THE CHURCH ARMY

The Diocese of Springfield welcomed representatives of the Church Army USA in the interest of discerning opportunities for evangelism where the reach of regular parish programs and ministries now desires to be met by the priorities of street ministries.

The churches of St. Bartholomew's in Granite City and St. Christopher's in Rantoul were identified as areas that have changed demographically over the past 25 years and now seek a new way forward that incorporates an intentional reach well beyond the church doors. Founded by The Reverend Wilson Carlile in 1882, The Church Army began in London by reaching out to those who have never stepped inside a church.

Focusing on the slums of Westminister – one of the most deprived and poverty-stricken spots in London - Carlile began by hosting open-air gatherings to share faith and encourage people to put their faith into action.







Today, the <u>Church Army USA</u> is based in Aliquippa, Pennsylvania at <u>Uncommon Grounds Café</u> and has centers of ministry located in Beaver Falls, PA; Branson, MO; Farmington, MO; Hillsville, VA; Plainville, CT; Ocala, FL; and Belington, WV.

Church Army officers spent two days within our Diocese touring Granite City as well as Rantoul and then had an opportunity to make an introductory presentation to Diocesan Council on Saturday, February 25th at our Diocesan Center. Mrs. Joan Small of St. Luke's in Springfield attended the Council meeting as a guest to share her admiration for the work of the Church Army in Barbados where she grew up. This prayerful conversation being had between the Church Army USA and our Diocese now continues with Church Army officers, mission clergy, mission lay leaders, Diocesan staff, and those who represent us on Diocesan Council.

"There is a spirit of optimism, radical welcome, and evangelical zeal within the Church Army USA that I believe would fit well within some of our more challenging as well as distressed communities," said Bishop Burgess. "I invite the intentional prayers of this Diocese in the interest of extending the reach of the Church. Specifically, that we may all be faithful, true, and bold when it comes to reaching toward those who are meant to complete us."

The Church Army USA is composed of Christ-centered, mission-focused Evangelists, Candidates, volunteers, and donors, who are committed to serving, reaching, and loving broken, rejected, sad, disconnected, and hurting people with a message of hope, love, and joy. They are at the center of evangelism and on the edges of society. They specialize in working outside church buildings through addiction centers, urban farming, jails and prisons, café ministries, streets and back alleys, schools, senior centers, hospitals, nursing homes, housing developments, and more as needed.


NASHOTAH HOUSE SUMMER COURSES

FROM EMMANUEL-MEMORIAL, CHAMPAIGN

Why are things so different in the church during Lent? Lent is a penitential season in preparation for the celebration of the greatest feast of the Christian Year, the Feast of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead. From earliest times, Christians kept Lent as a time of penitence and fasting. It was also a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism, as well as a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful, were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. All of these things reminded the whole congregation of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith. Because of the penitential nature of the season, certain changes take place in worship in Anglican churches. In place of "Blessed be God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit," the liturgy begins with "Bless the Lord who forgiveth all our sins. His mercy endureth forever." Instead of coming after the Prayers of the People, the Confession of Sin is right up front, at the beginning of the liturgy. In place of the Gloria in Excelsis (Glory to God in the highest), the Kyrie Eleison (Lord, have mercy upon us) is sung or said. The word alleluia is not sung or said. And in place of the blessing at the end of the liturgy, a prayer over the congregation is said. These are the most obvious changes, but there are even other, more subtle changes that you will notice in this penitential season.

The church itself looks different. Ornate textiles, vessels, and other symbols have been removed or are covered. Stations of the Cross, depictions of 14 points of our Lord's journey to his crucifixion and death, are hung on the walls of the nave of the church. The 12th Station, "Jesus Dies on the Cross," is marked by a special votive candle in front of it. In place of the elaborate brass cross over the altar, a plain wooden cross stands. These changes make our worship environment more somber, yet are still beautiful in their simplicity. Lent is a time for deepening our faith and devotion. May it be such a time for all who enter here.

FROM ST. ANDREW'S QUILT GUILD

The St. Andrew's Quilt Guild held its annual Fabric Art and Quilt Show this past weekend at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Edwardsville. Although attendance was low on the first day due to weather conditions, they raised \$1,358 through ticket sales. Most of the quilts were only on display but several were able to be purchased and 13 were sold this year. Attendance was high on Saturday due to the presentation of three Quilts of Valor which are quilts that are crafted for the remembrance or recognition of a service member or veteran.





From reporter Scott Marion of the Edwardsville Intelligencer: "It's a special honor to be here in my hometown and my childhood church and the quilt was sewn by women in the Quilts of Valor chapter who knew me when I was a kid and had a hand in raising me,' said Robert Timothy Schultheis. 'They rarely give a quilt to someone they know, so that makes it even more special for me.'

Schultheis, 61, was a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army and served from 1983 to 2004. He was stationed across the nation and had numerous overseas tours in Germany, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Iraq. 'I wish that all the guys that I served with who are still alive today can have the same special honor,' Schultheis said. 'It takes a community to raise a soldier and for me, that community was here today. They gave me this quilt and personally sewed it and it's a very high honor for me.'"


Annual Mass of Chrism -
