



My uncle, Earle Wittpenn, was a newspaper editor in Pennsylvania and West Virginia for much of his career. Several years ago, he wrote what he thought would be his last column as editor of the paper he was working for. The title for that last column was -30-. I asked him about that, and my uncle said that in the newspaper business, the number 30 is used for one's last article, column, or editorial to signify "The End."

"The End!" That's how all movies used to conclude. When you saw those words on the screen, you knew it was time to brush off the popcorn, stand up, and leave. There would be no further drama on the screen. The story was finished—complete—over.

And yet, the message of Easter reminds us that the ending is just the beginning. Certainly, after the events of that first Good Friday, the disciples must have felt as if the story was over. They watched their Lord and friend die. He meant more to them than anyone else ever had. They couldn't imagine life without Him. Their hopes and dreams were buried in the tomb along with His body. They probably went home that afternoon thinking -30- The End. Story over. But then came Easter! That morning's news from the tomb was incredible – He was not there but had risen! The news turned out to be true, and what seemed to be an ending was just the beginning of an incredible story that continues to this day. The end was just the beginning.

So often, the "endings" of life seem like the end of the world as we know it, and sometimes it is. However, what we perceive as an ending may very well signal new life, new birth, and new possibilities. After all, when you have risen Lord at loose in the world, you never know what new beginning is before you.

I guess that as I write this final article for *The Messenger*, to some degree, it is an ending. As my ministry at Cherry Hill comes to a close, my heart is full of gratitude for all that we shared together over the past nine years. I will always be grateful for the many ways we shared in ministry together. And I will always be grateful for your friendship, support, and prayers. Thank you for allowing me to be part of your lives and a part of the history of this church.

And yet, as this chapter in my life and the life of this congregation comes to an end, it is also a new beginning. It will be a time of new beginnings for me as I begin my ministry in Baltimore, and it is a time of exciting new beginnings for Cherry Hill as you look forward to new leadership, which I am sure will take you in new and exciting directions. Be open to the movement of the Spirit in your midst. Embrace and support your interim pastor and then your new pastor. Pray daily for your church officers. Pray daily for the person God has already called as your new pastor. Attend worship. Continue to be generous in sharing your time, talents, and treasure. Be positive. Be united. Be faithful.

Well, I guess if I were writing this article for the Detroit Free Press, it would be appropriate to close now with this:

Leslie Mott, M. Div., RYT, CFP, is a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (USA). Most recently, she served as Interim Head of Staff at the Presbyterian Church of Traverse City and has also served as Interim minister at Palisades Presbyterian Church, North United Church of Christ, and Bridge Pastor at Mahopac Presbyterian Church, and was a solo pastor in Cold Spring, NY, for 13 years. She served as Coordinator for Spirituality and Practice in Bedford, NY, and was the Coordinator of the Pastoral Sabbath at Holmes Camp and Stony Point Center from 2015 to 2019.

As a consultant and retreat leader, she has presented to and guided groups at The Garrison Institute, Holy Cross Monastery,

Johnsonburg Camp, Mariondale, the NEXT Church Conference, and Maryknoll, among others.

Leslie is a yoga teacher, Spiritual Director, and Certified Focusing Professional. She received her Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary and her Spiritual Direction certification through the Linwood Spiritual Center in Rhinecliff, NY. She is a member of Spiritual Directors International and the International Focusing Institute. Leslie's ministry, teaching, and practice all lead her to join with others to discern and live out lives of prayer, mindfulness, and action.




#### **SPECIAL MISSION GUEST COMING ON MAY 5**


In early March, several members of our Mission Committee had lunch at Zaman International. Zaman International is a non-profit organization located in Inkster that empowers women to overcome extreme poverty by providing resources, education, and vocational training needed to pursue sustainable income and careers. Zaman is working with the Office of Global Michigan and Welcome Corps in a new phase of refugee resettlement. Private sponsorship groups consist

of five or more adults who, once matched with those awaiting placement overseas, will support refugee newcomers for 90 days through activities such as securing initial housing, enrolling children in school, and helping adults find employment.

We have invited Joan Walton, Zaman's Director of Community, to join us during worship on Sunday, May 5, 2024, to present a "Minute for Mission" regarding Welcome Corps. Following worship, she will give a more in-depth presentation during our Coffee Hour. Please plan to join us to learn about a possible mission opportunity for our congregation.

