Merry Christmas! I can't believe how quickly this school year has gone! I hope all of your children are enjoying learning as much as we are enjoying teaching them! I have appreciated their eagerness to learn and their ability to be flexible and try new things.

We are going to explore some fun books over the course of the next 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ weeks. We'll start December with fun stories about snowmen and get creative in our thinking. After reading <u>All You Need for a Snowman</u>, we'll write about what our own snowmen need, in our journals. We'll also read <u>Snowmen at Night</u>, and brainstorm all the activities we can imagine snowmen doing while we're sleeping.

Two more books I love for winter are <u>The Mitten</u> and <u>The Mitten Tree</u>. <u>The Mitten</u>, which is based on a Ukrainian folk tale, will teach us about forest animals and children will retell the story to their classmates using props. <u>The Mitten Tree</u> will help us learn about the service of giving without expecting anything in return. Finally, we'll be reading <u>Mortimer's Christmas Manger</u> and will create our own version of a manger to take home.

Throughout the month, we'll be learning about the letters D and S and the number 5, along with sight words "are", "you" and "in". Our shape of the month is a star. Centers will include a nativity in our sensory tub, snowflake building on our magnetic board, gingerbread playdough in our kitchen center and many more new learning opportunities throughout the classroom.
