Our Easter worship celebration will include music for brass quintet, choir, and congregation. Rev. Mark Phillips will share the Easter message, "The Five Word Easter


Sermon."

Who in their right mind would ever read only that last chapter of a novel just because you heard that it had a good ending? No one. That doesn't make any sense. It's impossible to understand why the ending is so good unless you make your way through all of the drama of the chapters that precede the conclusion!

Holy Week contains the high drama of our salvation. It begins when Jesus rides into Jerusalem, and our lives, on Palm Sunday. Then it traces his ministry and the evil plot to destroy Him. On Maundy Thursday, we gather at the Lord's Table for a Last Supper before

Jesus leads us out into the garden where he is betrayed and arrested. We fall asleep with the disciples when we, like they, should be awake and with Him in His hour of need. On Good Friday we gather for services to listen carefully to the account of his trial, crucifixion and death. Then we wait on Saturday, caught between the cross and the promise of His resurrection. At last, on Easter morning we join with Christians around the world in singing, "Alleluia!" before an empty tomb. Nothing can stop a Savior who defeats death.

On Easter Sunday, the pews will be fuller than usual. We are grateful for that. However, may I suggest that if we really want to experience the intense joy of the resurrection, we need to be part of the entire journey of Holy Week and all of the passion that goes with it. The pews should be full for all of our Holy Week services as well.

Our Holy Week schedule appears on the front page of this issue of *The Messenger*. Why not plan on being with us this year for as many of our special services as possible? More than that, why not invite others to join you?


NEW EVENT FOR CHILDREN IN APRIL




Mezzo-soprano Victoria Isernia is known for her sultry mezzo voice, and "good acting instinct" (Utah

Isernia is a graduate of the Manhattan School of Music where she studied under the tutelage of Maitland Peters. While there she performed in Dido & Aeneas (Dido), L'incoronazione di Poppea (Nerone), both under the direction of world-renowned soprano, Catherine Malfitano, and Janacek's The Cunning Little Vixen (Forrester's Wife/ Cricket). Named "the World's Premiere Duo-Organ Team" by *The Atlanta Journal and Constitution*, Elizabeth and Raymond Chenault, duo-organists, have concertized extensively throughout the United States and Europe. Specializing in works written for two performers, The Chenaults have commissioned, arranged and premiered over seventy organ duets, thereby making a significant historical contribution to this slighted area of organ literature. Because of their unique and refreshing repertoire, combined with their exciting and sensitive artistry, the Chenaults are in demand as

recitalists and have established themselves as America's leading duo-organists. The Chenault's duet career began in 1979 when Arthur Wills of England's Ely Cathedral composed Toccata for Two for them, followed by John Rutter's Variations on An Easter Theme in 1982. Both duets were premiered by the Chenaults at Washington Cathedral and are published. They have been featured recitalists at numerous national and regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Association of Anglican Musicians, the American Society for Eighteenth-Century Studies, the Atlanta Summer Organ Festival, the International Summer Organ Festival at the Spreckels Organ Pavilion in San Diego, Helzberg Hall (Kauffman Center for the Performing Arts, Kansas City, MO), the East Texas Pipe Organ Festival, the Crystal Cathedral, the Mormon Tabernacle, Washington National Cathedral, St. Paul's Cathedral (London), Woolsey Hall (Yale University), York Minster Cathedral (England) and the PiccoloSpoleto Festival. Mr. and Mrs. Chenault, natives of Virginia, completed their Bachelor of Music degrees from Virginia Commonwealth University studying organ with Lawrence Robinson. Mr. Chenault received his Master of Music degree in organ performance from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music where he and Mrs. Chenault studied organ with Wayne Fisher. Upon graduation, Mr. Chenault became a Fellow in Church Music at Washington Cathedral studying with Dr. Paul Callaway. Other organ teachers include Harold Abmyer, Arthur Poister and John Fenstermaker. The Chenaults perform frequently in recital across the United States with John Tibbetts, baritone and Victoria Isernia, mezzo-soprano.


SUNDAY, APRIL 23, 2023 – 4:00 pm VANGUARD VOICES PRESENTS *LES CHANSONS DES ROSES*

Dr. Stockton is a recently retired, award-winning political science professor at the University of Michigan-Dearborn. Ron, and his wife Jane, are with us for worship on Sunday mornings and are a special part of our Monday afternoon study group! Ron has a great podcast, "Stockton After Class" which Emily Nietering shared with me. I have listened to several of his lectures and have found each one to be insightful and captivating. I also appreciate Ron's great sense of humor which is sprinkled throughout! I am so grateful that Ron accepted my invitation to lead the class for five weeks this spring. All are welcome to attend as they are able. Each session, with the exception of the Woodmere Cemetery tour, will be available by Zoom, if you can't make it in person. Simply send me your email address at (mark@cherryhillchurch.org) and I will be happy to send you the

link each week. Here Ron's schedule:

