Pastor's Corner

March 20th,

As I sit to write this article, it is the first day of spring. Droplets of ice are bouncing off the window in my office. A winter storm warning will take effect overnight with a forecast for the highest snow total we have experienced this winter. There is not much about today that feels “spring like” and yet, the new season is here.

It is also the week before Holy Week. Where after our season of Lenten disciplines, we will gather for worship on Thursday evening, and hear the story of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples the night before he was betrayed by one of those disciples. Then on Friday we will gather in the chapel for Stations of the Cross, where we will hear of Jesus arrest, crucifixion and death. That evening we will also gather for worship to hear the story presented in a different way. But, after all that is heavy during Holy Week we will gather together again on Sunday morning first at 6:30 am in the Pavilion and then at 8:30 am and 11:00 am in the Sanctuary to celebrate the fact that Jesus was no longer in the tomb on the first Easter morning, he had risen from the dead!

This year, what seems odd is that Easter falls on April Fools' Day, but our faith in a Risen Savior is no joke! Instead, what happened on Easter morning is the truth, the truth that sets us free!

As we enter in to the new church season, of Easter, we will also be having a change in our worship service. During Lent, we have been singing the Lord's Prayer using words that are new to our congregation. During Easter, we will no longer be singing this prayer, but we will continue to use the words introduced to us during Lent.

While these words are new to our congregation, they are not new! These words were presented in 1975 by the “International Consultation on English Texts.” They were also included in the *Lutheran Book of Worship* which we used here at St. Paul's for many years and they have been included in our worship books since (*With One Voice and Evangelical Lutheran Worship*). The two different wordings for the Lord's Prayer are also used in all of the curriculums we use for teaching youth and adults.

While the words are different, they do not change the meaning of this prayer that Jesus taught us. The changes are there to use language that we use in regular conversations in our time.

In the beginning, it may feel a bit odd to say this prayer differently than we have for so many years, but, it will get to feeling natural soon! We have the practice here to change musical settings of our worship and some of the prayers we say during worship for each church season. So, in the midst of those rotations, we will now have two options (three when we use a musical setting) for saying the Lord's Prayer!

May we all have a wonderful Easter season! (And hopefully true spring weather will arrive too!)

In looking back over our lives, we can all discover defining moments. Events, people or experiences that changed us and altered our life journey. Perhaps yours may have been a first love or a final love, death of a loved one or your bout with cancer, military service or going away to college, retirement or birth of a grandchild. Let me tell you about “one” of mine.

It was the Summer of 1968. Both King and Kennedy had been assassinated. Cities were burning and a war turning our Country inside out. The Democrats were about to meet in Chicago to choose a presidential candidate (Humphrey), and in the process tore themselves asunder (it makes these times look mild in comparison). In the midst of this I traveled by MYSELF from Florida to Purdue University in Indiana to the National Lutheran Youth Gathering.

We stayed in college dormitories and ate college food. I remember talking each night to the guys across the hallway from suburban Chicago (I expect years later they attended seminary with me). One afternoon I went to a “teach in” on Vietnam (what was a teach in?), and afterwards I was still not sure what a “teach in” was. There was only two of at the “sit it”; The Rev. Richard John Neuhaus, whose path I would cross several times in my ministry, and myself. Thousands of us young people fasted for twenty-four hours to get a taste of hunger and broke the fast with a gigantic worship service in which we danced through the reflecting pool. I was moved by Dr., Norman Habel (later my Old Testament Professor in Seminary) presentation of the movie “An Occurrence at Owl Creek Bridge” tying in with our own fragile existence. In the middle of a very turbulent 1968, my personal world was rocked, and I came into contact with a Jesus that would be my rock for years to come. I would not be writing to you today as a pastor if not for that seminal event.


In four months 9 of your young people will be attending a Lutheran Youth Gathering. It will not be in Indiana but in Houston. We will not be staying in college dormitories but in an Embassy Suite. We will not be eating college food but likely from food trucks. No one will be travelling alone but in the company of the very able Julie Smith and myself. I bet the farm there will not be a Vietnam “teach-in” (maybe there should be a teach in on something).

