March 2019 Welcome to Lent

As we enter into the month of March, we will soon be entering into the season of Lent. This year, our Lenten Devotional books are titled, *Lasting Hope* and the focus is the Psalms that are used this year throughout Lent.

The Psalms are an important part of our faith. We can see the Book of Psalms as a song book, as a prayer book or both. We can use the Psalms in our own devotional lives and we use them together in worship. Throughout our lives, our faith changes. There are seasons in our lives of faith where we are growing. There are also seasons where we struggle. Sometimes, we are easily able to pray and then there are the times when we struggle to find the words to say. In a season of growth in our faith, the Psalms can help us to grow deeper. In the times of struggle, the Psalms give us words when we can't find them on our own. That is because each of the Psalms do different things.

There are Psalms of praise and thanksgiving. There are also Psalms of crying out for help. We can look to different Psalms when we are in a time of celebration, or in times of loss and lament. One thing all the Psalms have in common is that they help us to turn to God, and they help us to remember God's promises. This includes God's promises that have been kept already as well as those that are still unfolding that will one day be fulfilled.

This season, our devotions books will walk us through the Psalms that are used in worship during this Lenten season. These include Psalm 51, 91, 27, 63, 32, 126, 31, 116, 22, 98. The order they are listed is the order in which we will study them.

Please be sure to pick up a copy of the devotions book. We have the pocket size version, a limited number of large print copies, and if you prefer an e-book it can be found on augsburgfortress.org.

Throughout this Lenten season, you are invited to join in study and discussion based on these devotions in various contexts including the mid-week Lenten study time at 6:20pm.

As we pray and study the Psalms this Lent, may they open our hearts to a deeper relationship with our Lord.

"An Invitation to a Meaningful Lenten Journey"

Each year when this time of year rolls around my thoughts turn from the long winter months to the season of Lent. It may seem strange, but each year I passionately look forward to this season. It is a time to pause, to reflect, and to think about how I can renew myself spiritually. As Christians, we are called to do during these 40 days and say we have done enough for the season. Sure, there is no problem letting go of that bit of chocolate, the Big Mac, or the occasional glass of wine. There is no problem with putting down our phones, turning off the TV, or going off of social media for a time of sabbath. However, the question becomes, are "I invite you, therefore, in the name of day as a step towards the shadow of the cross? Amen." How during each of these 40 Days do we take time to shed off a little more of our sin and live in a little more of God's grace? How do we inter- May this enhance your Lenten journey, and nally find meaning during this season, and how do we then share the experience of our journey with others?

During these 40 Days of Lent there are many opportunities to aid you in your sacrificial journey here at St. Paul's. First, I heartily invite and encourage you to take in the practice of Ash Wednesday. From that point, I invite you to make a commitment to attend all of your choice of Sunday worship services leading up to Holy Week. And in between I invite you to be a part of our early morning Wednesday Lent prayer services, our Wednesday evening soup and study times, and I invite you to more than simply "give up" something join our adult Christian education group on Sunday mornings where we will be studying the ancient practices of Lent together along with sharing in weekly Lenten Devotions.

Focusing on Our Time in Lent

Sunday, February 24th (The Transfiguration of Our Lord) will be the last Sunday of Epiphany. The season officially comes to a close Shrove Tuesday, March 5th. (an event which the youth will be sponsoring at 6 PM in the Parish Hall) and Lent will officially begin on Wednesday, March 6th with Ash Wednesday. Communications and Social Media will be conducting a "Count Down to Easter." So please check in on St. Paul's website, Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

As a preview here is a run down of the season:

Feb 24th—"The Beatitudes

(*Continued*– *Luke 6:27-38*) "Do un to other as you would have them do unto you." "Love your enemies and do good, lend hoping for nothing in return." "Be merciful with other as your Father in heaven is merciful to you." "Judge not and ye shall not be judged: condemn not and ye shall not be condemned."

March 3rd- "The Transfiguration of our Lord" (Luke 9:28-

36) Peter, James and John's mountain top experience with Jesus. Jesus appearance is changed and Moses and Elias appear. Peter wishes to remain on the mountain but they must return to the plain and tell no one until the Son of Man is lifted up.

