hailed as one of the finest novels of the twentieth century and transformed into an Academy Award—winning film, A Passage to India hauntingly evokes India at the peak of the British colonial era, complete with the racial tension that underscores every aspect of daily life. 


THE WOMAN THEY COULD NOT SILENCE by Kate Moore


BEARTOWN: A Novel by Fredrik Backman

This is a story about a town and a game, but even more about loyalty, commitment, and the responsibilities of friendship; the people we disappoint even though we love them; and the decisions we make every day that come to define us. In this story of a small forest town, Fredrik Backman has found the entire world.

Once we finish our series studying the book of Galatians we'll be doing a brief study where we **share our testimonies** with each other! Further ahead than that we're not sure what our next study will be.



Day Center: Caring Beyond the Clock

This past quarter, Anchor Lancaster had the opportunity to respond to urgent community needs, this time in the form of extreme summer heat. On a Sunday in late June, Lancaster County issued a Code Red Heat Alert as temperatures climbed into dangerous territory. Though our Day Center typically operates Monday through Friday, we opened our doors outside of normal hours to provide shelter, water, and relief for neighbors without access to air conditioning or shade.

Thanks to recently purchased industrial fans and well-stocked supplies like bottled water and ice, we were able to respond quickly and responsibly. But even more impactful than the resources were the people: our staff and volunteers who showed up with compassion, offering not only physical comfort but the dignity of presence and care. This response was made possible by your generosity, our partnership with Tenfold, and a team that lives out Anchor Lancaster's mission of hospitality, even when it's hard, and even when it's hot. In a world that doesn't always pause for those in need, we're grateful to be able to say: Anchor Lancaster does.





Retirement with a Gift

Some legacies don't end with a farewell, they echo in the quiet kindness left behind, in the way someone chooses to turn their goodbye into a blessing. Earlier this year, First UMC did something extraordinary. The church launched a capital campaign, not for building projects or internal needs, but to honor Pastor Joe's retirement and his commitment to mission. He was asked to pick three missions to benefit from the funds and one recipient was Anchor Lancaster. Pastor Joe was the initial voice asking to bring "Anchorage Breakfast" to First Church 10 years ago when it needed a new location in the city. The congregation rallied behind this initiative and has continued to support Anchor Lancaster, as it is now known. Over time, Anchor has expanded its mission of a hot buffet breakfast to include shower and laundry services, and a day center. Two caseworkers are part of the team, providing life changing support to our guests. First Church has contributed over \$150,000 to Anchor Lancaster, and this incredible gift will help us continue to provide meals, showers, care, and dignity to our neighbors in need right here in Lancaster. We are immensely grateful. Thank you, Pastor Joe and First United Methodist Church!





LUMINA SUMMER DAY CAMP

Fun, Faith, & Fellowship August 4-8, 2025

This year's LUMINA Summer Day Camp was a wonderful week of sunshine, learning, and laughter. **Twenty-eight children** (ages 5–12) were joined by 21 adults from six United Methodist churches and 14 youth helpers—including several from First UMC: Sue Kepner, Natalie Reed, Rachel Ridgeway, JoAnne Foss, Marc Russo, Ben & Dan Denisewicz, and Christian Faux.

Campers built birdhouses, painted T-shirts, made beaded bracelets and cross necklaces, and shaped clay creatures. They explored how to live out their faith in Christ—loving one another, showing kindness, praying for others, and offering forgiveness. Each day, children received 1–2 books to take home and enjoyed classic camp games like Gaga, Tenzies, and sack races.

A highlight was the **trip to Camp Conquest**, where campers stomped in the creek, caught crayfish and minnows, swam, zipped down a water slide, and roasted hotdogs and marshmallows over a campfire.

Thanks to a **First UMC grant**, all meals were covered for the week—featuring favorites like chicken nuggets, pasta with meat sauce, beef BBQ, and homemade pizza. Another grant from First UMC also helped fund scholarships for Gretna Glen Camp in July, enabling LUMINA to send 19 children and youth.

We are grateful to God for perfect weather, to all the volunteers who made the week possible, and to First UMC for the support that made a lasting difference in the lives of our campers.

GENEROSITY UNLEASHED MAKES IMPACTS FOR CHRIST

On June 8, 2025, First UMC celebrated surpassing our goals of \$300,000 for 3 great mission projects in honor of Pastor Joe's 40 years in ministry and retirement. Our capital campaign, unlike the many we have already had, was directed not at our own facilities but at others doing God's work. Our total exceeds \$480,000, meaning that our gift to each project should be in excess of \$160,000, far greater than the original goal of \$100,000!



Anchor Lancaster has created an endowment fund to undergird operating expenses. In addition, Anchor Lancaster may use their funds for a capital mission if one is determined in the future.

Sierra Leone

Serving Sierra Leone's Maternity Center is under construction in Kabala, Sierra Leone. Rev. Dorcas Kamanda, a part of First Church, has informed us that progress has been temporarily halted due to the rainy season. Tragically, Dorcas shared that a recent mother passed away from Post Partum Hemorrhage at their clinic, which lacks sufficient resources. The mother was only 28 years old and this was her second child. Additionally, a two-year-old child also lost their life recently. Dorcas expressed, "These incidents have brought me immense sadness. Both could have been prevented." Once completed, the Maternity Center is expected to significantly reduce maternal and newborn mortality rates in their region of Sierra Leone. The total cost for the center may exceed \$500,000, and our contributions will aid the community in facing the future with hope.



Africa Sunrise Communities

Rising Hope Christian Center is beginning to take form in Bor Town, South Sudan. Jacob Guot, a part of First Church, shares that his mission, Africa Sunrise Communities, has secured a five-year lease for their building. They have completed renovations on the floors and ceilings and developed a layout that includes a pharmacy, waiting room, examination areas, and facilities for digital x-rays and ultrasound machines, among other features. Excitingly, potential patients have already heard about the Rising Hope Medical Center and are coming forward seeking treatment! Given that electricity is available for only 6 hours a day, Jacob's team is investigating the possibility of implementing a solar system with battery storage. Thanks to our gift, they have the confidence to pursue these advancements that once seemed unattainable.



Your pledges to the Generosity Unleashed campaign have exceeded the goals, and your giving is on a



great schedule. By the close of August, we expect our receipts to exceed \$255,000 (53% of the total)! Our June distribution was \$35,000 each; our July distribution was \$25,000 each; and we expect our August distribution to be \$20-25,000.

Together we are reaching into the future with faith and action. Together, God is using us to make an impact for Jesus in three places in our needy world. While many worry about scarcity, our Generosity Unleashed campaign demonstrates abundance – and hope. Praise the Lord!

FALL'S WILD BEAUTIES & BOUNTIES