But I do know one thing. These nine young folks will come back different! How I can't tell you! Why that is different. Why because the times may be different than the 60's but the world is as turbulent as ever. It may not be Vietnam, but it is the Middle East. It may not be cities aflame, but many cities are ghost of their former selves. There may not be assassinations of national figures as in 1968, but Freddy Gray and all the others are just as important and distributing as King/Kennedy. Your young people need the transforming Jesus as much as I did at my first Lutheran Youth Gathering that has carried through my next 50 years.

In the next several months there will be more fund raisers, and more opportunities for prayer, and times when you can encourage the St. Paul 9 and likely a Service of Dedication for them. I respectfully ask each of you to participate in these young people's experience as fully as possible as you can. Look at it as an INVESTMENT!

Passion. We know when we have it, and we know when we don't. And we know it's not something we can muster up when it just isn't there.

We all go through times when we are stuck in a rut, merely going along with the status quo, possibly wanting to make a difference but with no idea where to start or motivation to think about it. Other times we're not looking for anything in particular, but somehow something chooses us. Stumbling into passion that way feels like “eureka!” Suddenly we find the spark that was inside us all along, now freed to change the world.

Esther (Esther 4:13-14) changed from a docile follower of everybody's advice to a passionate advocate for her people. The question “What if . . . for such a time as this?” is so powerful because it is a question. We don't know until we act what our effect might be, but we do know that action is urgent.

This message is an excerpt from “Faith reflections: Discovering your passion” by Lee Ann Pomrenke in Café. Today we remember Thomas Cranmer, bishop of Canterbury, martyr, who died in 1556.

What's happening in the Archive?

- ◆ St. Paul's— May 1945 to 1947

St. Paul's May 1945 - '47

For April I thought I would continue with St. Paul's story where I left off in March.

May 13, 1945 (Mother's Day)

A Christian Flag and a United States Flag were dedicated in honor of Mr. George W. Renn, Sr., and Mr. Ezra E. Iager. They were presented by Mr. & Mrs. George W. Renn, Jr. and Mr. & Mrs. Harry Renn.

Through contributions of church members and Honor Roll Plaque was purchased and dedicated to the following men having served in the Armed Forces of World War II:

Charles Craver, David Cropp, John Horn, Edward Hughes, Albert Iager, Henry Iager, Roland Iager, Edward Madison, Seymour Mauck, Raymond N. Moore, Norman Murphy, Allen Ortel, Lemuel Peters, Cecil Propst, Albert Renn, Elwood Renn, Carson Ryman, Donald Sealing, Spencer Sealing, Walter Stup, George Walter, Lawrence Wehland, Maurice Wehland, Norman Wehland, Vernon Wehland, Albert Wessel, Frank Wessel, Irving Wessel, Roland Wessel and Paul Zimmerman

The above names were engraved on metal plates and fastened to a shield-shaped plaque board made of solid walnut. Chaplin Roy L. Yund of Fort Meade preached the sermon.

May 23, 1945

The Ladies Aid and Missionary Society was represented for the first time at the Concordia Conference of the Women's Missionary Federation, held at St. Mark's

Church in Baltimore. Speakers were the Rev. Benjamin F. Wyland, Miss Elizabeth Knep-schild and Mrs. W. R. Straehler.

August 12th– 19th (1945)

The 75th Anniversary of the founding of St. Paul's was celebrated. Ministers officiating at the 75th Anniversary were Pastors: Aaron A. Anderson, Carl Heminghaus, Luke Schmucker, Paul Lautenschlager, Dr. E. W. Schramm and Dr. G. E. Lonski.

Baptized membership at this time was 294 and confirmed membership was 203.

A memorial service was held at 8pm on August 12th for Pastor L. P. Propst. The Rev. Carl Heminghaus preached the sermon. A bronze plaque was dedicated at this time in honor of the Rev. L. P. Propst, which read as follows: "In memory of Rev. L.P. Propst Our beloved Pastor who brought us the means of Grace for thirty-one years 1911...1942. Through his untiring efforts this church was erected. "He that doeth the will of God abideth forever""

September 16, 1945

To encourage devotional life at home, daily devotional booklets were placed in the Narthex.

