Pastor Bill's Page



A few Sundays ago I talked about Peter and his confession that Jesus was the Messiah. Peter got the answer right. When Jesus asked, “Who do you say that I am?” Peter didn't hesitate: “You are the Messiah.” But then things got a little complicated.

Jesus began explaining what being the Messiah actually meant...that he would suffer and be rejected and He would be killed. Peter didn't like that answer one bit. He took Jesus aside and rebuked him. Peter knew who Jesus was, but he didn't yet understand what that meant.

I suggested back then that we may have the same problem. It is pretty easy to say what we believe. We can recite the Apostles' Creed. We can come to worship. We can sing the hymns and say the prayers. We can say, “Jesus is Lord.” But what happens when we walk out the church door?

James 1:22 puts it rather bluntly: “Be doers of the word, and not merely hearers.” In other words, our faith isn't just something we say. It is something we do.

Which brings us to September 13 and the ELCA's annual “God's Work. Our Hands.” Sunday. I love that name. It says something important about what it means to be the church. God is at work in the world, and remarkably, God chooses to work through people like us.

And you'll have plenty of opportunities to put your hands to work. Some of us will give blood. Some will make quilts. Some will write letters to people who may be lonely. Some will assemble craft kits for children in the hospital. Others will make fidget mats for people living with dementia, collect food for Lovepacs, decorate food boxes, make pet beds, clean up litter, or help care for members of our own congregation. And, of course, there will be a potluck. Because apparently even God's work requires carbohydrates.

But here's the thing I hope we don't miss: “God's Work. Our Hands.” isn't really about one Sunday. Sure, September 13 gives us a chance to put our faith into action together, and that's a wonderful thing. But being “doers of the word” is supposed to be an everyday activity. Sometimes doing God's work looks like volunteering for a church project. Sometimes it looks like visiting someone who is lonely. Sometimes it means listening to a friend who needs someone to hear them. It might mean helping a neighbor, forgiving someone, encouraging a discouraged coworker, making a phone call, sharing a meal, or simply noticing someone who could use a little kindness.

Most of those things won't make the evening news. They probably won't even make the church newsletter. But they matter—a lot.

A quilt can bring warmth to someone we've never met. A letter can remind someone that they haven't been forgotten. A bag of groceries can make a difficult week a little easier. A few hours spent cleaning up our neighborhood can make it a better place. A kind word at just the right moment can change someone's entire day. We may never know what God does with the little things we do. And maybe that's part of the point.

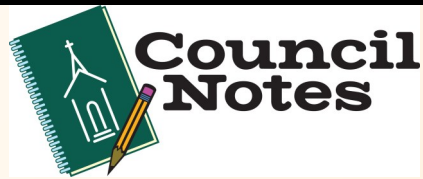
Peter wanted to know what it meant for Jesus to be the Messiah. Jesus showed him that it meant a life of self-giving love and service. James reminds us that hearing God's Word isn't enough; we're called to live it.

So let's put our hands to work on September 13. But when the GWOH T-shirts go back in the closet, let's keep going. Because God's work doesn't end when the project is finished. God's work happens wherever we encounter another person who needs a little grace, kindness, compassion, or help.

We confess that Jesus is the Messiah. Now let's see what that confession looks like when we put it to work.

God's work. Our hands. Every day.

I'm sure that many, if not most, of us are feeling the strain of managing our family budgets these days. We pull our belts in, deny ourselves some of the "non-essentials" and pray for relief from somewhere, please Lord!

Unfortunately, we are feeling the strain in our church budget, also. At the end of July, we are in the **RED** for the year by \$55,672.86! July expenses alone were \$53,203.56 with income for the month of only \$30,624.73. That is the lowest monthly income we have had in the last year and a half. The average over that time being \$46,000. That's cause for concern! Unlike our individual households, we don't have the luxury of just "tightening our belts". Our annual budget is pretty bare bones to begin with. Not much wiggle room. Utilities have to be paid, salaries have to be covered. We are very fortunate that insurance covered the cost of the rebuild of the fence and that the maintenance crew and boy scouts are able to handle minor repairs. But we have no breathing room for unexpected costs.

It's hard to hear, I know. But necessary! Are there ways that you can help? If you are one of those contributing only one time annually through an IRA RMD, could you perhaps look into changing that to quarterly? If you give through credit card, which costs fees for the church, could you do direct transaction from the bank? Could you dig a little deeper and contribute a little more? Please prayerfully consider your options!

Ever the optimist, I know we will pull through, but let's alleviate the day-to-day stress as we can!

