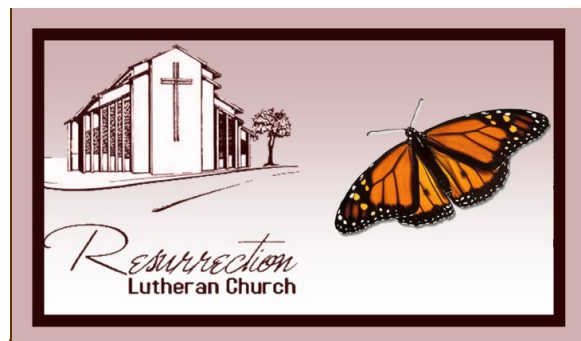

As you know, Cathie and I had the good fortune to join a few other church members on a trip to France in October. Cathie and I went over a few days early to “do Paris” on our own. (No, we were not involved in the robbery at the Louvre.) Then we joined the others for a trip down the Rhone River from Lyon to Arles. We ended our adventure with a day in Nice and a tour of Monaco.

Now, we had been to Europe several times and I had spent four summers there in my 20's working in Germany and touring. But this time was different. During my time in Germany, I saw a lot of sights, but nearly everything, it seemed, was either built or rebuilt after WWII. The war had really taken a toll on the antiquities of Germany.

But in southern France, things were OLD! We strolled through streets that dated back to the 9th and 10th centuries. We visited churches that were built in 1100 AD. We were at the Palace of the Popes in Avignon, from which the popes of the Roman Catholic Church ruled in the 12th century. We saw Pont du Gard, a Roman aqueduct, mostly intact, that was built while Paul was writing his letters to the early churches in 40-60 AD. It was amazing just how ancient this part of European civilization was.

Now, when we think about the Middle Ages or the ancient civilization in Rome or Greece or even Jerusalem, we often think about how backward and unsophisticated they must have been. Life was no picnic, to be sure. The average life expectancy in the middle ages was in the 30's...only the rich lived longer. Yet, their sophistication and, indeed, their engineering were a marvel.

The hills along the Rhone were heavily terraced, cut in neat steps and held in place by stone walls that were built by these people some 1000 years ago. They stand as sturdy today as they did centuries ago.

That aqueduct over the Gard River is as high at the Statue of Liberty, as long as three 747's and made entirely of stone. That stone was quarried some 20 miles away. Each block was cut by hand and hoisted into place by human labor. The whole structure was put together without a single trowel of mortar. It is all precisely cut stone against precisely cut stone, and it's still sturdy after 2000 years of use.

The ancients had running water, flush toilets, four+ story homes, and centralized heating. We saw 1000 year old wooden doors still in daily use, 15th century brass key locks used daily and modes of defense that kept both the rich and the poor safe from marauders.

Oh yeah, and there was one other striking detail. In every village, in every town, in every palace and in every corner of the land, there was a church. Many of those chapels and churches have been in constant use since their building centuries ago, hosting generations of worshippers and filling them with the light and life of Christ.

These people were deeply religious. We may think of the 1950's as the heyday of American religion, or remember the 16th century and Martin Luther as a time of religiosity, but the “unsophisticated and backward” peoples of the Middle Ages were a people of worship.

In Beaune, for example, we visited a hospital and hospice that had within it a lovely chapel. That chapel was built in a corner of the building that led directly to where the ill and dying were housed. That was on purpose, so that everyone, even in their infirmity, might be able to hear the Mass. It is not unlike the reason we stream our services today.

I hope that in 1500 years, people visiting the ancient land of America will be able to discover our deep devotion of God. To see in the artifacts we have left behind the love we had for the Lord and the love and grace that our God had bestowed on us. Let's make that our mission!

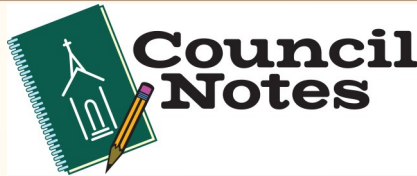

Church Council



In theology, the term **witness** is integral to the understanding of God's covenant with humanity. Witnessing means to proclaim the gospel, and work to establish truth and justice in the community.

To Christians, being a witness involves living out the truths of the gospel and verbally proclaiming them. It also means demonstrating the love of Christ in our daily lives.

At Resurrection Lutheran Church, we certainly witness in all areas of our Church lives. We witness through **worship** with its uplifting music, liturgies, prayers, and sermons. We witness through all of the special **learn** programs like Sunday School for children and adults, Bible Study, and VBS. We witness through our acts of **service** to the wider community through our beautiful Cover Girls quilts, School Supply Project, Angel Tree gifts, God's Work, Our Hands projects. We witness through our **support** of the church facility by maintaining and improving the interior and exterior of our physical building. We witness through the **stewardship** of our time and talents supporting all of the ministries of the church!

However, the Church Council has designated a **witness** liaison to report to the Council about the specific ministries in this area. The first important committee in this area is the Care Team. It's members identify those in our congregation that are elderly, homebound, experiencing significant illnesses or loss, or just friends that they have missed seeing in worship regularly. Then, they make phone calls, send cards, visit, bake cookies, and take meals to share the love of Christ with them.

