Christians in Public Affairs: Right Hand Kingdom and Left Hand Kingdom

In the last newsletter, I wrote an article called "Should Christians Support Israel in the Arab-Israeli Conflict?" Afterward, I realized there was an opportunity for clarification, which I would like to address in this month's article.

One of the points I aimed to make in the last article could be rephrased as follows: there is no spiritual or Right Hand Kingdom justification for supporting the political actions of the Left Hand Kingdom, such as those of Israel or America. The Right Hand Kingdom refers to the Kingdom God rules through the Church, while the Left Hand Kingdom refers to the "secular world"—a realm God indeed rules, though His orchestration of it remains hidden from us. Therefore, we should generally avoid using Right Hand Kingdom principles to justify Left Hand Kingdom actions.

This is not to say there are no valid reasons to support certain political actions. There are many good Left Hand Kingdom reasons. As Christians, we should carefully evaluate what seems just and reasonable based on the political situation and the knowledge available in the secular world. For instance, I am truly grateful that General MacArthur led the landing at Incheon on September 15, 1950. From my perspective, this was the right action, and I am thankful for it—but I say this as a Korean American, not as a Christian. Such are Left Hand Kingdom considerations.

I understand why people might feel "called by God" to go to war "in His name." However, we must be cautious about such declarations. Geopolitical justice is extraordinarily complex. Conflicts often result in innocent civilians—though not innocent in God's eyes, but by earthly standards—suffering, as well as individual Christ-followers caught in the turmoil. My point in emphasizing "if you can discern who they are" was to highlight the plight of these individuals rather than focus on the actions of nations or political leaders. From this perspective, war is a tragic and complex reality, affecting believers and innocent civilians on both sides.

Furthermore, there are often multiple layers of reasons behind a government's decision to go to war, many of which are not revealed through official narratives or media reports. For example, political analyst John Mearsheimer argues that Israel may wish for the U.S. to destroy Iran's nuclear weapons—a goal that extends beyond simple self-defense. How can we claim to discern God's will in such complex geopolitical situations when His rule over the Left Hand Kingdom is hidden?

War is brutal, complicated, and perpetuates evil. Until Christ returns, such conflicts will persist. Political decisions, including decisions to go to war, are necessary but are often made by earthly states rather than by citizens of the Kingdom of Christ. Remember that Christ instructed Peter to put away his sword. As citizens of the Left Hand Kingdom, we are called to use our best judgment, guided by our knowledge and discernment, to seek God's will individually through our votes and democratic processes.

God remains hidden in political matters within the Left Hand Kingdom. For this reason, we should generally avoid using Right Hand Kingdom principles to justify Left Hand Kingdom actions. Instead, we can fulfill our civil duties in open democratic societies while keeping calm, preaching the Gospel, and joining the saints before us in praying, "Come, Lord Jesus."

A Sign-up sheet to provide a meal is located on the Narthex on the FFF bulletin board.




LWML Mites

Sacred Ordinary Days A Gentle Advent, A Holy Christmas: Ideas to Celebrate the Seasons

"If there is one thing I am learning in a visceral way, it is that quiet, holiness, wonder, prayer, these epic ways of being to which we are, startlingly, called are built not in great, single acts of solitary freedom, but in the tussle and pull of every small moment. To pray, it's a breath by breath thing. To wonder, it's stopping to watch the glimmer, for an instant. To become quiet, is a turning of the heart in every little space offered in the music of life. These great joys, they grow in every small moment we have. So I am trying to keep a gentle Advent, a kindly one. Not one where I live (as I often do) in awareness of all that I haven't done, but in actual engagement with the grace that is arriving this season. It is damnably hard sometimes to remember that the point of Advent is not to prove my love, but to receive God's, that the discipline required is more the opening of my heart than the proving of my strength."

The hush of Advent. It's my favorite time of year. While the world around us hustles and bustles, reveling in consumerism and excess, I strive to walk a different way, I try to be quiet and content. I try to wait. Living in the tension of Advent is important I think. It is good for our souls. It is counter cultural to slow down in December, but it IS possible. To make room, make space, make time, to quiet the noise in all the little moments we can offers us a chance to open our hearts to God's love. What would that look like in your life?

The day after Thanksgiving as some families pull out their Christmas decorations, my family wipes our house clean. We declutter, deep clean, preparing our space as we prepare our hearts, making Him room. We enter Advent slowly and in darkness. The first night of Advent we gather together before bed. We turn out the lights, we light one candle, we begin at the beginning, and we read those beautiful words in John:

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made. In him was LIFE, and the LIFE was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1:1-5)

And each night of Advent we gather in the darkness, each night lighting one more candle, and we hear a little more of the beautiful old story. As our nights gradually get lighter (to an all out fire hazard by December 24) our hearts and minds get illuminated too. Light is dawning!

And oh how we hunger for Christmas! We try to fast in small ways during Advent. Sometimes choosing to abstain from sugar, sometimes baking sweets and cookies but only to give to others, sometimes eating simple home cooked meals of soup and bread. Trying to wait, in the small ways we can, to celebrate Him, to feast when it is time to feast and fast when it is time to fast. And the yearning of Advent makes the celebration of Christmas all the more meaningful.

We slowly decorate our home, bringing one or two things out at a time. Savoring the change those things bring to our home. A tree! Lights! And we spend time making everything for our tree from scratch. Popcorn and paper chains, dried orange slices and paper snowflakes, each gets placed on the tree as they get completed and our home grows more beautiful as we near Christmas.

We celebrate two saints days in Advent that are little feast days in the midst of the waiting. They are both eagerly anticipated in our home. On December 5 we put our stockings up and we read about St. Nicholas. We talk about how secret acts of generosity marked this good man's life. On December 6 we celebrate the life of St Nicholas by opening surprise gifts we have put in each other's stockings. On December 12 we spend our day baking special saffron buns called Lussekatter. And early on the morning of December 13 our daughters dress up in white dresses, put on red sashes, make coffee, and one girl (they take turns every year) puts on a special crown of candles and leads her sisters in bringing breakfast in bed to us parents. We sit in bed together and have a breakfast picnic! That day we read about St Lucia and her courage to travel far past her comfort zone to follow God's call to bring food and hope to those who needed it.

These are such fun traditions but they are important too. They remind us of our part in the grand story God is writing and as we imitate saints of old we practice being more like Jesus.

And then on December 24 we move from quiet Advent into boisterous Christmas as we celebrate with much joy the birthday of our Lord. We celebrate all 12 days of Christmas, opening gifts each day, eating special foods and spending time together. Celebrating fully our God who loves us enough to send His Son to redeem us out of darkness into light!

The Church, in all her wisdom, has given us not just Christmas but also Advent to help us understand the birth of Christ. Jesus's birth at Christmas is the turning point of history. The incarnation of Jesus, God in flesh, changes everything. But Advent reveals our need. We need a savior, we needed God to take on flesh because our flesh is too weak. Our darkness overwhelms us. Without Jesus we are lost. The yearning and fasting and struggle of Advent is relieved by Christmas. Christmas is better understood when you've let yourself experience Advent.

So this Advent, feel the tension. Sit in the darkness. Find a way to fast or practice waiting in a way that is meaningful to you. Don't rush into Christmas but instead wait for it. And when Christmas comes, rejoice with your whole heart!

Emmanuel, God is with us. He came for us, He comes for us, and He will come again. Alleluia!


