As our grandkids have gotten older, we have changed the activities we have done with them. Peek-a-boo gave way to the Wii. Preschool song-fests have long been replaced by Jr. High choir and band concerts. Little kids kicking-free-for-all soccer is now travel league football and basketball. Dance recitals have become theatre performances and serious cheer competitions.

So as Easter approached, the parents of the grands suggested that maybe the kids have outgrown the traditional Easter egg hunt. Cathie went straight to the kids themselves for a verdict. "Do you want to hunt Easter eggs on Easter?" she asked on the Grandkids Only group chat. "Duh, YESSSS!!!!!" was the reply. The allure of chocolate and sweet tarts can still overcome the apathy of tween and young-teen angst! It gives me hope for the future.

Also giving me hope for the future is the turn in the weather and the turn of the calendar page which usher in both the season of Spring and the season of Easter. We are reminded of the promise of new beginnings and the glorious resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Easter, the holiest and most joyous occasion in the Christian calendar, is here, and with it comes a timeless tale that embodies the spirit of renewal and hope—the legend of the Easter egg.

# **Church Council**



Relationships and responsibilities are two reasons why members are active in their church community. Your church family forms as you serve, support, and socialize with one another. This is my sixth – and last – year with the best role on Church Council: Liaison for Serve Ministries. This month I want to highlight these ministries with you!

Fellowship helps build a community, so socializing is vital to RLC!

- Guys' Night Out meets for food and beverages on the last Thursday of the month.
- R&R is open to any adults and meets at homes to mingle over finger foods and drinks.
- PrimeTimers are our "mature" members who meet on the second Wednesday at Norma's Café.
- Oktoberfest is our celebration of German heritage in our patio in September (*natürlich*).

<u>Sunday Morning Fellowship</u> satisfies our sweet tooth, caffeine fix and a good excuse to hang around after the <u>Sunday</u> worship service.

<u>Women of RLC</u> is the women's ministry of our church open to all women and led by its own Board. They organize special programs and fundraisers throughout the year, including everyone's favorite:

- Chili Cook-off & Quilt Bingo in January
- Pie Fest for Thanksgiving
- Katie Boxes in March
- Bunco in July.
- Their most active ministry is the <u>Cover Girls</u> sewing group who quilt all year for Lutheran World Relief and area
  nonprofits serving children, as well as crafting for their annual Christmas sales.
- Other ministries include the Women's Book Discussion and the Jigsaw Puzzle Library.

**Community Outreach** is doing God's work with our hands: loving our neighbors and improving our communities. Our traditional community service activities include:

- <u>"God's work. Our hands" Sunday</u> is the ELCA's day of service held on the second Sunday of September when we come together to work on projects that support numerous organizations.
- Angel Tree is an opportunity to provide Christmas presents to community members who may not otherwise have a
  joyful holiday with gifts.
- Blood drives are scheduled on 4-5 Sundays throughout the year with Carter BloodCare so we can save lives... which you can do on <u>April 7</u>!

#### Food drives for special events:

- Souper Bowl of Caring in February
- Partners including Minnie's Food Pantry and the Mount Olive Food Pantry take place throughout the year.

<u>Share the Care</u> is the umbrella term for our caring ministries, especially those that serve our members who are facing emergency, short-term financial needs.

<u>Stephen Ministry</u> equips lay people to provide confidential, one-to-one Christian care to individuals in our congregation and community who are experiencing difficulties in their lives.

- ◆ Emergency Financial Needs can provide up to \$500 once per year to assist a member in paying a vital bill.
- Transportation Team volunteers give rides to members, primarily to medical appointments and to church.
- Memorial Receptions are organized by volunteers who provide food and assist with set-up and serving at a member's memorial.

Prayer Chain requests can be submitted for or by anyone inside or outside of our membership.

These ministries are essential at RLC and rely on many volunteers who dutifully carry out these responsibilities. And you're in luck – they all need more volunteers and participants! As you read through the rest of this issue of *The Butterflier*, look for ways you may feel called to **Serve**...