- **April 17 Numbers in Religious Texts:** In a religious text, a number is not always a number. Often it is a teaching. Ron will discuss four different ways that numbers are used in the Bible and other religious texts.
- **April 24** The origins of Islam: How did Islam originate? What do we know about the Prophet Mohammed? How did Christianity fit into the birth of Islam? You will be surprised.
- May 1 Jerusalem in Religious and Political Thinking. Jewish, Christian, and Islamic perspectives.
- **May 8** Gravestones Around the World (A slide show). To an individual, a grave is not about death. It is about who we were, what was important to us, and how we want to be remembered. To a powerful person, a gravestone reflects something very different.
- **May 15 Visit to Woodmere cemetery.** This cemetery has 200,000 graves. It contains the history of Detroit. We will visit at least nine different sections reflecting the exceptional religious and ethnic diversity of this city. Along the way we will encounter some remarkable stories. Transportation from the church will be provided. In the event of inclement weather, this class will be rescheduled.



YOU SHOULD HEAR WHAT YOU'RE MISSING!

This winter, Cherry Hill church just installed a new "hearing assist" system. We hope this will help anyone with hearing deficiencies be able to participate fully in our worship. Here is a brief guide to help you choose the correct method to take advantage of our new system. Copies of these instructions are with the devices. Feel free to pick up a copy!

Here are the two choices:

- 1. Use the hearing assist receiver with either the earphones or the neckloops. The receiver has an on/off volume control dial.
- 2. Download Williams WaveCast app for either IOS or Android. Connect to the local network (IP address) and setup the connection. The app will send the signal directly to a person's hearing aid(s). The volume will be controlled on the individual's phone.

Any individual wanting to use the new system will need to be familiar with their own hearing aids. Things you will need to know: a) do your hearing aids connect to your phone (using Bluetooth) and use an app for total control of your hearing aids; and b) do your hearing aid(s) have a "telecoil" feature. Here are a few more details that can be helpful. The earphones will fit over the ear (whether you are wearing a hearing aid or not.) To use the neck-looops you must have the "telecoil" function built into your hearing aids. Since IOS and Android phones are quite different, you must be familiar how your smartphone works.

If you are using the hearing assist system for the first time or are having difficulties getting everything to work, you can speak with Rev. Mark Phillips, Larry Cereso, or John Haury (we will train others, also). Help needs to happen at least 10-20 minutes before the beginning of the Prelude or sometime after the Postlude. The best time would be sometime during the week!

We hope with this new system, everyone will be able to be an integral part of our worship!

I'M GLAD YOU ASKED!

A new, occasional column to answer questions that I am asked from time to time. – MFP

The first question comes from a friend and regular worshiper at Cherry Hill: Why don't Presbyterians make the sign of the cross as part of our worship services?

I found this question intriguing, so I started by doing a little research. In all that I read, I did not find anything substantial to support a case of making or not making the sign of the cross. Of course, the first argument is that it's a "catholic" thing to do. Not true. Most Protestants don't make the sign of the cross because they are not persuaded that there is Biblical basis for doing so. A minority of Protestants, mainly Lutherans, make the sign of the cross because Martin Luther encouraged it as an outward expression of their faith in Jesus Christ. And yet, in some Reformed churches, such as the Presbyterian Church (USA), the sign of the cross is used at times during the benediction. The minister will make the sign of the cross out toward the congregation while invoking the Trinity. Still, when it comes down to it, making the sign of the cross is not a matter of obedience and not making it is not a matter of disobedience.

I wonder: "What would it look like for Presbyterians and other Protestants to recover and reclaim the old tradition of making the sign of the cross?" After all, many of us have crosses that hang in our homes or around our necks. Many of our churches display crosses on the Communion Table or in other places in the sanctuary. At times, the abundance of crosses can feel like more of a fashion statement than a sign of our faith. However, whether from our fear of Catholicism or superstition, we've abandoned the ancient ritual of engaging our bodies in making the sign of the cross.

In making such a sign, we remind ourselves that God is with us in those happy moments, such as a baptism or a blessing, and the more sober and tender ones on the deathbed or in an Ash Wednesday service. I mean, I've been placing the sign of the cross on the foreheads of over 100 infants, youth, and adults for baptism ... and I have no idea how many foreheads over the years have received a dusty cross of ashes from my thumb on Ash Wednesday. We engage not just our minds and our hearts, but our material bodies, our dust-ness, reminding ourselves that we encounter God on every level, with our whole selves.

In tracing the sign of the cross, we contemplate Jesus' life and the events that led to his death. And somewhere in that tracing of the sign we also remember, however faintly, that the way of the cross is also the way of life.

I don't know, perhaps Holy Week is the perfect time – even for us Presbyterians – to begin making the sign of the cross.

Something to ponder, no? Thanks, dear friend for the question! I'm glad you asked that!
