Be Thou My Vision

8th Century

Only one missionary is honored with a global holiday, and only one known by his own distinct color of green – St. Patrick, missionary to Ireland. Patrick was born in AD 373, along the banks of the River Clyde in what is now called Scotland. His father was a deacon and his grandfather a priest. When Patrick was about 16, raiders descended on his little town and torched his home and seized him and hauled him aboard ship and taken to Ireland as a slave. While there he gave his life to the Lord Jesus.

Patrick eventually escaped and returned home. In a dream, Patrick saw an Irishman pleading with him to come evangelize Ireland. After thought and prayer, Patrick, age 30, returned to Ireland, to his former captors, with only the Latin Bible in his hand. With powerful preaching, he evangelized the countryside, thus Patrick became one of the most fruitful evangelists of all time, planting about 200 churches and baptizing 100,000 converts. His work endured and several centuries later the Irish church was still producing hymns, prayers, sermons and songs of worship thus influencing an 8th century unknown poet to write a prayer asking God to be his Vision, his Wisdom and his Best Thought by day or night.

In 1905, Mary Elizabeth Byrne, of Dublin Ireland, translated this ancient Irish poem into English and Eleanor Hull of Manchester, England, took Byrne's translation and crafted it into verses with rhyme and meter and shortly thereafter it was set to a traditional Irish folk song, named "Slane," named for an area in Ireland where Patrick reported challenged local Druids with the Gospel.

Eleanor Hull (1860-1935) was a writer, journalist and scholar of Old Irish. She was the daughter of Edward Hull and was educated at Alexandra College, Dublin and was a student of Irish Studies. In 1896 Hull was co-founder of the Irish Texts Society for the publication of early manuscripts. She published many books between 1898 and 1912, including *The Poem Book of Gael: Translations from Irish Gaelic Poetry into English Prose and Verse*. Hull died at age 75 in Wimbledon, England.
