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# Pastor Bill's Page



Every 500 years or so, it's time for a change.

Let's start back about 2000 years. That's when our journey as Christians began with the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. In just three years, Jesus changed the whole course of humanity, calling all to a life devoted to God the Father. He, himself, was singularly focused on the Father (read through the Gospel of John and you'll get an inkling of how connected he was). Those who knew him knew that he was truly God's Son and built the Church on their belief in him.

Skip forward about 500 years. Those who knew Jesus first hand were long gone. Only their writings and the oral traditions remained. Still, the Church flourished even as generations tried to stamp it out. But now, centuries after Christ walked the earth, the leaders of the people had come to believe in Jesus and to collect his stories and the writings about him. They were codified in the Bible. In an effort to coalesce the nascent Church around who Jesus was and how he related to the Father and the Holy Spirit, the early Church leaders met to formulate a statement of faith – a creed. They met in Nicaea in AD 325. More work was done in Constantinople in AD 381. And there, about 500 years or so after Jesus, the Nicene Creed was born. It is essentially the same one we use today. Well, almost.

Skip forward to the AD 1050's. The Latin Church was faced with many heresies, including one called Arianism. Arian taught that Jesus wasn't truly divine. To counter this, the Latin Church added a word to the third article of the Nicene Creed: "filioque," or "and the Son." In the Latin Church they confessed that the Holy Spirit proceeded "from the Father and the Son," ensuring that Jesus was on equal footing with the Father. The Eastern Orthodox Church protested this insertion. That one word became a stumbling block and was a contributing factor to the Great Schism that separated the Eastern Church from the Western Church in AD 1054.

Some 500 years later, another reformer, Dr. Martin Luther, had issues with the Latin Church. His focus was not on the filioque, but on issues of leadership, polity, transparency and access in the Church. His followers broke away from the Latin Church and formed their own denominations, taking with them many of the traditions of the Latin Church including the altered Nicene Creed.

Skipping ahead once more, we find ourselves in the late 20<sup>th</sup> and early 21<sup>st</sup> centuries. In these modern times, various Churches across the world have been looking for ways to come together in their service to God and their understanding of theology. For the past 40 years, the Lutheran World Federation and the Orthodox Church have been in conversation about finding common ground. In 2024, they came to an agreement on the matter of the filioque. In an effort to heal the "age-old divisions between [these two] communities," and to further a "renewed focus on Trinitarian theology in the life of churches," both bodies have agreed to emphasize the translation of the original Greek Creed first formulated in Nicaea and Constantinople, without the filioque. Further, they encourage "renewed theological reflection on the Trinity and the role of the Holy Spirit" every time the Creed is confessed.

"What is that to us?" you might ask. Well, in keeping with Luther's understanding that "the Church is always reforming," we will begin using the Nicene Creed without the words "and the Son" beginning on our next festival Sunday, Reformation. That option is already a part of our cranberry Evangelical Lutheran Worship's offerings. Those words are footnoted in the Nicene Creed and the footnote reads: "Or, 'who proceeds from the Father.' The phrase 'and the Son' is a latter addition to the creed." So with that, we will be taking one more step in the building up of God's Kingdom on Earth which is the Church!

I can't wait to see what the next 500 years hold!

### Celebrating 10 Years of Music and Ministry: The 10th Anniversary of the Pipe Organ Installation



As we approach the 10th anniversary of the installation of our beloved pipe organ, it is a fitting moment to reflect on the story behind this extraordinary gift to our church. Falling on Reformation Sunday, this anniversary serves as a celebration not just of the instrument itself, but of God's timing, the generosity of spirit, and the collective effort that brought it into being.

The journey to installing the pipe organ at RLC began long before the first pipe was ever unloaded. One key figure in making this vision a reality was George Schuler, a longtime member of the church whose generous donation helped set the wheels in motion for the organ project. His gift was the spark that ignited what would become a remarkable journey of collaboration.

But there were other key moments and individuals who played vital roles. Shelbie Simmons, the church's organist at the time, was an enthusiastic advocate for bringing an organ to the church. Shelbie's vision for a vibrant worship experience and the musical leadership she provided during her time at Resurrection were invaluable in pushing this project forward. Then, when Jim Loeffler came on board as organist, his deep spiritual and musical gifts brought a fresh vision and a new energy to the endeavor. It is clear that the Holy Spirit was at work through God's perfect timing and the people He brought together for this purpose.

Before it found its home at RLC, the pipe organ resided at Preston Hollow Presbyterian Church. It was a beautiful instrument but in need of restoration to fully meet the demands of the church's vibrant worship. This is where the Rueter Organ Company of Kansas came in. Renowned for their expertise in restoring and refurbishing organs, the company carefully restored the instrument, ensuring that it would be ready to serve our congregation for many years to come.