March 5th-"Shrove Tues-

day" (*Last day of Epiphany Psalm of David 35:11-26*) "False witnesses did rise up; the laid to my charge things that I knew not. They rewarded me evil for good..."

March 6th- "Ash Wednesday" (*Psalm 51:1-2*) Have mercy upon me, O God, according to your steadfast love; in your great compassion blot out my offenses. Wash me through and through from my wickedness and cleanse me from my sins.

March 10th-"First Sunday in Lent" (*Matt. 4:4*) One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God. Jesus tempted in the wilderness.

March 13th-"Job is beset by all manners of evil" (Job 1:22) All manner of bad things happen to Job, but in the end "in all this Job sinned not, nor charged God foolishly".

March 17th- "Second Sunday of Lent" (*Luke 13:31-35*) "The same day there came certain Pharisess, saying unto him, "Get thee out, and depart hence: for Herod will kill thee"

March 20th- Lenten Devo-

tion (*Psalm 27:7-8*) Here my voice, O Lord, when I call and have mercy on me. My heart speaks your message "Seek my face." Your face, O Lord I will seek.

March 24th-"Third Sunday of Lent" (*Luke 13:1-9*) Jesus tells the parable of the fig tree given one more year to bear fruit or be cut down.

March 27th-Lenten Devotion (*Psalm 63:4*) So I will bless you as long as I live and lift up my hands in your name.

March 31st-"Fourth Sunday of Lent" (*Luke 15:1-3*) Then drew near unto him all the publicans and sinners for to hear him. And the Pharisess and scribes murmured, saying, "This man receives sinners, and eats with them."

April 3rd-Lenten Devotion

(*Psalm 32:6*) Therefore all the faithful will make their prayers to you in the time of trouble; when the great waters overflow they shall not reach them."

- 1. We are finally seeing the light at the end of the tunnel for the gas conversion. The kitchen conversion is scheduled to be done on Monday February 25. A special thank you to Ken Keefer who oversaw the gas conversion and for filling in for me while I was away.
- 2. The community garden concept is now being presented for review by the Boy Scouts. We hope to hear something soon as to whether the concept is accepted by them.
- 3. The investigation into sub-dividing another lot has hit a snag. There is not adequate space in the schools in the area so unless there is a redistricting of the existing schools in this area, we would have to go on a five year waiting list. I am looking to see what this involves and what the cost would be.
- 4. Johnson Controls has finally replaced the canister for the fire suppression system in the kitchen. We are still waiting for them to replace the fire extinguishers that are up for hydro test.
- 5. A special thanks to Pastor Dave and John Parker for clearing the lot and sidewalks after the last snow storms.

February 5, 2019

Devotions-Pastor Carolyn

OLD BUSINESS DISCUSSIONS:

Review and approval of January minutes.

Erik received a thank you note from Maya for the generous gift from the congregation.

Property highlights-the installation of the natural gas for heat is complete. The kitchen equipment still needs to be converted. Hood is fixed in the kitchen. The thermostat in the parsonage needs repaired. We did receive notification that the county has put a hold on permits to develop land due to school system "closed" due to schools being at/over capacity in the area. Johnson Control to exchange extinguishers, as needed.

Seeds are being planted within the choir to fill the upcoming Music & Worship Director position in May. Council Secretary also needs to be filled in May.

Pastor Dave and Kerry Griffin to serve together in putting formal "Gift/Legacy Policy" in place for church giving.

The Cemetery Committee is working on Rules and Regulations to open cemetery plots to the public. This will be brought to the congregation at the next congregational meeting.

Evangelism meeting was held on February 4th. Group sent cards to shut-ins and discussed our 2019 projects.

Letter to congregation about Pastor Dave's offer not to extend his contract past May 31, 2019. A forum to discuss budget and thoughts of eliminating the associate pastor position due to budget concerns. Two forums will take place on Sunday, February 24th, one at 9:45 the other at 12:15 to get feedback from congregation on the matter.

NEW BUSINESS DISCUSSIONS:
