

Lent is coming

This year, our Lenten season begins on Wednesday, February 14th when we gather to observe Ash Wednesday, hear of our deep need for forgiveness, receive the ashes on our heads as a reminder that we are dust and that is what we will return to dust one day, gather at the table for communion and embark on a journey which will last 40 days.

Each year, the Lenten Season calls us to draw closer to our Lord through spiritual disciplines. To help with these disciplines, the Devotional *You Are the Way* is available, there are limited large print copies available as well. The theme of this devotional booklet is Jesus' "I am" statements from the Gospel of John. One or more of these statements will be covered each week. Please take one of these devotionals to use with your family or on your own!

We also add worship opportunities during this season, on Wednesdays throughout Lent there will be early morning spoken prayer lead by Dave Shank in the Chapel. The prayer service will be at 6:30 am and repeated at 7:00 am. On Wednesday evenings, we will gather for our traditional soup and salad supper (please sign up to share a soup, salad or bread with the group). Following supper there will be a time of study, where we will be looking at the devotional *You Are the Way* and discussing the "I am" statement(s) from the week leading up to that day. Following our study time, we will go into the sanctuary for Holden Evening Prayer.

The schedule for study topics is as follows:

- February 21- "I am the way and the truth, and the life"
- February 28- "I am the gate" and "I am the good shepherd"
- March 7- "I am the light of the world"
- March 14- "I am the true vine" and "I am the vine, you are the branches"
- March 21- "I AM"

Please join us as you are able for these times of study and worship as we make this a meaningful Lent where we can prepare ourselves for our Easter celebrations by growing closer to our Lord!

ONE OUT OF TEN

Each Sunday I am at a different church preaching the Gospel and sharing the good work we are doing through The Community of St. Dysmas. So far this new year I have found myself at St. John in Creagerstown (north of Frederick) and St. John in Parkville (north of Baltimore). I am impressed with the good work we Lutheran Christians are doing around the corner and around the world. Unfortunately, I wish we had more people in our churches to observe and participate this good work!

Which leads to my point. The Lutheran church (along with other mainline denominations) are going through huge changes. I won't say that never before in the history of Christendom have we experienced such a decline nor even in American church history. But I am led to note that this is not our parents (or grandparents) church anymore. For instance in the 1950s everyone went to worship. The question was not whether a person went to church, but to what church they went. Church life was as American as...well the Flag and apple pie!

Today the question is reversed. More likely the question is "do you attend worship...anywhere" or even "do you know who Jesus is". No wonder the roads are deserted, and the youth soccer fields are full on Sunday morning. Society has shifted away from worship of God to worship of all kinds of other activities. I am not sure finger pointing is worth the time or effort. As the expression goes, "It is what it is".

I find myself reflecting on the Bible Story of the 10 healed lepers of which only one returned to Jesus to say thank you (a foreigner no less). I must admit, I increasingly feel like the ONE who returned to Jesus in this modern day culture. I am glad that I number myself with the one and thank for all you good people who also count yourself with the ONE in the story. The sanctuary is the right place for folks who know from whom come their blessings to be on Sunday morning. Even if you could sleep in, or would pick different hymns, or not agree with the sermon or wonder who that person sitting down the pew from you is! Where else can we say thanks to our God, hear about Jesus and receive Him in the meal with our brothers and sisters in Christ! So I am thankful you count yourself with the ONE in the Story!

Now we need to figure out to get the other NINE into the Sanctuary with us!

Women's Daily Grace—Faith not about Answers

1/19/2017

I believe; help my unbelief!" These words, spoken to Jesus by the father of a child suffering from convulsions (Mark 9:24), have been my own prayer long than I can remember.

In his 1519 "Sermon on Preparing to Die," Martin Luther encourages us not to be troubled by questions and doubts but to focus instead on God's promises. Luther grasped that the life of faith is not about answers; it's about relationship. Faith is not religious knowledge. Faith is trust—trust that God is for me, for you, for us.

This message is an excerpt from "When faith doesn't come easy" by Kathryn A. Kleinhans in the September 2017 issue of <u>Gather</u> magazine. Today we remember Henry, Bishop of Uppsala, martyr, who died in 1156.

What's happening in the Archive?

• Futon, Early Days and St. Paul's beginnings

Fulton, Early Days

For February, I thought it might be a good time to take a look back at Fulton's beginnings and share some information Charles Iager donated to the archives.

Fulton Post Office

Fulton, Maryland is over a hundred years old. Historically, the post office has been the focal point of the town. In over 100 years this hasn't change, although the building housing the post office have changed.

Located on Route 216 between Routes 29 and 108, Fulton's earliest settlers arrived a little before 1700. Around 1699, Thomas Browne, known as the "Patuxent Ranger" was commissioned to survey from Richard Snowden's "Birmington Manor" near what is now Laurel to the farthest limits of the Patuxent River.

