Beginning of ALL THINGS

CENTRAL TRUTH | God is the Creator and Ruler of all things.

The beginning of a good story grips us. In fact, many of us decide whether we will keep going with a book, movie, or video game based on whether or not we like the way it starts. We want our attention captured from the very moment we start immersing ourselves in a new story. Genesis, the first book of the Bible, provides an epic beginning to the story of Scripture: the beginning of all things. As we begin this quarter's study, we will see that God is the Creator, Sustainer, and Ruler of all things. And He created human beings in His image and likeness to worship Him, enjoy a relationship with Him, and reflect His goodness into the world.

GENESIS 1:1-5

¹ In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. ² Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness covered the surface of the watery depths, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the surface of the waters. ³ Then God said, "Let there be light," and

there was light. ⁴ God saw that the light was good, and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." There was an evening, and there was a morning: one day.

GENESIS 1:26-31

²⁶ Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, according to our likeness. They will rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, the livestock, the whole earth, and the creatures that crawl on the earth." ²⁷ So God created man in his own image; he created him in the image of God; he created them male and female. ²⁸ God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful, multiply, fill the earth, and subdue it. Rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, and every creature that crawls on

the earth." ²⁹ God also said, "Look, I have given you every seed-bearing plant on the surface of the entire earth and every tree whose fruit contains seed. This will be food for you, ³⁰ for all the wildlife of the earth, for every bird of the sky, and for every creature that crawls on the earth — everything having the breath of life in it — I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. ³¹ God saw all that he had made, and it was very good indeed. Evening came and then morning: the sixth day.

GENESIS 2:1-3

¹So the heavens and the earth and everything in them were completed. ² On the seventh day God had completed his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from

all his work that he had done. ³ God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy, for on it he rested from all his work of creation.



GENESIS 1:1-5

READ & RESPOND

When it comes to a story, we want to be gripped and captivated from the very beginning. In Genesis 1:1-5, we learn not only about the creation of all things, but also about the Creator Himself. God is the eternal Author of all things and the main character of Scripture. As we see His creative work begin, we see Him declare that what He made is "good"—and this is a pattern we see throughout the entire creation story. We often look to the world and culture around us to tell us what is "good," but we must look to the Lord. He is the good Creator who defines what goodness is and who invites us to enjoy a relationship with Him.

MEMORIZE

On a piece of paper or a notes app on your device, write out **Genesis 1:27** ten times in a row. After the tenth time, say the verse out loud without looking at it.

PRAY

God, thank You for being the good Creator who defines what goodness truly is. By the Spirit's power, help me to reflect Your goodness into the world.

GENESIS 1:26-31

READ & RESPOND

When you think about your highest achievement, what comes to mind? A championship trophy, a piece of art you've made, or maybe even a car you helped your friend or family member to restore? In this passage, we learn about God's most significant act of creation: human beings. God made humans—both male and female—in His image and likeness. We've been set apart from the rest of God's creation to enjoy a relationship with Him and reflect His goodness into the world. As God's image bearers, all human beings hold inherent dignity, worth, and value. The culture around us tries to tell us what we're worth, but this passage reminds us that *all* people are made in God's image, regardless of ethnicity, sex, social status, or education level.

↓ What does this passage reveal about humanity's purpose?
→ What are some ways you can remind yourself that you are made in God's image?
→ How does today's passage invite you to treat others?

MEMORIZE

Before eating each meal today, take a moment to read Genesis 1:27 and thank the Lord.

PRAY

Lord, You are the Creator and Ruler of all things. Thank You for making me in Your image and creating me to enjoy a relationship with You. Help me to treat others as fellow image bearers.

GENESIS 2:1-3

READ & RESPOND

After a long day at school, work, or sports practice, there's nothing like finally getting to rest—especially when we're proud of the work we've done. In Genesis, we learn that after creation was completed, God also rested. However, He didn't rest because He was tired—He rested because He was done creating and was taking time to appreciate everything He had made. God's creation was good, beautiful, and ideal. The seventh day was marked by God's blessing and He declared it holy. In fact, the Hebrew day of rest, called Sabbath, is linked to the creation story (see Ex. 20:8-11)! True, eternal rest is found in Jesus. In following Him, we are invited to cease our striving and live out of the overflow of what He has accomplished for us through His sinless life, death, and resurrection.

MEMORIZE

Write out each word from **Genesis 1:27** on individual note cards or sticky notes. Mix up the words, then do your best to put them in their proper order.

PRAY

Lord Jesus, thank You for all that You have accomplished on my behalf. In You, I have a true, eternal rest that cannot be taken away.

PSALM 8:3-9

READ & RESPOND

Reflecting on God's vast and epic creation, the psalmist asks this simple question: "What is a human being that you remember him, a son of man that you look after him?" Perhaps you've asked a similar question before. The psalmist doesn't stop here—he goes on to say that humans have been given a divine purpose from God. We have been created to reflect God's goodness and rule into the world. Like the psalmist, we are invited to celebrate God for being the magnificent Creator who has designed us with dignity and purpose. Friend, He is mindful of you and wants you to enjoy a relationship with Him.

MEMORIZE

Using colored pencils or pens, draw a picture that relates to **Genesis 1:27** and write out the verse at the bottom of the piece of paper. Try reciting the verse from memory.

PRAY

Gracious God, thank You for creating me with dignity and purpose. As I enjoy a relationship with You as the Creator of all things, help me to see opportunities to love and serve those around me.

2 CORINTHIANS 5:17

READ & RESPOND

Paul's words to the church at Corinth remind us that, in Christ, we have been transformed. The Creator of all things put on flesh, lived a sinless life, died in our place, and was resurrected. Through what Jesus accomplished, those who trust in Him are reconciled to God and are made new. At times, we can lose sight of our new identity, so we must ask God's Spirit to help us embrace and live out this new reality. As new creations, we are called to participate in God's mission to a hopeless and hurting world. We serve a God who is both Creator and Savior!

Why do you think the church at Corinth needed this reminder from Paul?
▶ Do you find it difficult to remember that you are a new creation? Why or why not?
↔ What does it look like to live as a new creation among those around you?

MEMORIZE

Find a worship song that reminds you of **Genesis 1:27**, and after listening to the song, incorporate this week's verse in a prayer to the Lord.

PRAY

Heavenly Father, thank You for sending Jesus to reconcile me to You. In Him, I am a new creation. By the Spirit's power, teach me to live out my identity as a new creation among those around me.