Another important part of the Witness team is the greeters that welcome all who enter our Church doors. Everyone appreciates a cheery hello and a handshake or fist bump to welcome visitors or regular members to our service. It is a great way to meet new people and make them feel comfortable in our building.

Also under this umbrella is the Welcome Committee that seeks out first time visitors, greets them, and gives them a mug filled with candy. They also set up an information meeting when visitors want to become a part of our Church and provide cake and coffee when they officially join!

Communication is also a very important part of witnessing. The wonderful monthly Butterflifer, the weekly Good News, the Church website, the email reminders all witness to the vitality and energy necessary to support our programs and keep our community thriving.

So where do you fit in? Are you interested in becoming a part of one of these important ministries?

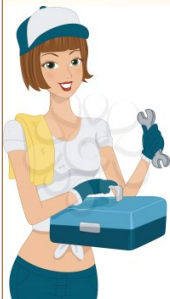

Stephen Ministry



Each of us, at some point in our lives, senses a deep emptiness—what many have called a “God-shaped hole.” It’s that ache in the heart that no amount of success, possessions, or even human love can fully satisfy. As people of faith in the ELCA Lutheran tradition, we understand this longing as part of our created nature. We were made for relationship with God, and only God can fill that space within us.

Scripture reminds us of this truth. In Psalm 42:1–2, the psalmist cries, “As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God.” Jesus echoes this deep invitation when He says, “Whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst” (John 4:14). Our human attempts to fill the void—with busyness, achievement, or distractions—only leave us thirstier. Christ alone offers the living water that satisfies.

In the Gospel of John 14:27, Jesus promises, “Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you.” That peace is not the absence of struggle but the presence of Christ Himself—filling our emptiness with purpose, forgiveness, and hope. The Apostle Paul reminds us in Philippians 4:7 that this peace “surpasses all understanding,” guarding our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

As Stephen Ministers, we have the privilege of walking beside those who are struggling with that emptiness—whether through grief, loneliness, illness, or life transitions. We are not therapists or problem-solvers; we are compassionate companions who listen, pray, and remind others of God’s abiding love. Through confidential care and Christ-centered presence, we help care receivers recognize that the longing they feel is not a flaw to fix, but a holy invitation to draw closer to God.

When we allow Christ to fill our God-shaped hole, we experience not only healing but transformation. The same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead now dwells in us (Romans 8:11), renewing our hearts daily. In that renewal, we discover that what once felt empty can now overflow—with grace, love, and the peace that only God can give.

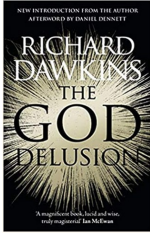

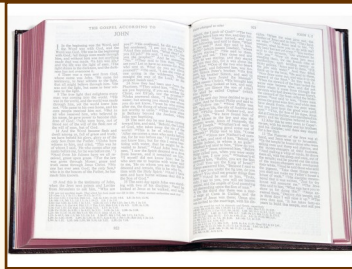
Richard Dawkins, The God Delusion Or not!

A new offering from David Pruesner continues on **November 2nd, 9th, and 16th**, located in Room 1. Reading the book is optional.

Richard Dawkins, author and scientist, submits that belief in God is delusional. In his book, *The God Delusion*, he advances several arguments that belief in God is irrational. He concludes that our world is random; having neither design nor designer. Others disagree. Scientists, including Carl Sagan and Sir Fred Hoyle, have insisted that our universe is not random. Instead, our universe is “intelligent.” And, our universe seems to have been “finely tuned” to make both physical matter and life possible. If any of a dozen factors (such as the strength of the “gravitational constant” or nature of Carbon 12 had been different), then life would not exist on earth. The Christian conclusion: our universe seems to have been “finely tuned” by a creator, i.e. God.

All of these scientists focus only on the physical world - the world that can be objectively tested and measured. However, as philosophy, psychology, and religion constantly remind us, there is another world. The great French scientist Blaise Pascal taught that we live in two worlds. He was a fervent Christian. He taught that one world is our physical world, which we experience via our rational mind and empirical examination. The other is an unseen world, which we experience via intuitive knowledge. This unseen world holds “matters of the heart” and includes philosophy, love, justice, and our faith in God. Under Pascal’s philosophy, intuitive matters of the heart are just as authentic as the scientific/empirical world. Pascal saw no conflict between his faith and his rational/scientific pursuits. They are both instrumental in finding truth. C.S. Lewis also pursued this line of inquiry - looking in to our intuition for insight. In his writings, he refers to “Right and Wrong as a Clue to the Meaning of the Universe.” He logically deduces that our omnipresent sense of right and wrong – which spans all civilizations – is a major “clue” to the fact that our universe had a purposeful creator.

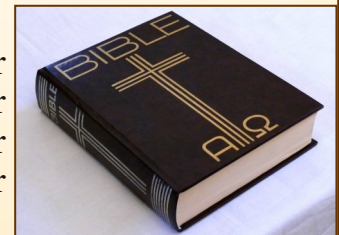

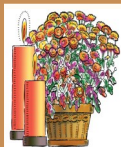

ACTION TEAM PROJECTS FOR 2025
