

In 1933, Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr, pastor at Shadyside Presbyterian Church, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, conceived the idea for a World Communion Sunday to promote Christian unity and interconnectedness across the world's churches.

The Great Depression was being felt deeply. Hitler had become German Chancellor and Nazism hovered over Europe and threatened the entire world. Also taking

place, without widespread public knowledge, the first concentration camps were being built. As the Stewardship Committee and Rev. Kerr met, they saw that there needed to be a healing word spoken; a word that would affirm the oneness of the human race and the value of every life, plus a word that might translate religious beliefs into the politics of peace.

What evolved was not a political movement but a day on which Christians around the world would join hands across barriers of race and nationality to claim their oneness in Christ at his Table. They dreamed of a day in which all Christians would remember their connectedness as One Body as communion was celebrated. It is good to remember this oneness. We are living in a world, a society which is very much divided. Peace is not being promoted, and we struggle to hear words of hope or to witness reconciliation or partnering across "the aisle" to find a solution best for all. There is no sense of "oneness" in community.

This year, we celebrate World Communion on October 5 and should remember our connectedness with other Christians around the world. Worship styles and traditions may vary, but Christ's death and resurrection embodies God's love for all people and is our message of hope.

One of the stories which has been told over the years is about a young soldier named Johnny. Johnny was in the infantry in the British Army in World War II. His unit was surrounded, and he was captured and taken prisoner in Poland. The conditions were terrible: cold, wet, filthy, with almost no food, just a bowl of thin soup and a scrap of bread once a day. Prisoners lost weight to the point of being nothing but skin and bones. They contracted diseases and began to die.

The war was not going well for the Allies. There was little reason to hope for release. As the war progressed and Germany's fortunes diminished, the conditions in the prisoner of war camp became worse. Some did not want to go on living. Johnny was told of an easy way to end one's life: throw yourself against the barbed wire fence as if trying to escape and be shot by the guards.

One night Johnny, very discouraged and depressed, sick with despair and hunger, slipped out of the barracks and walked toward the fence. He was not quite sure whether he should end it all. He sat down on the ground to think. He sensed movement in the dark on the other side of the barbed wire. It was a Polish farmer. He had half a potato in his hand. He thrust the potato through the barbed wire. As Johnny took the potato, the man said in heavily accented English, "The Body of Christ."

One bread, one body, one Lord of all, one cup of blessing which we bless. And we, though many, throughout the earth, we are one body in this one Lord.
