Mirror, Mirror on the Wall...

There once was a man who had been attending a new church for about three months. After the service he shook the pastor's hand and said, "Pastor, I enjoy your sermons, but I think you should preach more on sin."

The pastor paused, then nodded. "You know, you're right. So... tell me, what is your sin?"

The man blinked in surprise. "Well, I don't mean my sin. I mean the sins people really need to know are wrong." He then started naming off hot button cultural issues that he believed the pastor should preach against. Things he has never had to struggle with.

The pastor gently closed his Bible. "Then it sounds like you don't really want me to preach about sin so that God might convict *you* and show you where *you* need grace and repentance. You want me to use Scripture against others you believe are worse sinners than you. Am I wrong?"

The man's face turned red. He quietly muttered, "Thank you for your time, pastor."

This story reminds us how easy it is to fixate on the sins we don't struggle with. If we're honest, most of us keep an unspoken hierarchy of which sins are "the worst." For me, I get especially heated about greed — when corporations or individuals value wealth over human lives and wellbeing. It feels outrageous that some have more money than they could ever spend while their workers scrape by paycheck to paycheck. My instinct is righteous indignation, and when I'm not careful, I lose empathy. Yet the truth is, I don't really know what I'd be like if I had that kind of wealth and power. I'd like to believe I would choose generosity and love, but I can't say with certainty that I wouldn't fall into the same temptation.

Here's the truth: every one of us has fallen short of God's glory. We have all failed to love God and love our neighbors as we should. And when we lose sight of that, we slip into hypocrisy — obsessing over someone else's struggles while ignoring our own. For some, those struggles may be about money or pride. For others, they may be around identity, sexuality, forgiveness, or wounds so deep that only they and God know about them. I don't know their story, the scars they bare, or the weight they carry. What I do know is that, like me, they also need grace and love.

And that's where the church comes in. We are not called to be gatekeepers of who is "better" or "worse," but a community of grace where all of us — with our different stories, wounds, and struggles — can encounter the healing love of God. When we stop using sin as a weapon against others and in-

stead allow God's love to expose our own hearts, we become the kind of people who can walk with one another in empathy, humility, and hope. Because in the end, none of us stand outside the need for grace, and none of us stand beyond the reach of it.
