The Saint Joseph Parkway has brought great joy to my family and I over these past few years we have lived here. We were blessed in 2020 to be able to purchase a home that was built upon the Noyes section of the Parkway and have therefore enjoyed the many miles (over 26) of this historic architectural marvel. I've done a little research into the history of the Parkway, and, like all things, the story is somewhat complicated. Different architects and builders worked together to actually bring the idea to fruition. There are stories of competition and frustration that color its history. I'm sure there were times when the Parkway was viewed more as an

obstacle to growth than as something to be preserved. But despite all these complicating factors, I am drawn time and time again to celebrate God for the beauty of creation that the Parkway represents.

I was on a long walk recently upon a section of the Parkway that I had previously not discovered. I had not intended to walk for as far as I did, and realized that I had a rare experience of being on a journey with an unknown destination! Each twist and turn in the path was accompanied by a new vision of beauty, a new bird's song, a new experience of warming light and cooling shadow. I took a picture to remember the experience. I, like most of you, have many voices adjuring to me to follow the safe, routine paths of life. My children request the same bedtime stories and songs almost every night. My wife and I frequent familiar shops and restaurants in town. We highlight and turn to our favorite memorized passages of Scripture. We find comfort in schedules, in routines, and in the ordinary work of living. There's a kind of beauty, even, as we realize that it is by the grace of God's own order and supervision that those routines can take place and root into us a sense of trust in His provision.

There are times, though, when the Spirit calls us into an adventure, onto unknown paths. It may be toward something as simple as a new recipe with a loved one, or to a new country with unfamiliar language and culture. Jesus Himself notes that the Spirit sovereignly moves in the hearts of God's people. The Spirit is no tame person of the Trinity, like some impersonal Force of Star Wars. The Spirit lives and is our source of life. The Spirit is affiliated with energy and action in Scripture, with light and flame and ministry. The Spirit propels God's people into circumstances they could not hope to control by their own abilities, into prayers they have not business uttering based on their own holiness, into work that can only be accomplished if attempted in communion with God Himself.

When Amanda and I made the decision to come to Saint Joseph, we found comfort in the path before us being straight and clear. The house was for sale. The work was familiar. The pastors were trusted. The church was inviting. Our families were closer. The region was home to us. Our little family of six rejoiced in those straightforward circumstances, even though the pandemic did add some complexity to all these good things. Nevertheless, I experienced a kind of joy and unwinding that I am just now realizing during this chapter of my life, and much of that is due to the Spirit equipping Brookdale Church to care for me and my family well. I am so grateful to you all for loving me, for caring for my wife, and for discipling my children.

As the Spirit calls me into a new adventure deeper into the heart of Christ for those who are suffering, I want to share two observations with you all. First, I am excited! I am thrilled to have the opportunity to step out of my comfort zone (having been in youth ministry for fifteen years) and into a new space where I will bring what I have learned of caring for youth and families to bear in meaningful ways for those who are suffering. I know God will cause me to grow in new ways, for the sake of His kingdom, and I do long to be more like Him. I don't know what the view will truly be like around the bend of this journey, but I am confident I will be walking with Jesus as it comes to pass.

Second, knowing that the turn in the path is coming causes me to appreciate this portion of the journey just that much more. I want to slow down and share with each of you just how much your support has meant to me and Amanda, how grateful I am for your care for the teenagers of Brookdale during my time here, and how I know God will remain faithful to His promise to continue to transform you into the image of Christ in my absence.

I hope that He will use my labors among you over these past years as elements toward that transformation, and that anything I have done or have failed to do that was dishonoring to Him or to others would be swiftly forgotten. Truthfully, I hope you remember the refrain of a song we sang together, or a joke we shared, or a prayer offered for your comfort. Yet, even if my contributions are quickly absorbed into the undefined corpus of events and memories that have formed the culture of Brookdale, we should remember that much of our work can be compared to a good meal: meaningful and appreciated in the moment, perhaps not worthy of story and song, but nevertheless a grace given so that we might trust in God for our daily provision. Truly, we can all release our anxieties of longing to be remembered, for God Himself knows our names - He calls us His own, and He will keep His own until His new day dawns. Pillar #4 Mission Elizabeth Dean

This is the fourth in a series, reviewing the four pillars of Brookdale's Vision. The Vision statement is: "Brookdale church is called to bring the beauty of the gospel to the Brokenness of Life." We believe that Brookdale's called to proclaim, embody, and live out this gospel message in its <u>prayer</u>, its <u>worship</u>, its approach to <u>spiritual formation</u>, and its <u>mission</u>, our four pillars.

What is the picture of mission? We see Brookdale as a place where people are sharing the gospel, embracing Their vocations, seeking the shalom of the city, and going to the nations.

Sharing the gospel how?

- 1. As a result of spiritual transformation by the beauty of the gospel, Brookdale becomes more and more a place where people are expressing radical and sacrificial love that expresses the heart of the gospel.
- 2. They are teaching about the gospel with people in their circle of nearness.
- 3. The goal? That others come to know Jesus, are baptized, and begin a life of discipleship.

Embracing their vocations. How?

- People see their work as more than just a way to make a living but as a personal calling from God.
- 2. People understand that their work is vital in God's Kingdom.
- 3. People endeavor to use their work to bring renewal to St. Joseph.

Seeking the shalom of the city. How?

- 1. Partner with others to pursue & promote common good.
- 2. Enter into the most broken places of St. Joseph.
- 3. Bring Christ like love, cross, shaped humility, and kingdom-driven purpose.
- 4. Touch these places with compassion, mercy & the healing power of the gospel.

Going to the nations. How?

- 1. People are burdened to pray for the nations of the world to come to know Christ.
- 2. People express their passion about missions by giving generosity to support missionaries & organizations. (Missions currently are approximately 14% of our budget).
- 3. People are moved to go out to the nations themselves.