In September 2015, the refurbished organ was finally ready to make its way to RLC. The task of preparing our worship space for the organ was no small feat. Our sanctuary underwent extensive remodeling to ensure that it could properly accommodate the organ and its components. This process was led by project manager Ron Meyer.

Volunteers from the church came together to help unload the organ's many components: the pipes, the console, and all the other elements that would make the organ whole. It was a shared effort, a reflection of the community's collective commitment to bringing this powerful tool of worship to life.

The 10 year anniversary celebration on Reformation Sunday will not just be a time to reflect on the history of the organ but also a time to rejoice in its continuing ministry. This milestone is more than just a celebration of an instrument; it is a testament to God's provision and the faithful work of His people. The pipe organ at RLC is a reminder of how God works in powerful ways, through His timing and the collective efforts of His people, to bring beauty, joy, and meaning to our worship. May it continue to be a source of spiritual enrichment for the entire congregation in the years to come.

# Stephen Ministry




32 years ago, a book was published which took the world by storm. The original Chicken Soup for the Soul was what everyone seemed to need. 1993 was the year of the bombing of the World Trade Center, the siege in Waco, the Storm of the Century Blizzard, and the great floods of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers. That's just the big stuff! We were introduced to Jurassic Park and the World Wide Web was released to the public domain. It is easy to see why everyone was drawn to inspirational and motivational messaging. But why the title of "Chicken Soup". Doh! Everyone knows that chicken soup is a cure for anything.

Lutherans have always been drawn to food. We are famous for our potlucks. If you grew up in a Scandinavian area, you might have noticed one strange thing about potlucks. According to the book, Scandinavian Humor and Other Myths, the food at Lutheran potlucks was always white except for the Jello dishes of many colors and types. (Remember the Jello dish with shaved carrots in it and a dab of mayonnaise on top?) But white food or not, we all went to the dinners because they gave us a sense of well-being and community. We needed each other and food brought us together.

We still need each other. When we are grieving, people bring food. When we are lonely, people bring food. When we are celebrating, people bring food. But the most important word in each of those sentences is not "food". It is "we". We need each other. That is one reason the Stephen Ministers ministry was organized. It is a formal way of organizing the "we" to help others by being there when they are grieving, lonely or celebrating. We are there to listen and support. We may not bring food but our presence can have the same effect of love and warmth.

If you are in need of emotional support of any kind, call the church and ask to be set up with a Stephen Minister. That is much better than ordering one of the 232 <u>Chicken Soup for the Soul books now on the market!</u> And...we've been around 50 years!

# God's Work, Our Hands

A lot of activity happened during "God's work. Our hands." Sunday as shown below. Additionally, many others did God's work by fulfilling their roles during worship, weeding, building maintenance, making food, driving people to church, and just being awesome. We should all be proud of RLC's contributions within our church, our region, and our world!

- Aluminum: 130 pounds of aluminum plus 339 pounds of scrap metal added an extra \$119 to the AOF fund.
- Blood: 15 units were donated at the blood drive, including two units from first-time donors! FYI – last 2025 blood drive is November 16.
- Care Team: team members did their own project making goodie bags and delivering them to a dozen of our homebound members.
- Letters Against Isolation: 42 letters were written to seniors in nursing homes and Meals on Wheels recipients. (Talk to Cathie Irons about doing this the rest of the year.)
- Litter: 10 heavy bags of trash plus a decent collection of recyclables were removed from sites in the neighborhood: creek bed in Evans Park, Park Blvd, and around the former CVS on 15<sup>th</sup>.
- Lovepacs boxes: 35 boxes used by Lovepacs for food deliveries were decorated by members of all ages.
- Lovepacs donations: 220 boxes of mac & cheese, 140 cans of tuna and 10 cans of chicken were given to Lovepacs Plano.
- Pet beds: 9 beds were donated to the Plano Animal Shelter.
- Potluck: over 70 people enjoyed the bountiful potluck.
   Special thanks to the crews who set up, washed dishes, and cleaned up afterwards.
- Quilts: 10 kid's quilts were tied and three more started.
   Additionally, we blessed 204 quilts during the worship service made by the talented Cover Girls that will be distributed around the world through Lutheran World Relief.

After lunch, everyone split up into their service project groups and then beautiful things happened. I overheard people introducing themselves to fellow members and building upon the foundation of our community. Kids were lovingly and meticulously decorating boxes destined to hold food for other kids. The room was full of relaxed chatter that we don't experience on a typical Sunday. Priceless!
