

### FLAG DAY JUNE 14TH

Flag Day is a holiday celebrated on June 14th in the United States. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777 by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. The Flag Resolution stated "that the flag of the thirteen United States by thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation.

Flag Day is not an official federal holiday. Federal law leaves it to the discretion of the president to officially proclaim the observance. Title 36 of the United States Code, Subtitle I, Part A, Chapter 1, Section 110 is the official statute of Flag Day. The United States Army also celebrates it's birthday on this date.


Love tunes our ears to our Lord's words of promise, too. Whether we're weary and worried or elated and energized, we can come. Need to get away?

### Ups and Downs

Our church has gone through many ups and downs in the 179 years of existence in Sullivan, Moultrie County, Illinois. We've survived the strife on the home front during the Civil War when about half of our county's population supported the north and the other half the rebels. All of the appointments in the Sullivan Circuit closed except two during the Civil War because folks believed the Methodists in general were too supportive of the Union cause. It took several years for some of the outlying appointments to reopen and some never did.

By the 1870s, the Sullivan Circuit had regained its strength at about the same time Rev. Samuel Harshman, a Holiness Methodist preacher, began evangelizing in the area. After he led a revival in our church, he decided to hold meetings in his home in Sullivan, and many of our long time members joined his congregation. The church struggled from this loss in membership until the late 1880s. A series of revivals brought so many into the church by 1893 during the pastorate of Rev. Wilkin, that a new church was needed.

As mentioned previously, the church experienced a period of great growth in the 16 years from 1896 to 1912, when only 4 pastors served. In contrast, four different pastors served in the next 7 years,

(1913-1919) as the addition of new members slowed drastically. I could not find much information on those 4 pastors, the Reverends Jordan F. Wohlfarth (1913-1914),

Jesse S. Tharp (1915-1916), George W. Metzel (1917-1918), and J. A. Biddle (1919).

Rev. Jordan F. Wohlfarth was from Pennsylvania and served there in his early years. By 1879, he was in the St. Louis Conference, followed by the Illinois Conference in 1882 where he stayed until 1923. Along the way he received a doctor of divinity degree. In 1821, right after serving Sullivan, his wife died, but he soon remarried a woman from Colorado. He died in Denver in 1931. His grandson became a Methodist minister, too.

I did find Rev. Tharp's obituary from 1958 which says Tharp served churches in the Illinois Conference for forty-five years. "Some of the important occasions during the early years were conducting campaigns against the liquor traffic, and also evangelistic campaigns where many were converted and became active members of the church, and at Martinsville, Ill., a new parsonage was built."

There was a 1920 article from the Moultrie County News I found that detailed Rev. J. A. Biddle's attempts to get more young people coming to church. "Those attending (the regular church service) at least ten sessions were given a picnic on Monday afternoon at Pifer's Park..." Twenty seven young people qualified, including my Aunt Bernadyne Shuman. "Refreshments consisting of ice cream and cake were served... A trip to Decatur was given to those who were present at least twenty services during the past three months..." for which 6 teens qualified. Pifer's Park was a lake built near an old brick and tile factory southeast of Sullivan on the east side of the Kaskaskia that had resort cabins for rent as well as canoes and boats to rent. In my teenage years, our Methodist Youth Fellowship often went there for our youth outings and recreation.

A trip to Decatur may not seem so attractive today, but in 1920 most people traveled to Decatur via the passenger train that went through Sullivan several times a day on the Illinois Central Railroad (now the Canadian National Railroad). Hard roads were scarce and certainly not present between Sullivan and Decatur in 1920. Most traffic on local roads was by horse and buggy or wagon. Therefore, a free trip to Decatur was very, very special.

Also, by 1920, World War I was over, and soldiers came home.

The community must have been elated to see their safe return from battle. Once again, the church seemed revitalized by the next ministers.
