

All Things Bright and Beautiful 1848

Cecil F. Alexander (1818-1895) was born in Dublin Ireland. She began writing poetry in her early childhood. At age 15 Alexander went to live at Milltown House in Strabane, Ireland and while living there, she published a number of Christian books.

One day, Alexander was working with one of her pupils in Sunday School who was struggling to understand the Apostles' Creed. Alexander began to mull the possibility of converting the Apostles' Creed into songs for children, using simple hymns to explain the phrases and truths of the Christian faith to little ones. The Apostles' Creed begins: *I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth...* For the phrase "maker of heaven and earth" she wrote this lovely little song, "All Things Bright and Beautiful," based on Genesis 1:31. The Apostles' Creed goes on to say about Jesus Christ: "...who was conceived of the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary..." which spurred the writing of a favorite Christmas hymn "Once in Royal David's City." These hymns, and many others, were published in 1848 in *Hymns for Little Children* and became one of the most successful hymn-publishing projects, going through over one hundred editions.

By the 1840s Alexander was known as a hymn writer and her compositions were included in *Church of Ireland* hymnbooks. Cecil and her sister, Anne, were very involved in local church activities in Strabane. While visiting local families, they encountered a small deaf boy from a poor home. They were concerned about the bareness of his existence and the blank future he faced. Both sisters persuaded their father to allow them the use of a small building on the grounds of their home at Milltown House to set up a tiny school for 4-5 deaf children.

From the acorn of a tiny home school grew the dream of a large-scale institute catering to children with hearing and speech loss. This dream came true with the laying of the foundation stone of the school on September 6, 1850. The school was opened in 1851 and over the following five years welcomed almost 50 children; teaching them the skills needed to live in a hearing world. Unfortunately, the school was destroyed by fire in 1856, where 8 deaf children died. Although the school was never rebuilt, Alexander's leading role in deaf education in Ireland has not been forgotten.

Alexander died in Derry, Ireland at age 77 and is buried in Derry City Cemetery. Her husband, William, died in 1911 and is buried beside his wife. Alexander's former home, Milltown House, later became Strabane Grammar School which contains a plaque commemorating their residence there. The school building was vacated in 2020.
