#### Newsletter Submissions for the May issue are due April 23rd

The last 10 or so years have certainly been momentous in Union Church's history. In 2016 we celebrated our 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary as a chartered church. 2022 was the 210<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the purchase of the property our church sits on for \$10. 2024 will be the 210<sup>th</sup> year since the original stone edifice was constructed for \$400 in what is now the parking lot across the road. 2019 was the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the construction of what is our current downstairs rooms and original sanctuary. (Cafe and adjacent rooms) In September of 2019 we were officially accepted into The Evangelical Presbyterian Church after 203 years as a member of The Presbyterian Church, USA and it's several predecessor names. After leaving PCUSA we were served for several years by many guest pastors. In 2022 Pastor Jeremy Peterson was installed as Unions 24th minister. Now in 2023/24 we have a new anniversary to celebrate!


The 1869 building (\$8800) served the congregation well and its number grew greatly. So much so that it was decided they needed more room. In 1897 it was decided an addition was needed. In 1898 construction was started on what is our current upstairs sanctuary at a cost of \$7500. The original downstairs was so substantially constructed that they were able to remove the roof and place a room nearly TWICE its size right on top. Remember, this was before the construction machinery we have today was available. Everything was hand labor. The front entrance and the bell tower were also added at that time. Most of the (still existing)


fancy oak railings and steps were constructed by the minister. Rev. Robert Kirk. The bell in the tower weighs 1900 pounds. The current one is the second one. The original was rung so hard and loudly on its trip from the Oxford train yard that it cracked and had to be replaced! The new stained-glass windows that so grandly set off our worship room were installed. The dedication of the new edifice was held August 30<sup>th</sup>, 1899. So, for the next year we celebrate the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the construction our current sanctuary.


Some interesting side notes: The original money raised to build the first building came up \$20 short because someone donated counterfeit money... The 2004 addition cost \$1.2 million, more than 70 times all the previous constructions combined... The Rose window in the rear was dedicated in memory of Professor Andrews of the Union Academy whose grandfather supplied the ground we now occupy. One of the last professors at Union Academy was Hugh Foresman who went to Chicago and founded Scott Foresman and Co. which would become the world's largest school book supplier. He later, in remembrance of his Union beginnings, was instrumental in the acquisition of our 90-year-old pipe organ... There is a 3-foot diameter tree stump in the crawl space beneath the church under the room we call the library which they apparently decided not to move in 1869! And of course, lest we forget, the village of Union is named after Union Church, not vice versa. It was originally called Colerain Village.

So, with all this history in mind, let's all join in a joyful celebration of 125 years of our sanctuary in 2023, holding great memories of its past and hopes going forward of more Christian ministry!!!

# **Church women donate quilts**

It's knot your average church group.

Volunteers from Union Presbyterian Church are part of the fabric of the community.

The group met every Tuesday in February to work on finishing 17 quilts.

The final step is called "knotting" which keeps the three pieces of the quilt together.

Once the quilts are completed they will be donated to several community organizations, including New Hope, Solid Rock, Oaks (in Oxford), and the school district's Solanco Family Life Network.

Other volunteers work year round to put the squares together. Batting (the inside) and backing are put in over the winter, Arlene Hastings said.

The final touch is a specially embroidered message in a corner square that reads "Union Presbyterian Church" and "Jesus Loves You.""Everyone does a great job coming out to help," Hastings said.

Betty Druck said the knotting group is currently comprised of all Union congregants, but everyone is welcome to join and also invited to attend church services officiated by new minister Jeremy Peterson.
