

My Jesus, I Love Thee (1864)

"The young people of today are utterly dissolute and disorderly," fumed grumpy old Martin Luther in the sixteenth century. The philosopher Plato agreed. "The youth are rebellious, pleasure-seeking and irresponsible," he wrote. "They have no respect for their elders." Socrates complained, "Children now love luxury. They have bad manners, contempt for authority. They show disrespect for elders and love chatter." A 6,000-year-old Egyptian tomb bears the inscription: "We live in a decadent age. Young people no longer respect their parents. They are rude and impatient. They inhabit taverns and have no self-control."

The next time you think the 'modern generation' is going from bad to worse, remember that God always has a rich handful of teenage heroes ready to change the world – Joseph, the dreamer; Daniel in Babylon, David, the giant killer, and the virgin Mary. As a teenager Charles Spurgeon preached to great crowds, but when they referred to his youthfulness, he replied, "Never mind my age. Think of the Lord Jesus Christ and His preciousness."

Some of our greatest hymns were written by young adults. Isaac Watts wrote most of his most memorable hymns at about the age of nineteen. Poet John Milton wrote well-known poems at age fifteen.

This hymn of deep devotion, "My Jesus, I Love Thee," was written by William Ralph Featherston (1846-1873), of Montreal Canada, at age sixteen! It is likely Featherston wrote this hymn as a poem celebrating his conversion to Christ. Reportedly, he sent it to an aunt in Los Angeles who quickly sought its publication. Composer A. Judson Gordon (founder of Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary) discovered the lyrics in the 1870 edition of *The London Hymnal*. He included the text with his tune in 1876; the pairing of text and tune is standard to this day.

Little else is known about the author Featherston. It's enough just to know that God can change the world through anyone – regardless of age – who will say, "My Jesus, I love Thee, I know Thou art mine. For Thee, all the follies of sin I resign." Reportedly, his descendants still treasure the original manuscript of the hymn. The simplicity and sincerity of the text has resonated with Christians for well over 150 years, particularly as a hymn of invitation or a prayer hymn.
