The writer to the Hebrews gives us a tremendous challenge in Hebrews 12:1-2, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of

the throne of God."

I pray that this year's edition of CONNECT will challenge and encourage us to remember the past so that we do repeat the faithfulness of the AGC pioneers in all our ministry activity!




into the future no matter what.

Uncool, Countercultural, and **Relentlessly Biblical!**

As I reflect on fourteen years of pastoral ministry in the AGC, I am thankful for how the Lord providentially led me to this community of like-minded churches. After experiencing a radical theological shift and leaving my theologically liberal denomination behind, I felt spiritually homeless and was unsure of where to go next. But through another pastor who I happened to be sitting next to at a continuing education class, I heard about the AGC, and after a little exploring, knew this would be a good fit. Surprising to many, what set the AGC apart, and ultimately convinced me to start the compatibility process was this: the website was awful and there was an explicit statement on biblical complementarianism! This was a good sign that I had finally found an association that did not care about being cool or bucking cultural trends. While many churches are obsessed with image, trying but failing to be hip, and are more interested in appearing culturally savvy then retaining unpopular biblical teaching, the AGC has remained firm in its theological convictions, for which I am thankful. This is why I came into the AGC as a young pastor, looking for a Christian community with real convictions, and this is why I have stayed in the AGC all these years. Talking to young men aspiring to be pastor-teachers, this is also what they are looking for today. In an ever-changing faddish culture, ever-changing faddish churches are not appealing, which is why I can point them towards the AGC. My encouragement to our leaders is that you continue to lead with conviction, "holding fast to the faith once for all delivered to the saints", and unashamed of what makes the AGC unique. Uncool. 
How God Has Blessed Us Through the AGC

By the railroad track that borders the Siksika reserve, in a tiny old church, local Christians gather on Sundays to sing, pray, and encourage one another. They talk about new calves, pianos and grandchildren, they hear the Bible preached and help those who live around them. In an A-frame building dwarfed by the mountains looming over it, faithful believers welcome visitors from around the world each Sunday to worship and hear God's Word, and during the week offer a food bank and Bible studies. In an older NE Calgary church, Filipino saints—in Canada for only a few years—seek out new arrivals inviting them to worship the Lord, hear the Scriptures taught, and enjoy some food together on Sundays. During the week they work, encourage those who are working on visa applications, help those moving into new apartments, and provide online and home Bible studies for newcomers.

In places like this, with the people of God, we've experienced His rich blessing as we served Him in the AGC. We pastored two Calgary churches, travelled through western Canada for 12 years as

District Superintendent, served as an interim pastor, and now serve through supply preaching. The AGC didn't begin in the west until 1940, but since then God has blessed its commitment to biblical faithfulness, and to strengthening church leaders and congregations. In this part of Canada, where vast distances and isolation shape and challenge the work of the Lord, the long-term ministry of the AGC has been instrumental in strengthening and unifying faithful pastors, Christians and local churches in the ongoing work of the gospel.

Blessed by the AGC

The AGC's vision is "to be a movement of healthy, reproducing churches." But back in the early 2000's the AGC church in Woodstock, Ontario (named, The Rock Bible Church, formerly, The Rock Community Church, and prior to that, Berean Bible Church), a once thriving disciple-making community, was struggling to survive. Other local churches in Woodstock had reached out to AGC national office personnel wondering if they could purchase the church's property and building.

AGC personnel arranged several meetings with a small remnant, assisted in the formation of a leadership team, helped to identify pastoral leadership, and provided the necessary financial support for a "restart" initiative. Eventually, Rev. Dr. Adam Brown agreed to leave the pastoral team at Philpott Memorial Church (AGC) in Hamilton and come to Woodstock with a committed emphasis on biblical preaching and teaching. Retired AGC pastors, Wayne Foster and Lew Worrad, also

offered crucial direction, support, and encouragement from their years of ministry experience. As a result, the momentum began to shift. Interest grew and others became engaged in what God was wanting to accomplish in and through this AGC restart initiative.

A foundation was laid in those early days that we continue to benefit from and build upon to this very day. The Rock Bible Church eventually became self-supporting, repaid its financial debt to the AGC, and has since become mortgage free. We believe that The Rock Bible Church exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ. And we are here today, in the city of Woodstock, because of our association with a group of churches who share a vision to become a movement of healthy, reproducing churches.

Peoples Church of Montreal is presently going through a process of restructuring our governance model and it is at the AGC we have looked for help. It is a long process, but we look at other AGC churches that have done it. We are a wee bit wiser together.