Stephen Ministry



Did you know that the homeless population in Plano has increased 16.5% since 2022?

Did you know that the Plano schools identified over 1,000 homeless students in 2025?

As part of our continuing education for Stephen Ministers, we invited Melissa Davis, Director of Donor Relationships for a faith-based non-profit OurCalling, to tell us about their mission. Currently they are operating in downtown Dallas, but are working to open a street outreach ministry in Plano.

Their mission is to help people who are experiencing homelessness walk with Jesus, get off of the streets, and into healthy community. They use a smart phone app and a physical center to connect people with shelter, food, and medical care. Their goal is to find long term solutions to get people off of the streets.

These are their impact numbers for 2025:

- ✓ 1, 371 people were helped to find shelter off the streets
- ✓ 122,000 resources distributed
- ✓ 154,000 meals served
- ✓ 3,368 street outreach locations

As this organization moves to the Plano area, they are looking for groups that will help them in their ministry. Some members of our Stephen Ministry and Impact team will be touring the Dallas Facility later this month and exploring ways that our church can potentially get involved. Of course, they need donations of money, clothing, food, basic grooming aids, etc. They also need volunteers to physically serve meals, welcome guests, provide décor for tiny home communities they are building. They need people to use the app to identify homeless people in need and provide their street teams with a location. There are so many potential opportunities to express our concern and hope to our neighbors who are in need. How is God calling you to share his love?

We are celebrating the “Blessing of the LWR Quilts” on Sunday, September 13th, God’s Work, Our Hands Sunday.

The Lutheran World Relief quilts (approximately 185) will be in the Sanctuary, displayed as banners and across the pews for all to enjoy before they get shipped off to a Lutheran World Relief Warehouse in November. From there, the quilts get shipped to various parts of the world as disasters hit. Helping our neighbors across the continents is what Lutheran World Relief does. In fact, LWR is committed to bringing such relief to various areas within the United States also. **WE** have the Opportunity to be a part of that Mission. LWR commits to



bringing gifts such as - JOY, HOPE and Some Form of Normalcy to the people who receive them. Check out the LWR Website LWR.org to see where YOU might be able to play a PART in this MISSION by donating a monetary gift to help our Neighbors across the globe. Several times a year LWR promotes a “Matching” fund raiser, whereby every dollar you donate will double to serve those fighting disasters.

We will be finishing our summer mission project of sewing kid/baby quilts to donate back to non-profit agencies within our community in the Fall. We must have at least 75 quilts in inventory to donate. We are trying to clean out our stock of donated fabrics to sew donated quilts. In the Fall these quilts will be donated to: The Samaritan Inn/McKinney, The Children’s Medical Clinic – Wylie/Plano and the Plano Children’s Hospital. Let me know if you would like to be a part of this dedicated group of women by taking a project home to sew, we can arrange a pick up!



In the meantime, we are also focusing on sewing items for our Christmas Sale which starts around Thanksgiving timeline. More to follow in coming months.

School Supply Project

This was our 40th year providing school supplies for underprivileged Plano students. Thanks to all the tremendous support received, we were able to fill and distribute over 860 backpacks this year!! About 300 of them went to students who registered with the Assistance Center of Collin County, 200 were given to the Student, Family, and Community Services Department at PISD, 100 were distributed by Hope Restored, and the rest were requested by individual campuses in PISD.



It was a very busy 2 week period, but we were blessed with so many helpers along the way! Special thanks go to the Young Men's Service League who were joined by Max Hampton and Rita Fischer's grandson, Will. They were invaluable lifting heavy boxes, rolling heavy carts, and toting hundreds of backpacks in the heat to various schools.

So many church members came out to help us organize and pack all of those supplies. One day we had about 20 workers there, and they all were busy! Special thanks to Mike Sciascia for his recycling ministry, Lee Grosshans for supplying the carabineers, Jan Frum for providing all of the colorful grade level tags and grant money from Exxon Mobil, Cathie Irons for all of the phone calls, sweat equity, and grandchildren and driving, and especially Kathy Barrett for her organization and the relationship she has fostered with Walmart so we are able to get the best possible prices on supplies each year.

It really does take a village, and we are so appreciative of all who donated money, helped with packing and delivering, and supported us with your prayers. Thanks be to God for the love we are able to share in this needy world. Because of Him, we are able to do great things!