#### SUNDAY MORNINGS AT 9:00 am - THE PROPHET AMOS Beginning Sunday, April 7

The prophet Amos lived among a group of shepherds in Tekoa, a small town approximately ten miles south of Jerusalem. Amos made clear in his writings that he did not come from a family of prophets, nor did he even consider himself one. Rather, he was "a grower of sycamore figs" as well as a shepherd (Amos 7:14–15). Amos's connection to the simple life of the people made its way into the center of his prophecies, as he showed a heart for the

oppressed and the voiceless in the world.

More than almost any other book of Scripture, the book of Amos holds God's people accountable for their ill-treatment of others. It repeatedly points out the failure of the people to fully embrace God's idea of justice. They were selling off needy people for goods, taking advantage of the helpless, oppressing the poor, and the men were using women immorally (Amos 2:6–8; 3:10; 4:1; 5:11–12; 8:4–6). Drunk on their own economic success and intent on strengthening their financial position, the people had lost the concept of caring for one another; Amos rebuked them because he saw in that lifestyle evidence that Israel had forgotten God.


#### SUNDAY MORNINGS AT 11:45 am - THE BOOK OF REVELATION - Beginning Sunday, April 21



Have you ever been puzzled by all the symbolism in Revelation? What or who are the Beasts that are talked about? Or the Dragon, or the four horses of different colors? And what is your overall reaction to Revelation? Puzzlement, confusion, even anxiety? Well, you are not alone. Many people, particularly Christians, have been puzzling over Revelation for almost 2,000 years. Parts of it have been used to predict the future, particularly the timing of the world's end. Wikipedia mentions some 180 different predictions concerning the end of the world, ALL of which have

been wrong. But who wrote Revelation, and what did it mean for the original hearers, and what does it mean for us now, 2000 years later? And what about the Rapture, Tribulation, AntiChrist, and the Return of Christ?

Starting on Sunday, April 21, after coffee hour, Dr. John Whitfield will begin a class exploring these issues and more through a study of the book of Revelation. All are invited to come and be a part of this fascinating journey through this last book of the Bible. The class gathers downstairs in the old choir room.



#### MONDAY AFTERNOON STUDY GROUP - Beginning Monday, April 22 – 1:00 pm STOCKTON AFTER CHURCH

Beginning April 22, The Monday afternoon study group is pleased to welcome Dr. Ronald Stockton as our guest leader this spring! Ron is an award-winning political science professor at the University of Michigan-Dearborn. In his retirement, Ron continues to host his own podcast, "Stockton After Class.". Here is Ron's schedule:

**April 22- Max Weber on Calvin and The Protestant Ethic**. Max Weber believed that the emergence of Calvinist theology and the Calvinist "Protestant Ethic" had

transformed both Protestant thinking and European/Western culture and civilization. How could the concept of Predestination possibly transform the world? Find out here.

**April 29 - How a Pope is Elected.** 120 Cardinals will choose the next pope. But it is not that simple. **May 6 - The Presbyterians Divest**. Ten years ago, the Presbyterians debated as to whether or not to sell shares in five companies that profit from the Israeli occupation of Palestinian lands. I wrote three articles on the three phases of this struggle. Here is the story of that struggle.

**May 13 - How Churches Grow**. This will focus upon two academic studies: Rodney Stark was one of the great scholars. He wrote a book on the first 300 years of Christianity. How did Christianity go from a small struggling community to a dominant religion? There is also research on the rise of the Methodists on the American frontier and how they went from a small denomination to one of the dominant ones.

**May 20 - Israel and Genocide**. What is genocide? And what is the basis of the South African charge before the International Criminal Court? And what did they find?

- Discussed financing necessary organ repairs.
- Received information about three upcoming Adult Education opportunities.
- Received information about upcoming minutes for mission by the Zaman Institute and by the Dearborn Counseling Center.
- Approved a request from Presbyterian Women for fundraising events to benefit The Second Mile Center.
- Changed the April Session meeting to April 23, 2024, to avoid a conflict with a musical concert.
- Approved the call for a Special Congregational Meeting for April 7, 2024.
- Received departing thoughts and praise from Rev. Mark Phillips.
