Deuteronomy 19-25

The broad principles of this section of social law

Severe CONSEQUENCES doled out to the WICKED,

Hebrews were to treat each other FAIRLY and with decency

Considerate CARE for to be given for the VULNERABLE

Based upon God's Holy PRESENCE with Israel in the land

- God prescribed severe <u>consequences</u> for the <u>wicked</u> (21:18-21)
- 2. God prescribed <u>fairness</u> between His people (21:15-17)
- God prescribed great <u>care</u> for the <u>poor</u> and <u>vulnerable</u> (24:10-22)
- 4. These commands are anchored in God's holy <u>presence</u> among His people (23:9-14)