To celebrate 50 years of service, we are inviting the congregation to do service together every month. Our April community service project involves creation care - a pre-Earth Day litter cleanup on our campus and surrounding streets, creek, park and schools. We'll provide the supplies, you provide an hour or two of your time to do some spring cleaning around the neighborhood on Sunday, **April 21st**, starting at **8:00 am**. #### The Easter Season: A Time for Hope



Right after Christmas, everyone started talking about how early Easter was going to be. After New Year's Eve, when we were actually in 2024, it seemed to be coming very early. And when Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day were the same, Easter seemed right around the corner. Frankly, I was glad it was going to be early.

I find the time from January 1st to the beginning of Lent boring. The days are short; every day is humdrum. If the weather is bad and you are homebound because it is too difficult to get out, you get depressed. If you can get out and still have nothing exciting (between holidays) to do, you can get really depressed.

When Lent comes, I get energized. I know it is a time of reflection, but while reflecting, I feel the hope of the coming Easter. I like the steadiness of the mid-week services with the Holden Evening Service. When Maundy Thursday arrives, we are reminded of Christ the servant in the washing of the feet before we remember the first sharing of the bread and wine of the Last Supper. And then, on Good Friday, we feel the suffering of Christ on the cross and realize what a sacrifice God made in sending his Son to us. Many years ago, I went through a rough time which began right at the beginning of Lent. As I look back, I realize that Lent gave me a time to stop and think. It gave me a reason to reflect. That year when Easter came, I felt like a weight had been lifted from me. That time of introspection made me open to moving forward with my life. I'm sure that is why Easter is my favorite holiday.

If you are not feeling the joy of Easter, please consider getting a Stephen Minister. Your Stephen Minister will listen to you, encourage you, and pray for you. Everything you share together is confidential. Resurrection Lutheran has a whole group of great people willing to listen; willing to help. We want to share the joy of Easter all year.

Women's Book Discussion

Saturday, April 6th— 9:00 am

Our Women's Book Discussion on Saturday, April 6th, will be on Kristin Hannah's The Women. As usual we meet at 9:00 am for coffee and social time and will get down to business at 9:30 am. All women are welcome!

Here is a short summary of the selection:

Women can be heroes. When twenty-year-old nursing student Frances "Frankie" McGrath hears these words, it is a revelation. Raised in the sun-drenched, idyllic world of Southern California and sheltered by her conservative parents, she has always prided herself on doing the right thing. But in 1965, the world is changing, and she WOM! suddenly dares to imagine a different future for herself. When her brother ships out to serve in Vietnam, she joins the Army Nurse Corps and follows his path.



As green and inexperienced as the men sent to Vietnam to fight, Frankie is over-whelmed by the chaos and destruction of war. Each day is a gamble of life and death, hope and betrayal; friendships run deep and can be shattered in an instant. In war, she meets—and becomes one of—the lucky, the brave, the broken, and the lost.

But war is just the beginning for Frankie and her veteran friends. The real battle lies in coming home to a changed and divided America, to angry protesters, and to a country that wants to forget Vietnam.

The Women is the story of one woman gone to war, but it shines a light on all women who put themselves in harm's way and whose sacrifice and commitment to their country has too often been forgotten. A novel about deep friendships and bold patriotism, *The Women* is a richly drawn story with a memorable heroine whose idealism and courage under fire define a generation.

# **Communion Bread**




## **Bread Wanted**

### Thrivent Financial

#### **ACTION TEAM PROJECTS FOR 2024**

Are you a benefit member of Thrivent? If so, we could use your help in applying to Thrivent for seed money for a number of service projects and fundraisers at Resurrection Lutheran. It is a quick and easy way to bring in additional funding to Resurrection's annual budget. There are currently about 75 Thrivent benefit members at Resurrection. Each benefit member can have up to two projects per year each funded by a \$250 pre-paid VISA card. Associate members can have up to one project per year.
