Session 05

The Living WORD

CENTRAL TRUTH | Jesus is God in the flesh, the Living Word.

It's hard to find someone who isn't drawn in by good storytelling. After all, that's why so many of us are entertained by shows, movies, books, and video games—we appreciate a good story! John, the author of this Gospel account, is a remarkable storyteller. Rather than starting his account with the birth of Jesus, he starts from the beginning—like, the very beginning, when God created all things. Masterfully linking his Gospel to the creation account in Genesis, John communicates that Jesus is God and that all things have been created through Him. In this week's session, allow yourself to be engulfed in the beautiful truth that Jesus, the Living Word, put on flesh and walked among us.

JOHN 1:1-5

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was with God in the beginning. ³ All things were created through him, and apart from

him not one thing was created that has been created. ⁴ In him was life, and that life was the light of men. ⁵ That light shines in the darkness, and yet the darkness did not overcome it.

JOHN 1:6-10

⁶ There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify about the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸ He was not the light, but he came to testify about the light. ⁹ The true light

that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world was created through him, and yet the world did not recognize him.

JOHN 1:11-14

¹¹ He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. ¹² But to all who did receive him, he gave them the right to be children of God, to those who believe in his name, ¹³ who were born, not of natural descent, or of the will of the flesh, or of the will of man, but of God. ¹⁴ The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. We observed his glory, the glory as the one and only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.





JOHN 1:1-5



In this passage, John begins his Gospel account by reminding his readers of the creation story in the book of Genesis. If you open your Bible to Genesis 1 and compare it to John 1, you will find a few similarities. John teaches that "the Word was with God, and the Word was God." Who is this Word? Jesus is the Word, the One through whom all things were created. In Him is true life—and that life provided light to a world filled with darkness. As followers of Jesus, we have become people of the light who are called to share the hope we have found with others. The God who created all things has rescued us through Jesus.

MEMORIZE

On a piece of paper or a notes app on your device, write out **John 1:14** ten times in a row. After the tenth time, say the verse out loud without looking at it.

PRAY

Lord Jesus, You are the true Light of the world. Thank You for rescuing me so that I can enjoy a relationship with God and experience new life. Give me courage to share this hope with others.

JOHN 1:6-10

READ & RESPOND

This passage introduces us to John the Baptist, a man who possessed a clear calling from God "to testify about the light, so that all might believe through him." But John the Baptist was "not the light"—he was sent to share *about* Jesus, the true Light of the world. John the Baptist's life and ministry indicate that he humbly understood his calling and emphatically pointed others to Jesus (see John 1:26-29). True humility is found when we understand who we are in relation to who God is. This frees us to be the people whom He has created and called us to be as we declare the good news of what He has done through Christ.

S	What does it look like for you to regularly pray for those who have rejected the good news of Jesus?

MEMORIZE

Before eating each meal today, take a moment to read John 1:14 and thank the Lord.

PRAY

Heavenly Father, thank You for sending Jesus to bring light and hope to a dark and hopeless world. By the Spirit's power, help me to humbly point those around me to Christ, the Savior of the world.

JOHN 1:11-14

Jesus, the Son of God, put on flesh "and dwelt among us" (v. 14). Another way of thinking about this is that, in Jesus, God took up residence among humanity—He made His home here with us. Though Jesus was Israel's long-awaited Messiah, John reveals that He was rejected by His own people. It is through faith in Christ alone that believers are adopted into God's family. In Christ, we no longer have to look inward or to the culture around us to discover who we are. Our identity is not in what we have, what we have done, or where we come from. In Christ, we are children of God who enjoy a relationship with Him and His eternal family—this is our true identity.

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MEMORIZE

Write out each word from **John 1:14** on individual note cards or sticky notes. Mix up the words, then do your best to put them in their proper order.

PRAY

Heavenly Father, thank You for sending Jesus to dwell among humanity so He could make a way for me to enjoy a relationship with You. As I embrace my identity as a child of God, give me courage to share the hope I've found with those around me.

COLOSSIANS 1:15-20

In Paul's letter to the church at Colossae, he teaches believers of truths that we've seen in John's Gospel account: Jesus is supreme over creation, and all things have been created through Him and for Him. Paul also challenges believers to live in light of their allegiance to Jesus. Because Jesus is supreme over all things, our conduct should reflect this. There is no shortage of voices in our lives that invite us to do what we want and be the captains of our own destiny. Though this can be tempting, we must remember that we can only find true freedom through following King Jesus.

Why do you think it was important for Paul to remind the church at Colossae of Jesus's supremacy over all things?
↓ When do you find it most difficult to trust that the Lord is in control and cares for you? Why?
→ How can today's passage shape the way you pray?

Using colored pencils or pens, draw a picture that relates to **John 1:14** and write out the verse at the bottom of the piece of paper. Try reciting the verse from memory.

PRAY

Lord Jesus, all things have been created through You and for You. May the way that I live and treat those around me reflect the fact I have been transformed by Your grace and follow You.

HEBREWS 1:1-4

Have you—or has someone close to you—ever asked what God is like? It's a good question, and one that the author of Hebrews boldly gives an answer to: God has "spoken to us by his Son." We know what God is like because Jesus shows us perfectly—and through Him, we can know and have a relationship with God. Jesus died for us and now reigns as the risen King over all things. What good news! In the midst of difficult times, this truth can anchor our discouraged hearts. The Lord is the Creator, Sustainer, and Ruler of all things; therefore, we do not have to be afraid of what may or may not come our way.

MEMORIZE

Find a worship song that reminds you of **John 1:14**, and after listening to the song, incorporate this week's verse in a prayer to the Lord.

PRAY

Gracious God, thank You for revealing Yourself to us through Jesus. Because He is the risen King, I can have courage no matter what I face. Teach me to live in light of His supreme authority.
