A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Did Jesus Die for Everyone?

Without question, the most well-known verse in all the Bible is John 3:16: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

When I was a new believer, this verse troubled me. I found myself asking questions like:

- When John says that God loved the world, does he mean the earth itself or the people living on it?
- What about those who do not believe in Jesus—does God love them even though they are condemned to hell?
- If God is loving, does that mean everyone will eventually be saved, no matter what they believe about Jesus?
- If God loved the world enough to send His Son to die for our sins, does this mean Jesus simply made salvation possible, leaving us to make it effective by believing?

Perhaps you've wrestled with some of these same questions. This month, as we step back into the time of the Reformation, we continue our look at the Synod of Dort and examine the second article of the *Remonstrance*, which addressed this very question: "Did Jesus die for everyone?"

The Remonstrance: Unlimited Atonement

The *Remonstrance* answered this question as follows: "Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world, died for all men and for each man. He earned for them all, through the death of the cross, reconciliation and the forgiveness of sins. Still, Christ died in such a way that no one actually shares in this forgiveness of sins except those who believe."

This appeal to verses like John 3:16 and 1 John 2:2 seems, at first, to affirm God's universal love and Christ's universal provision for sin. Yet, there are several concerning points in this explanation.

First, while the *Remonstrance* claims that Christ died for all people, it also admits that not all are saved. As Dr. Robert Godfrey explains, "the effectiveness of the death of Christ is triggered by believing, yet this relationship between the work of Christ and the believing of an individual is never explained." This suggests that the work of Christ on the cross is only partially sufficient for salvation, requiring something from us to make it effective.

Another issue arises when we consider unbelief itself. If Christ died for the sins of all people, did He also die for the sin of unbelief in those who never believe? The Puritan theologian John Owen raised this important point. Scripture clearly teaches that unbelief is sin. Just two verses after John 3:16, we read:

"Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God." – John 3:18 (Continued on Page 2)

- "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." John 6:29
- "For whatever does not proceed from faith is sin." Romans 14:23
- "Take care, brothers, lest there be in any of you an evil, unbelieving heart, leading you to fall away from the living God." Hebrews 3:12

Owen concluded, "If Christ died for the sin of unbelief, then the unbeliever is saved. If unbelief is not a sin, then God cannot condemn the unbeliever for it." The logic of the *Remonstrance*, therefore, leads to a troubling conclusion—universalism.

The Synod of Dort: Particular Atonement

In response, the Synod of Dort presented a biblical defense of **Particular Atonement** (also called *Limited Atonement*). It taught that God indeed loved the peoples of the world and gave His Son, Jesus Christ, who effectively redeems from among them all those whom He had chosen from eternity for salvation.

Christ's death was sufficient to atone for the sins of the whole world, but it was God's will that it should effectively redeem only those who were chosen and given to Christ by the Father.

Consider these passages:

- "She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:21 (note Jesus saves a particular people, "his people")
- "All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never cast out." John 6:37–40
- "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." John 10:11 (note Jesus does not lay down his life for goats)
- "Care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood." Acts 20:28 (also see Ephesians 5:25)
- "He chose us in him before the foundation of the world." Ephesians 1:4

The point is clear: Christ did not die merely to make salvation possible. He died to make salvation certain. His work on the cross truly reconciles sinners to God. As Charles Spurgeon beautifully put it: "We say Christ so died that he infallibly secured the salvation of a multitude that no man can number—who, through Christ's death, not only may be saved, but are saved, must be saved, and cannot possibly be anything but saved."

Why This Matters Today

The doctrine of Particular Atonement remains vital for Christians today, especially as it shapes our understanding of discipleship, evangelism, and assurance.

Discipleship

Jesus calls us to take up our cross daily and follow Him. The doctrine of Particular Atonement teaches us that His death trly saves us—from sin, from the world, from the flesh, and from the devil—and reconciles us to God.

As the Apostle Peter writes:

"He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed." -1 Peter 2:24

Christ's atoning work gives us new life. Like one rescued from near death, we are now compelled to live life to the fullest—not for ourselves, but for the One who loved us and gave Himself for us.

Evangelism

Some wonder, "If God has chosen His elect and Christ died for them, why should we evangelize? Why should I pray for the lost?"

The answer is simple: **because we do not know who the elect are** and we still believe that Jesus's words are true that, "Whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." Therefore, we pray for the lost, we speak of God's mercy, and we live as witnesses of His grace. We proclaim Christ to all so that His sheep may hear His voice and come to Him. We evangelize not in uncertainty, but in confidence that God's Word will not return void.

Gospel Assurance

Finally, this doctrine assures believers of God's steadfast love. Who opened your ears to hear the good news? Who gave you faith to believe? Who sustains you through trials and comforts you in despair? It is all God's grace.

If God began this good work in you, He will surely complete it. His love has guided you from eternity past, redeemed you through Christ's death, and holds you fast in every storm. That same love will bring you safely home to glory.

Truly, God so loved us—and loves us still—that He sent His only begotten Son into this world to be our sufficient Savior. And He remains the Savior of all who believe in Him.


