# A Vision for the New Day

A New Year offers us the opportunity to reset, and even though we can choose to reset our habits and patterns anytime we want, a new year gives us a mile marker, which often is exactly the incentive we need. We will begin our year together considering the vision worth following. The Wise Ones followed a star because they were convinced it would be worth the trek. When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; what are humans that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?

Psalm 8:3-4

Hard as it may be to believe, it is now (or, as I'm writing this, is almost) 2026. This past year has at times felt like it would never end, and then there were whole months that flew by before I could flip the page on my calendar (even the virtual one). Time is tricky that way - sometimes stretching before us like a vast, blank page, overwhelming in the possibilities of what could be written; sometimes slipping between our fingers like sand, a day gone before we can even process its impact.

To that end, I was struck by something Pastor Carol said in a recent sermon: we run the risk of being unable to experience awe and wonder because we miss what's right in front of us. She stressed the importance of pausing and noticing, not only the big, impressive things we may encounter on occasion, but also the small, quiet moments of beauty, generosity, and kindness that are so easy to miss when we're rushing from one task to the next. When we pause and give ourselves time to recognize the sacred moments amidst our everyday struggles, we open ourselves up to wonder and awe in a way that is transformative.

In her book Help, Thanks, Wow: The Three Essential Prayers, Anne Lamott writes:

When we are stunned to the place beyond words, we're finally starting to get somewhere. It is so much more comfortable to think that we know what it all means, what to expect and how it all hangs together. When we are stunned to the place beyond words, when an aspect of life takes us away from being able to chip away at something until it's down to a manageable size and then file it nicely away, when all we can say in response is "Wow," that's a prayer.

If you're struggling to find the "Wow" right now and would benefit from talking to someone, reach out to me or any of our Stephen Leaders. We're always happy to connect you to one of our excellent Stephen Ministers who will listen, pray, and walk alongside you during difficult times. May this new year be one filled with moments of "Wow" and prayers of thanksgiving for our capacity to see and appreciate them.



# Faith Development: Prophets, Dr. King, and a New Year

This autumn Adult Education offered *Disciple: Remember Who You Are* which was a slog through the Old Testament Prophets. It started out difficult. A lot of reading. Then it got worse. There were weekly titles of Famine, Obey, Doom occasionally interrupted with Courage and Restoration.

We learned that Hebrew kings were flawed or evil. The temple was destroyed. Wars and deportations to foreign lands recurred. Power was corrupt. People wanted freedom.

The Prophets had no special ability to predict the future. Instead, they were charged with reminding people of God and their place as a covenant people. The early liberation from oppression in Egypt had been led by Moses. Moses received the Ten Commandments. While grateful to be freed from Pharoah, how did we get there in the first place? It was no fun.

Prophets reminded people of God and Moses. Of the Ten Commandments. They called out the sins of the people. Amos names greed and hypocritical worship services. (Amos 5: 21-24) Micah says it is not that hard... Do justice, Love kindness, and Walk humbly with your God. (Micah 6:8).

The life and legacy of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King fit this description of prophet. He was educated by his church upbringing and academic work at Boston University. He was offered prestigious placements but instead followed a call to Montgomery, Alabama as a young man.

By 1963, he joined with Rev. Fred Shuttleworth in Birmingham, AL to oppose the white supremacy. As people were rising up to confront the segregation and discrimination, they were asked to commit to a nonviolent witness. Leaders listed a "Ten Commandments" for volunteers. It included:

- 1. Meditate daily on the teachings and life of Jesus.
- 2. Remember always that the nonviolent movement in Birmingham seeks justice and reconciliation not victory.
- 3. Walk and talk in the manner of love, for God is love.

Dr. King was hated for this. Rev. Shuttleworth's parsonage had been bombed years before. Black leaders criticized them for allowing young people to join and sign the pledge. Prophets are not popular – not fun to have around.

Yet there was a faithful urgency in 1963. As events in Birmingham became more intense Dr. King was jailed. He composed a document for freedom. It was not written to his enemies. Instead he called out the sins of progressive white pastors and leaders to heed the call of Jesus. He reminded Christians who they were as a covenant people. It was uncomfortable because they preferred "patience."

Perhaps this year we can gather to read this together: "Letter from a Birmingham Jail"

As we finished our class before Christmas, the hopefulness of Isaiah found in the lyrics of Handel's Messiah had a deeper understanding: Comfort ye, comfort ye my people... prepare ye the way of the Lord... (Isa 40:1) and this Chorus: (Isa 9:6)

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder; and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace."

May God continue to bless us with deeper understanding,







# YOUTH MISSION TRIP JUNE 7-13, 2026



#### **REGISTER YOUTH HERE!**

**WHAT:** We will travel to PORTLAND, OR in collaboration with Praying Pelican to learn and serve in the city and beyond! We will learn of the community needs due to those displaced from their homes, environmental issues, and more!

**WHO:** All youth who will have completed 6th-12th grades are invited to attend-40 youth spots available!

**COST:** \$800.00 PER PERSON / SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE!!!
PLEASE DO NOT let the cost detour youth from participating! Please speak to Pastor Mollie for assistance! We are very blessed with a memorial gift and other generous gifts!

What does my payment cover? Payment covers registration cost and "some" of our transportation. Overall tripexpenses equate to \$1,200.00 per person. The \$400 difference between overall expenses and your payments will be covered by generous donations and fundraising. Youth meals (except for airport travel days), transportation, t-shirts, and sleeping accommodations will be covered for the week!

**HOW WILL WE GET THERE:** Flying to Portand, vans rentals once we arrive


