Symbols of Easter



What do a lily, a lamb, and an egg have in common with a candle? They are all symbols for Easter.

The early church needed symbols so they could be safe in times of persecution, recognize each other, and profess their faith. Centuries later, symbols continue. It is good for us to retrace their connection to the risen Christ.

THE PASCHAL CANDLE

On Holy Saturday night, the paschal candle is lighted while the people wait in darkness. As the candle is slowly carried up the aisle, the ancient proclamation is sung: "Christ our light." The candlelight reminds us that the darkness of death did not overcome Jesus. It is a sign of giving ourselves to serve others, to be light.

THE PASCHAL LAMB

My grandmother had a lamb mold, and each year she would make banana bread in it. For years my mother used that mold, and now it is my turn. The lamb was a symbol of the Passover, representing the blood of the slain lamb that was smeared over the doorposts. The lamb was a symbol of sacrifice and freedom. Later, John the Baptist called Jesus the "Lamb of God." A symbol of the risen Christ is a lamb with visible wounds, holding a victory banner.

EASTER LILIES

Each fall, we plant bulbs that burst forth in the spring with flowers. Jesus, too, was buried, in a borrowed tomb. On Easter Jesus, like a lily, came bursting forth with new life. On Easter, churches are decorated with flowers that come from bulbs, and their beauty and fragrance fill the room.

THE EASTER EGG

Throughout the ages, the egg has been a symbol of new life for people of many religions. Ancient people from the East believed that the world itself began with an enormous egg! Years ago, people gave up eggs during Lent, so, for Easter, the faithful painted Easter eggs in bright colors, had them blessed, gave them to friends as gifts, and ate them. For us, the unbroken egg is a reminder of the tomb of Christ. Out of the tomb emerged the Risen One!

THE EASTER BUNNY

This all-popular symbol had its origin in pre-Christian fertility lore. In Germany, the Easter bunny was believed to *lay red eggs* on Maundy Thursday and eggs of other colors the night before Easter! The Easter bunny has never had a close Christian connection, but serves as a symbol of abundant new life.

Still we find meaning and power in these symbols. With the candle, we share the light. The lamb sets us free. Like flowers, eggs, and bunnies, new life comes, again and again ... for us and the world.

Together we sing *Alleluia*. Thanks be to God!

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St. Mark's Day April 25

Mark the Evangelist, the author of the second Gospel, was one of the early Christian missionaires. Though he traveled widely and lived for many years in Alexandria, it is believed that his relics were taken to Venice, Italy. Venice has named Mark as its patron saint and observes April 25th, St. Mark's Day, as a public holiday. The winged lion that is Mark's symbol comes from Mark's description of John the Baptist as a "voice of one crying out in the desert," which artists have compared to a roaring lion.

"Heaven, Hell and Life after Death" Tuesdays at 10:00 a.m. Six-week Adult Study starting April 10

Jesus is risen! He is risen indeed! During this Easter season, we proclaim and live more fully into this truth. This truth gives hope. This truth provides comfort. It helps us as we navigate the fragility and uncertainness of life here on earth.

That being said, many of us still struggle with questions surrounding mortality and death. What does Jesus' death and resurrection mean for us when we die? What happens when we die? Is that our end? Is that our beginning? What awaits us in life after death? Is heaven real? Is hell real? Many of us have these questions brewing in our minds.

Our Easter Adult Study is designed to help us discern these tough issues. Together, we will examine what the Bible has to say in response to these questions:

April 10: Why do we have to die?

April 17: What does the Bible say about heaven and hell?

April 24: Is heaven a place?

May 1: What is the Kingdom of God?

May 8: What comes after death for us?

May 15: What do the cross and resurrection have to do

with Christian life?

A final resting place The St. Mark's Columbarium

Historically, Christians have often been laid to rest in churches, where they could be remembered and honored by parishioners. Several years ago, a group of St. Mark's members wanted to investigate the possibility of adding this ministry to our church. After much research, and the commitment of this dedicated group, our columbarium has become a reality.

Set in our beautiful courtyard, the columbarium offers a sacred space for our loved ones. The garden and benches provide a serene spot for remembering, prayer, and thanksgiving. The choice of a niche at St. Mark's is symbolic of the life cycle of faith, and it simplifies the end-of-life planning process. There is no need to shop for a burial plot, casket, or monument. Services can be held at the church, and family can walk just steps to the columbarium.

Currently, the cost of a niche, which can hold the cremains of two people, is \$1200, which includes the urns, the stone, and the engravings.

Physical* – Walk! It's free; you can do it alone or with someone else; you can listen to reflective music, pray, or just enjoy God's presence in the beauty of nature. Studies have shown that walking is the best and easiest type of exercise and causes a minimal amount of stress on the joints and back. If you have mobility issues, there are chair exercises you can do. Visit the Go4Life section of the National Institute on Aging website for more information. (go4life.nia.nih.gov)



Mental and Emotional – Laugh often! Laughing releases "feel good hormones" that uplift your mood. Watch a funny movie or comedian, read humorous cards at the grocery store, try to see the comical side of daily life.



Social – Spend time with family and friends. Get out the old board games or play cards. Ask your parents or grandparents to teach you some of the games they used to play



Capital Campaign update





The first chart shows the status of capital campaign giving as of 2/28/2018. The pledges are divided into regular pledges and legacy pledges. The legacy pledges are pledges that giving units have made in their estates, so no giving is expected from them at this time. For the regular pledges, here is a summary of the numbers in the graph:
