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# Pastor Bill's Page



One of the tasks that I take on across the church is that of IT Master. Keeping the internet working, helping everyone with computer problems, and maintaining our web site are all things that I have taken on and that I really enjoy. Lately, I have been upgrading everyone's desktop computers because they are becoming obsolete.

Not to bore you with details, but Microsoft has decided that they are no longer going to support the long lived and very stable Windows 10 platform. They are going to put all of their energy in to Windows 11 and whatever might be next. That means that machines that run Windows 10 will soon become vulnerable to attacks and viruses because Microsoft will no longer be supplying security updates. That's not good for the church. Seven years ago we had a ransomware incident at church and had all of our computers locked down for a week or so. Fortunately, your IT Master kept backups and we didn't have to pay thousands of dollars to get up and running again. But it did take time.

Well, this time around we need to upgrade our computers to Windows 11 to stay protected and there's the rub. You see, our computers are too old to update. They simply won't run Windows 11. Fortunately, "I know a guy." There is a company in San Antonio that recycles business computers—cheap! I was able to replace all of our essential machines for just over \$3500, Windows 11 included!

It's all part of what one might call "planned obsolescence." That's a business strategy that intentionally limits the useful life of a product, either through engineering it to fail or by making it seem outdated, to encourage repeated purchases and boost sales. And it works. This is the second time in my 10 years here that we have had to update our computers. In 5 years, we'll probably have to do it again.

So how is it that the church has been going for over 2000 years and we have never had to completely change? How has the church avoided obsolescence? How has it not lost its meaning and its edge?

To be sure, there have been transformations. The Reformation probably was the biggest of all, but one could also point to the split between the Roman Catholic and the Orthodox church, or the emergence of various denominations across the centuries. But more than responding to developing theology or cultural changes, I think that there is a deeper reason that the church has not fallen into obscurity.

In our Thursday Noon Bible Study (which is open to all – not just women!), we have been studying the Gospel of John. In Chapter 14, Jesus makes the announcement that he is sending an Advocate, the Holy Spirit, to continue his work after he physically leaves this earthy realm. That's interesting in light of Jesus saying throughout John's Gospel how he and the Father are one. To know Jesus is to know the Father, he says; one is an extension of the other. With the coming of the Holy Spirit, the movement of God into our world continues. The people of God have had a connection with the Father since creation itself. That relationship continued through the prophets and the scriptures of the Old Testament. Jesus took up the mantle with his ministry and added his salvific work to the Father's. After his ascension, the Holy Spirit came to God's people at Pentecost to continue the work of the Trinity unabated.

That's why there has been no reboot of the church, no need for a makeover. It is because the Master himself, our Three-in-One God, has always been there to support, uphold, sanctify and empower God's people. There is no planned obsolescence in the Kingdom of God, because the Master of all has been with us all along and will be with us forever! The church cannot become obsolete, even as it changes, because it is the embodiment of the Father's love and work as poured out through the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. To that we can all say, AMEN!

#### Council Report from Facilities Maintenance Liaison Mark Waterman


I'm the person that keeps the Church Council informed about RLC building and grounds maintenance and repair, and related expenses. I also work with RLC's contractors for HVAC, lighting, plumbing, landscaping, fire prevention, and pest control. Another of my tasks is to form an ongoing maintenance team of congregation members, some of whom might be willing to take responsibility for certain areas of maintenance. Such tasks as changing lightbulbs, cleaning downspouts and gutters, setting light timers, handling basic plumbing problems, nipping sprouts off the photinias on the south edge and the trees are needed regularly.

Currently about 12 of our congregation are on a volunteer team with a range of talents, skills, and interests. Some volunteers meet the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of each month to do maintenance tasks, and some come at random times through the week, as their schedule allows, to do specific tasks. Sylvia Meyer heads the Landscape Team and can use more volunteers. Team Trimmer, led by me, trims trees and bushes and cleans up fallen limbs, cuts and sprays vines a few times a year. All the work and effort is appreciated! Two people who deserve special thanks are Charles Mauney and John Hoffman. Both are skilled, talented, and experienced in multiple areas, and both continue to put in a lot of volunteer hours each month.

We chose this house to worship our God and therefore we are privileged to steward it. If you are able to help keep our beautiful facility in tip top shape, please contact me. # Stephen Ministry



#### There's not a word yet for old friends who've just met. Paul Williams

For a lyric sung to the sky by a crooked-nosed puppet who's possibly an alien, this is a striking expression of the joy of connecting. The song, "I'm Going to Go Back There Someday," was written by composer and songwriter Paul Williams and performed by Gonzo (David Goelz) in "The Muppet Movie." In this context, Gonzo twists the emotional paradox even further, as he's longingly awaiting a friend he's yet to meet. Blending hope and grief, he reveals a sense of connection with a kind of presence — a kindred spirit — just beyond his reach. Years later, the presence he longed for finally emerges in the movie "Muppets From Space" — it's his home planet, reaching out after having tracked him down. His emotional journey reflects a universal desire for connection. It assures us of old friends looking to finally meet us, serving as a reminder that ultimately, we're never alone. (Optimism Media, August 9, 2025)

We know the value of friendship. We know our friends listen to us, encourage us, and accept us the way we are. We are very lucky when we have good friends who are there for us. Unfortunately, sometimes those friends are not available. Sometimes we are searching like Gonzo for someone new to come into our lives. This yet to be named friend, would be someone who would listen without judgement and keep every information shared in confidence. That new friend could very well be a Stephen Minister. A Stephen Minister does not intend on taking the place of friends you have at work or at church. A Stephen Minister may morph into a friend, but the main purpose is to be a non-judgmental listener who is "there" for you.

Carole King probably defined the Stephen Minister best in her song "You've Got A Friend" in 1971.

When you're down and troubled
And you need a helping hand
And nothing, nothing is going right
Close your eyes and think of me
And soon I will be there
To brighten up even your darkest night
You just call out my name
And you know wherever I am
I'll come running, oh yeah baby, to see you again
Winter, spring, summer or fall
All you've got to do is call
And I'll be there, ye, ye, ye
You've got a friend

If you are going through a hard time, or if you just need to talk to someone, call the church and ask to be connected to a Stephen Minister. Everything is kept in confidence and you will have someone to share your concerns.

If a Stephen Minister had to adopt a motto, I would vote for a line from an article in the Dallas Morning News by Christopher de Vinck.

"One kind word, one tender gesture, one word of encouragement will open the heavy door for someone who needs to be loved." That word, that gesture, that encouragement might just come from a Stephen Minister.




## Women's Book Discussion

# Women's Book Discussion Saturday, September 13th 9:00 am

Our next women's book discussion will be held September 13th on <u>The Queen of Sugar Hill: A Novel of Hattie McDaniel—The Untold Story of Hattie McDaniel's Life and Legacy.</u>

Bestselling author ReShonda Tate presents a fascinating fictional portrait of Hattie McDaniel, one of Hollywood's most prolific but woefully underappreciated stars—and the first Black person ever to win an Oscar for her role as Mammy in the critically acclaimed classic film *Gone With the Wind*.

It was supposed to be the highlight of her career, the pinnacle for which she'd worked all her life. And as Hattie McDaniel took the stage in 1940 to claim an honor that would make her the first African-American woman to win an Academy Award, she tearfully took her place in history. Between personal triumphs and tragedies, heartbreaking losses, and severe setbacks, this historic night of winning best supporting actress for her role as the sassy Mammy in the controversial movie *Gone With the Wind* was going to be life -changing. Or so she thought.



Months after winning the award, not only did the Oscar curse set in where Hattie couldn't find work, but she found herself thrust in the middle of two worlds—Black and White—and not being welcomed in either. Whites only saw her as Mammy and Blacks detested the demeaning portrayal. As the NAACP waged an all-out war against Hattie and actors like her, the emotionally conflicted actor found herself struggling daily.

Through it all, Hattie continued her fight to pave a path for other Negro actors, while focusing on war efforts, fighting housing discrimination, and navigating four failed marriages. Luckily, she had a core group of friends to help her out—from Clark Gable to Louise Beavers to Ruby Berkley Goodwin and Dorothy Dandridge.

The Queen of Sugar Hill brings to life the powerful story of one woman who was driven by many passions—ambition, love, sex, family, friendship, and equality. In re-creating Hattie's story, ReShonda Tate delivers an unforgettable novel of resilience, dedication, and determination—about what it takes to achieve your dreams—even when everything—and everyone—is against you.

# Volunteers Needed


