Loving Lent

I don't think I have ever heard anyone exclaim, "I LOVE Lent!" We have become accustomed to Lent being a season of preparation, which often means fasting from things that are unhealthy or adding practices that are better for us...both of which can begin to feel like an obligatory chore that we do reluctantly rather than with joy. In the current realities we are facing this Lent, I don't think God desires for us to add more burdens to our already overwhelmed spirits.

Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.
 - Jesus (Matt. 11:28)

This Lent, our series will invite us onto a journey that is much like tending plants (not one of my skills). We will be considering what to cultivate and what to let go. The hope is that the scriptures might lead us to better balance, more holistic healing, more sustainable rhythms. Our goal is that this Lent will be meaningful and what your soul most needs - a Lent that you might LOVE and appreciate.

Our annual theme is "Just Love," and after Easter, that will be our sermon series. All year, we have striven to emphasize love in all that we do, teach, preach, and embody. The world needs Christ's radical love, and if love is our compass point - our true north, then we can have an easier time setting our priorities, cultivating habits that enrich us and avoid that which depletes us. As we consider which relationships and practices to cultivate and what pieces of our lives we need to let go - perhaps LOVE is a helpful clarifier. Is this relationship based in love, are these practices infusing love, do I feel loved or loving when I participate in this or that? Where is God calling you to love more deeply and what is God inviting you to release?

May this Lenten journey be one that we

 be enough -


but that you may

 where this blessing began,


and wait

Board Update

Hello, PRCC Friends!

Hope this letter finds you warm! As we are going through our sermon series on Vision, our church leaders continue to work towards bringing the vision for our church in God's world today and into the future. At the January Board of Directors meeting, we passed this year's budget, which is balanced AND represents growth in many of our ministries. Thank you to our Vice Chair Colleen Moriarty, our Treasurer Mary Biardo, and the whole Finance Committee for putting all the work into a great financial plan! We also amended our by-laws to clarify our financial audit process and updated our contract review process with the church attorney. The Board of Directors voted to allow the Senior Pastor to have the administrator role of our church software system. All of these changes allow us to be more nimble and better able to meet the needs of our church. This is huge work, thank you Board of Directors!

Both the Executive Committee and Board of Directors met in January. We continue to pursue our annual goals:

A Word on Finance

Greetings and good tidings to all of our PRCC family!

It is with great joy that the Finance Committee reports we ended 2025 with 100% of pledges met and we have had generous pledges made for 2026 totaling approximately \$600,000 from 104 pledges, which represents an increase of \$45,000 from 2025. Healthy pledges, several generous, anonymous project donations along with good stewardship has kept us on solid footing going into 2026. Our Treasurer, Mary Biardo, has prepared the 2026 Budget and it was approved by the Board of Directors in January. Mary has worked on providing updated financial statements for each PRCC ministry area, committees and teams several times throughout the year to allow them to plan better how to use the funds allocated to them.



The roof, windows and external steeple projects are pretty much completed. The air conditioning and fire alarm system projects are moving along. And the internal steeple, Sunday School safety doors and Butler Place door security system are in the planning/bidding phase. Maintaining our buildings and improvements, such as air conditioning, are part of the legacy we will leave for the future PRCC. This could not happen without an amazing Trustee Committee and your continued financial support.

PRCC is filled with so many talented and knowledgeable congregants to draw upon. In the spirit of using our resources wisely, the Finance Committee and the PRCC Leadership has opted for an internal audit to take place this year. An Audit Team has been convened and will begin their work in early 2026. Our goal is to provide transparency, ensure we are utilizing best practices and engender trust that all donations are being put to good use.

A Church Use team has drafted a new fee schedule to standardize the church use fees to allow members and non-member groups quick and accurate invoices so we can hopefully share our space which will contribute to the care and upkeep of the buildings we know and love. The Board of Directors is currently reviewing this proposal before voting to implement.

It is with a full heart I thank you for sharing your talents, time and financial resources with PRCC. I am looking forward to continuing to build the future here at PRCC.