Fall 1945

The Luther League became affiliate with the Luther League Federation. The first "Thank Offering" service was conducted by the Ladies Aid and Missionary Society. (Continued page 9)

September 16, 1945

(continued from page 8)

The first printed, detailed Annual Report was made available to the congregation.

April 14, 1946

The first choir robes were purchased at a cost of \$262.45 and on April 14, 1946 were dedicated. Miss Elsie Wessel gave a wardrobe for storage and Mrs. John Bassler provided a mirror.

June 2, 1946

White choir robes were worn by the Confirmation Class for the first time.

June 9, 1946

Altar vases were presented in memory of Laura V. Kline and Amanda Dellinger by Mrs. William Mauck, Mrs. Benjamin Bassler and Mr. Walter Mauck. *(So this is a little more information on the vases that were reported on and pictured in a past newsletter. I still don't quite have the information right about Laura and Amada's descendants. So anyone who has further information on that subject please let me know?)*

July 7, 1946

The baptismal font was dedicated in memory of charter member Jacob Hines and his wife, Catherine and Reuben P. Hines. The font was given by the wife and children of the late Reuben P. Hines. The unveiling was by Richard Finneyfrock and Raymond Zeltman. Presentation was made by William J. Hines and accepted by John Bassler, then President of the Congregation.

Mr. Elmer F. Wessel volunteered to provide more light in the church cancel.

October 13, 1946

The practice of placing fresh cut flowers in the altar vases began on this date at a cost of \$2 per Sunday. Flowers were furnished by Charles Cook and Son, florist of Ellicott City.

December 30, 1946 thru January 5, 1947

The Newcomer Organ Co. installed chimes in the organ chamber (21 tubes) and the amplification system in the church at a cost of \$1,500. These were purchased from the Mass Organ Company through contributions from the congregation.

Mr. Roland Grauel made a closet for the pastor's clerical gowns.

February 2, 1947

Dedication of the chimes and amplification system was held at 8pm. Pastor W. Edward Austin preached the sermon.

May 18, 1947

Dedication of the baptismal ewer (pitcher), given by the children of Mr. & Mrs. John Grauel in memory of their grandparents, Mr. Nicholas (charter member) and Mrs. Grauel.

June 29, 1947

Ladies Aid and Missionary Society donated paraments for the altar, pulpit and lectern in the church year colors of green, white, red and violet at a cost of \$423.47

October 1947

Two roadside markers were placed on the church lawn.

January 21, 1948

St. Paul's Brotherhood was considered and a meeting was convened in the church for that purpose.

Conclusion

So some interesting facts and information on the origins of some of our

items in this month's journey through the records.

Apparently we have had a Church sign of some sort since 1947. I know from Charles Iager we had a stone sign around 1961 until it was hit by a milk truck that went off the road. I believe the present sign has been there since about 2002 or almost 16 years. There is a project underway to update or renovate our church sign.

Also the Brotherhood is 70 years old this year and had its' anniversary January 21st. Thanks to all its members for their wonderful service to the congregation. They meet the second Saturday of each month at 8am in the Parish Hall for breakfast, devotions and to discuss service projects.

The Brotherhood is looking for help 3 hours every Saturday morning from 9 AM to Noon from March 24 through April 28. Able bodies of any age would be greatly appreciated

Property Committee Notes, March, 2018

1. The front (narthex) Door has been installed by Baltimore Lock and Hardware. The new doors include panels to allow handicapped access as well as an intercom for remote opening from the Administrative Assistants desk.



2. The Church Council and several members of the Men's Brotherhood were instructed on the lock-up procedures for the new doors.
3. We are still awaiting quotes for the Natural Gas Conversion.
4. We have started looking again at replacement of the sign out front. We are planning on a replacement that would include LED panels that could be programmed remotely. Two members of the Council volunteered to utilize their contacts to get additional quotes.
5. The AED battery started beeping indicating it was low. A new battery has been ordered.
6. We continue to provide shoveling for the winter storms.
7. We contacted Verizon to fix the second fire alarm phone line that was causing the alarm to sound. We also waited for and met with the Verizon line crew on several occasions. The problem has been resolved.