Then, according to history, Snowden started out to follow Browne into his beautiful forest country and came up the Patuxent River by canoe as far as what is now Fulton.

In 1803, a tract of land containing 1,005 acres was conveyed to Rezin Hammond by the State of Maryland. Hammond owned the land around Fulton. Later on, settlers came from other countries, other parts of Maryland and the Southern United States.

Due to the number of people, a post office was established under the name of Waters Store on December 29, 1874. Richard Waters was the postmaster.

The name of the post office was changed to Fulton on March 28, 1882. The post office and town were name after Charles Carroll Fulton.

Fulton has managed to maintain its zip code despite efforts to combine it was surrounding communities.

St Paul's a Integral Part of Fulton.

St. Paul's is also a spiritual focal point of Fulton. Having grown with the community since early 1870's. You may ask what was happening with the church during this time period as the community was forming?

Historical Highlights

Early 1870—An organization meeting was held in Simpsonville under the direction of Rev. Verhoff. Elected as Trustees for this project: Henry Iager, Henry Timmermann and John Damm. (A Wooden Church was built on our site later.)

July 3, 1870 – The first baby is baptized into the new congregation. Eva Caroline, daughter of Frederick Renn and Catherine born April 14, 1870.

Early 1871—Pastor J. H. Mengert is called to be Pastor of "The Evangelical Reformed Lutheran Church of Howard County" as our congregation was known then.

April 16, 1871 – The First Sunday After Easter, was when the first services in the newly constructed church took place. German services were held in the morning, English in the afternoon.

April 16, 1871 (continued) The German and English services then alternated on each following Sunday. The first Sunday School was also organized on this day with 48 teachers and pupils.

August 6, 1871— The new church was dedicated by Pastor Mengert and Dr. Wilhelm Ebeling of Catonsville. From this date forward, the congregation became know as "St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church".

July 21, 1872– The first death is recorded. Charles Albert Krause, born September 5, 1871.

August 25, 1872— The first wedding is held in the new church was when Martin Iager took as his bride, Miss Mary Ann Smith.

September 1872 – Ernst Ide called to St. Paul's

December 29, 1874 – The town is on the map and known as Waters Store with its own Post Office.

July 1876 – Pastor Martin Kraett installed as Pastor.

1878 – Pastor G. H. Brandon succeeds Pastor Kraett.

September 1879- Pastor Ernst Ide again called to St. Paul's. (Pastor Ernst would remain Pastor of St. Paul's until 1897)

March 28, 1882 – The town's name is changed to Fulton and we become St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church" of Fulton.

1892—A bell tower is added to the church. (Not in its present location.)

December 13, 1893 – A bell is purchased from the McShane Bell Foundry in Baltimore, MD for \$106

January 1, 1894—Ladies Aid first

mentioned in St. Paul's records.

1897– Pastor R. A. Salzwedel is called to St. Paul's

1898 – A chancel is added to our wooden church.

1901– Pastor H. A. Wegner, who served St. John's at the same time is called as Pastor of St. Paul's

1904 – Pastor C. F. W. Hartlage, who served both St. John's and St. Paul's is called.

1907— Pastor H. F. Richards is called. At this time, St. John's and St. Paul's are served by separate Pastors. (First time since 1899)

September 6, 1908– Application for the congregation to become a member of the Joint Synod of Ohio was made under the following names: Henry Timmermann, August Wessel, Frank Flostedt, John Grauel and George Renn.

September 1, 1911– Pastor L. P. Propst is installed.

June 4, 1915—The Luther League is organized.

June 1915– Frank Florstedt is ordained. The first son of the congregation to enter the ministry.

May 25, 1930 – Cecil Propst is ordained by Pastors L. P. Propst and Edward Meuser. Cecil Propst becomes the second son of congregation to enter the ministry. (Cecil Propst was the son of Rev. L. P. Propst.)

August 11, 1930 – The American Lutheran Church is organized in Toledo, Ohio and St. Paul's becomes a member of this body.

July 31, 1932— Ground is broken for the new stone church. (The building we have now.) Mr. John Bassler, Sr. turned the first spade full of dirt. Pastors L. P. Propst, Cecil Propst and R. W. Winters officiated

the ground breaking.

August 28. 1932—Cornerstone of our present building is laid.

January 1, 1933 – Dedication of the new church. Almost 400 persons in attendance. Pastors L. P. Propst, Cecil Propst, R. W. Winters and Dr. C. H. Schuetter, President of the Eastern District officiated.

Conclusion

As you have read, St. Paul's has been an integral part of this community since before it even became known as the Fulton Community. With our humble beginning as a wooden church to the stone church we presently are now.

There has always been a vison moving forward and evolving to be a vital part of the community. Now in our approximately 148th year, how will we continue to grow and be a vital part of the community?

What will this generation's legacy be to the future of the community of Fulton?