*For I desire mercy, not sacrifice, and acknowledgment of God
rather than burnt offerings. Hosea 6:6 (NIV)*

Rabbi Abraham Heschel is best known for his spiritual wisdom, and his prayerful dedication to his religious tradition. At the same time he worked for inter-religious dialogue and cooperation. My favorite quote of his is "Just to be is blessing. Just to live is holy." Born in 1907, Heschel escaped from Germany to the United States in 1940 as the Shoah descended on Germany. Other members of his family were not so fortunate.

Shoah is the preferred name among Jewish theologians for what we call the Holocaust. Shoah is a catastrophe, a ruinous disaster as opposed to a holocaust, which alludes to a burnt offering. The reference to a burnt sacrifice reminds Christians as well as Jews of God's words to Abraham when God stopped him from sacrificing Isaac, and beyond that, God's true desire for mercy and spiritual awareness.

Heschel's own painful losses and the brutality he observed in Germany informed another side of his religious views. He became a vocal advocate for civil rights because he understood justice was integral to faith. By 1963 he was calling for people to choose which leadership vision they would follow, that of Pharaoh or Moses.

After marching with Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King and other religious leaders from Selma to Montgomery, Heschel wrote: "For many of us the march ... was about protest and prayer. Legs are not lips, and marching is not kneeling, and yet our legs uttered songs. Even without words, our march was worship. I felt my legs were praying."

Heschel also said, "Prayer is no panacea, no substitute for action." I think we know where he would have been in the past weeks: marching in Minneapolis, praying and being arrested at the airport, walking down the street in Broadview, or responding to the pleas of children to be let out of the DHS prison in Texas.

In these painful times we are reminded that quiet actions we take as individuals are just as important as prayer and public protest. We have begun a new training class for Stephen Ministers, four of whom are PRCC congregants: Julie Bruno, Sharon Kemerer, Lauri McCleneghan, and Sharon Peterson. There are five others from local churches who are interested in the program, and have been included in our class. Please pray for all of these compassionate and dedicated people of faith as they begin this journey of both prayer, and action.







MEET THE MUSIC STAFF

Hi! I'm Jane Kenas-Heller and I have the pleasure of being the accompanist for PRCC's Chancel Choir, playing for their Thursday night rehearsals, their Sunday morning anthems, and for the extra services throughout the church year. I also enjoy playing for our amazing soloists from the choir and for the wonderful instrumental guest soloists such as John Bruce Yeh (Chicago Symphony Orchestra clarinetist) and Irwin Heller (clarinetist and husband)!

My tenure at PRCC began in January of 2020 when Sasha Gerritson asked me to be the choir's accompanist. I met Sasha when she was a freshman vocal student at Northeastern Illinois University where I served as the full-time staff accompanist for the Music Department from 1978-2010 and then on a part-time basis from 2011-2022. Sasha had asked me to sub occasionally through the years for the Chancel Choir rehearsals, so I knew what a talented (and fun!) group they were and happily accepted her offer.

Like Angie and Andrew Weber, I'm a Wisconsin native and earned my Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance degree from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, my hometown! While a student at UWSP, I was lucky enough to serve as the pianist for two USO tours with the university theatre department: one to US Strategic Air Command (SAC) bases in Greenland, Iceland, and Canada and a second, 8-week tour to US Army bases in Germany. After college I moved to the Chicago area and while working at NEIU earned my Master of Arts in Music/ Vocal Pedagogy degree there.

During my first years in the Chicago area my music jobs were as a free-lance vocalist: Chicago Opera Theatre, touring with the Lyric Opera of Chicago Young Artist Program, singing in churches and Jewish temples (they didn't mind that I was Presbyterian!) In 1978, my job at NEIU included accompanying many evening rehearsals and recitals, so my vocal work was limited to weekends only.

I feel very blessed that I have been able to make my living in music as a full-time accompanist. Before starting at PRCC, I was very familiar with Park Ridge, as I was hired to accompany the Park Ridge Chorale (originally the Maine South Alumni Choir) in 1988. I retired from that position after our recent Holiday Concert, having played for them for 38 years. So many wonderful memories to cherish!

I have already gathered an amazing number of wonderful musical memories to cherish here at PRCC. Two that stand out are both from Good Friday services: the Faure Requiem and The Seven Last Words of Christ by Dubois. The challenge for me was to make the piano sound as much as possible like a full orchestra for those two works and I enjoyed the challenge very much. I can't wait to see what Sasha is planning next!