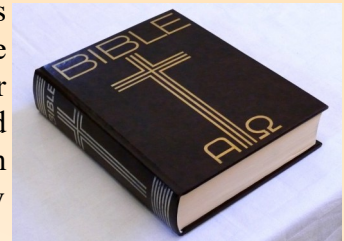

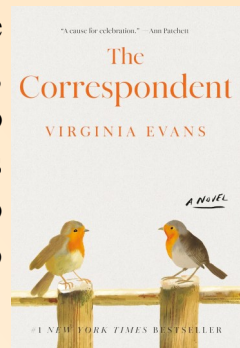

Here's a summary to get you intrigued!

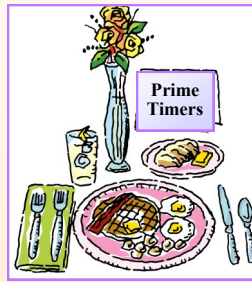

Sybil Van Antwerp's life of letters might be "a very small thing," but she also might be one of the most memorable characters you will ever read.

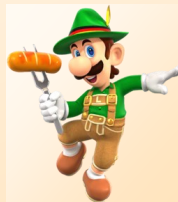
Fellowship

Aluminum Can Recycling

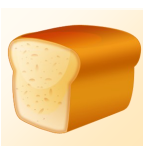


Can it in September

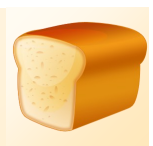
Mirror, mirror on the wall, who's the nonferrous of them all? Aluminum might not have a magnetic personality but we can't get enough of it! The next aluminum collection falls on September 6th during the Labor Day weekend. If you are heading out of town, drop your bags of cans (and scrap metal) at the west doors so the Aluminati can trade it all for cash for the AOF fund. So far in 2026, we have received **799 pounds** of aluminum cans worth \$635.

The Aluminati run this month had a variety of metals and a pretty high dollar amount. We had 110 lb. of aluminum cans (that fell this month to \$.64/lb.) and 42 lb. of other aluminum. And we had 300 lb. of steel. Also of note, copper and brass brought in \$40, so the total is \$181. Photographic evidence attached.

Christian Education

New Adult Education Classes Beginning This Fall.

Sunday, September 27th and Sunday, October 4th

(meets in Room 1 after worship)

Finding Your Roots: If you have ever wanted to learn more about your ancestors and their stories, but have no idea how to start, RLC will be offering a family history class on September 27th and October 4th that will jumpstart your journey. The hands-on sessions will help you grow your tree with the free website FamilySearch and introduce you to key resources and strategies that will help you uncover family and facts that you have never known before. You are encouraged to bring your laptop or tablet, and bring what you know about the names, dates, and places for your parents and grandparents. The class will be led by Rebecca Claycamp (Katie Uhrig's mom), a lifelong genealogist and a community volunteer at the McKinney Family Search Center.

Beginning on Sunday, September 20th, we will begin the last year of the Narrative Lectionary. This class meets after Worship in the Library. This class is open to everyone and does not require any prior reading to join.

The **Narrative Lectionary** is a four-year cycle of readings. On the Sundays from September through May each year the texts follow the sweep of the biblical story, from Creation through the early Christian church.

The texts show the breadth and variety of voices within Scripture. They invite people to hear the stories of Abraham and Sarah, Moses and the prophets, Jesus, and Paul. Listening to the many different voices within Scripture enriches preaching and the life of faith.

What are the readings?

The texts include the major episodes in Scripture. They are arranged in a narrative sequence to help people see Scripture as a story that has coherence and a dynamic movement:

- From September to mid-December the preaching texts begin with the early chapters of Genesis, move through the stories of Israel's early history, the exodus, the kings, prophets, exile and return.
- From Christmas to Easter there is sustained reading of one of the four gospels.
- From Easter to Pentecost the texts are chosen from Acts and Paul's letters.

Even if you have seen this movie, it will be fun to discuss theology around life, death, and purpose while eating sheep snacks, popcorn and sitting in a comfy chair (bring a comfy chair to share) and or some sofas brought into the Celebration Center.

ACTION TEAM PROJECTS FOR 2026

Are you a benefit member of Thrivent? If so, we could use your help in applying to Thrivent for seed money for a number of service projects and fundraisers at Resurrection Lutheran. It is a quick and easy way to bring in additional funding to Resurrection's annual budget. There are currently about 75 Thrivent benefit members at Resurrection. Each benefit member can have up to **2 projects per year each funded by a \$250 pre-paid VISA card. Associate members can have up to 1 project per year.** That is **\$37,500** that does not have to be funded by Resurrection's annual budget!
