A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

TRAGEDY AND RENEWAL

I have waited some time to share my reflections on the assassination of Charlie Kirk and its ripple effects. For some, my delay may be frustrating—you may have expected a quick, formal response. For others, my decision to speak now may seem unnecessary. Yet in moments like these, the last thing we need is another emotionally charged reaction. We already have more than enough of those.

The truth is, I was deeply shocked by Charlie Kirk's death. I was not a devoted follower of his work, but I admired his clarity about the gospel and his courage to speak truth in the public square. He sought to love both neighbors and enemies—often the two are intermingled—by engaging them honestly. His assassination was shocking because it revealed how far we have fallen as a society. There was once a time when men and women could debate differing ideas, test arguments, and allow truth and reason to prevail for the good of all. Charlie embodied that spirit.

Today, however, we live in a cultural moment where disagreement is too often met not with dialogue but with hostility. Many treat opposing worldviews as threats to be eliminated rather than opportunities for conversation. In the wild predatory animals who are threatened attack, to eliminate the threat - It appears we have devolved into such a state. Much of our culture has lost sight of the sacredness of human life—life that should be honored, protected, and cherished.

The greatest tragedy of Charlie's death, however, is not only cultural but deeply personal. A wife has lost her husband. Erika Kirk will no longer feel his embrace this side of heaven. Their children will no longer hear their father's encouragement, wisdom, and love.

I have also been struck by how many have taken Charlie's death as a personal blow. Of course, countless Christians around the world give their lives for their faith each year without recognition they ought to be recognized as much as Charlie. Yet Charlie's public platform does make him unique: many saw in him a voice for their own convictions—someone willing to stand boldly in a hostile culture. His courage to enter hard conversations, even knowing he would be maligned, inspired many. Perhaps people grieve because his loss feels like the loss of their own voice in the public square.

For some, this grief has turned into anger—deepening the dividing lines in our nation. But we must remember: what is unfolding around us is not merely political; it is spiritual. Jesus Himself warned us:

"Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil. Everyone who does evil hates the light, and will not come into the light for fear that their deeds will be exposed. But whoever lives by the truth comes into the light, so that it may be seen plainly that what they have done has been done in the sight of God." (John 3:19–21)

And again:

"If the world hates you, know that it has hated me before it hated you... A servant is not greater than his master. If they persecuted me, they will also persecute you." (John 15:18–21)

So is it wrong to be angry? No. Scripture tells us: "Be angry, and do not sin." (Ephesians 4:26) We should be angry at sin, at the darkness that blinds hearts, and at the hardening of humanity against God. We should lament that the world is not yet what it will be when Christ returns. But in our anger and grief, we must not lose hope.

Paul reminds us:

"Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death. But that was to make us rely not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead. He has delivered us... and he will deliver us again. On him we have set our hope that he will deliver us again." (2 Corinthians 1:9–10)

God is sovereign even in tragedy. He brings life out of death and light out of darkness. On Sunday, September 21, tens of thousands gathered in Arizona to honor Charlie Kirk. Many outlets dismissed the service as a political statement for a "right-wing activist and MAGA supporter." But what I witnessed was unmistakably a Christian memorial service—lifting up Christ, giving thanks for Charlie's life and work, and pointing to the hope of the gospel.

Some may question the motives behind such a public service, but regardless, the truth is this: the gathering became one of the largest evangelistic events on American soil in decades. As Paul said, "Whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is proclaimed, and in that I rejoice." (Philippians 1:18)

Does this mean that Charlie Kirk should be memorialized with a holiday or a statue on every college campus as some have proposed? No. Statues fade into the background; they become like crooked pictures in a hallway—seen so often that we forget they are there. Charlie's legacy is not in stone but in the example he set. He showed what it means to take up the cross daily and follow Jesus, to endure hostility with faith, to speak truth in love, and to remain steadfast in hope.

Time will tell what the ripple effects of Charlie's assassination and memorial service will be. My prayer is found in Genesis 50:20—that what the enemy meant for evil, God would use for good. That many in our country would be awakened to the truth of Christ. That the Lord would use this cultural moment to draw people to Himself, bringing renewal and gospel hope to our land as He builds His kingdom here.

And my prayer for the church is this: that we would love Christ more deeply, rest more fully in the hope of the gospel, and be a people filled with His peace—speaking truth in love, as Charlie Kirk modeled. May we remember that we belong to a kingdom that cannot be shaken. And while we sojourn here on earth, let us seek the welfare of the place where the Lord has planted us.

Until He returns, may we keep looking to Christ, loving Christ, and serving Christ with faith and hope and love.
