John Lennon released a song in 1971 titled "Imagine" which some voices in our culture are suggesting would be a good replacement for "The Star-Bangled Banner" as America's national anthem. Seriously. I'm not making this up! There is certainly an alluring aspect to Lennon's song...the lyrics conjuring a vision of a utopia that really is fun to imagine. For those of you unfamiliar with Lennon's song, and as a refresher to those of you who can hear the melody in your mind, let me share the lyrics:

Imagine all the people living for today.

Imagine no possessions, I wonder if you can
No need for greed or hunger, a brotherhood of man
Imagine all the people sharing all the world.

You may say I'm a dreamer, but I'm not the only one
I hope some day you'll join us, and the world will be as one.

Who wouldn't want all the things mentioned in these lyrics? Lennon is basically describing a place void of all evil and human selfishness and human suffering - heck yeah! Who wouldn't vote for that? The irony is Lennon dismissing in the very first verse the ONLY place such an existence can be found - heaven! Followers of Christ understand from Scripture there will never be a perfectly balanced utopia on this earth owing to the presence of sin and evil in this broken world. You see, the problematic existence of evil is where every man-made religion or philosophy or social construct is revealed as a system of vacuous promises, based on erroneous assumptions, that actually lead only to deeper pits of despair and anxiety; the utopia Lennon describes can only become reality one of two ways. Either all of humanity is capable of making itself into better, altruistic people if we'll just try hard enough (which history clearly demonstrates is not realistic), or someone has to designate the "bad people" standing in the way of utopia and exterminate them.
