
NASHOTAH HOUSE SUMMER COURSES

FROM ST. MATTHEW'S "STICHIN BEES" (BLOOMINGTON)

The Stichin Bees mission is to make and supply our sick and homebound parishioners with handmade lap quilts to keep them warm and provide a little comfort in their time of need. To have new mothers, within our parish, receive a handmade baby quilt, provide fellowship on Tuesdays, and to reach out to others in our community with our blankets.

In 2020 we changed our name to "The Stitchin' Bees" as we don't really quilt anymore we tie knots in blankets that we have already put together.

This year we have given out 1 quilt to a new baby and contributed 75 baby quilts to "Stuff the Bus". The division of the blankets was 22 quilts, 46 polar fleece blankets, and 7 receiving blankets. Stuff the Bus supports The Children's Foundation. We have given 42 polar fleece blankets to Fostering Dignity which serves the fostered children in our county. There are 250 foster children in Mclean County last we knew. We also gave Home Sweet Home 3 scarves and 16 hats.

During the Christmas season, members of St. Matthews have had the opportunity to donate to the two Mitten Trees that have been placed within the church building. The trees are decorated with knit stocking caps and scarves, and gloves. The Quilters placed 22 knit stocking caps and 12 scarves on the Mitten Tree. Other members of the church community continue to fill the trees with more hats, scarves and gloves. We are also working on fidget mats. We gave 4 fidget mats to Arcadia Nursing Home and 10 mats to Oakland School's Special Education Dept, and 4 to Kelly Albin Headstart teacher in Canton, IL.

The quilters now have blankets all over the world. In the past years, we have sent blankets to:

Moscow, Russia, Mexico, Kuwait, Afghanistan Burundi, Africa, Tanzania, Africa, Peru, St Vincent, Tabora, Tanzania (2017), Puerto Rico (2018), Ganidia, Spain (2019), San Juan, AND Puerto Rico (2019).

FROM ST. ANDREW'S EDWARDSVILLE

On February 5, St. Andrew's Edwardsville said goodbye to The Reverend Mark Klamer and his wife, Jane Klamer. Bishop Burgess assigned Deacon Klamer to St. Andrew's last June. Deacon Klamer was sent to St. Andrew's to be mentored by Father Hankinson, as part of his preparation for eventual ordination to the priesthood. However, in an example of the unpredictable nature of life as we



know it, within three weeks of Deacon Klamer's arrival, Father Hankinson announced his departure from St. Andrew's. Deacon Klamer's role at St. Andrew's changed and grew in ways that none of us had expected. For the past six months, he has served, in effect, as our resident clergyperson. His contributions over that time have included.....



- Leading formal lay Christian education and formation, including preparing the first candidates for confirmation and reception in many years;
- Starting daily observances of Morning and Evening led, primarily, by lay members of the congregation;
- Providing pastoral care;
- Organizing and coordinating the forms of liturgy, and providing a consistent ordained presence at Sunday worship;
- Delivering a three-part sermon series which became the focus of our Annual Stewardship campaign;
- Providing guidance to the lay leadership, including a sometimes wayward Senior Warden.

We have also been blessed by the gracious and lively presence of Jane Klamer, who has become a cherished member of our community. Deacon Klamer's presence among us was always intended to lead to a transition to his ordination to the priesthood, and most likely to his service in another congregation. Even so, we are sorry to see him and Jane leave us.

Deacon Klamer has been assigned as deacon-in-charge at St. Thomas-Glen Carbon. I know that all the members of St Andrew's join me in thanking Deacon Klamer and Jane for their service to us, and wishing them a happy and fulfilling ministry at St. Thomas.


