Darkness into light, and the “Real St. Valentine”

There is a theme of Darkness into light emerging in the common lectionary throughout Epiphany and into February. Our season is one where the end of winter meets the first stirrings of spring. The fabled story of St. Valentine also meets at the intersection of darkness into light.

The real St. Valentine was far removed from paper lace doilies, chocolates and Hallmark Cards that we associate with this holiday. According to the Smithsonian Institute, the historical figure is likely a composite of two different 3rd-century martyrs that emerge from the darkness of Roman persecution.

But why are letters of love associated with Valentine? While Valentine was imprisoned, Asterius, a Roman jailer, challenged the saint to prove God’s power. He asked him to heal his daughter’s blindness. Valentine prayed and laid hands on the girl, restoring her sight. Valentine was executed on February 14. Before his death, he reportedly sent a final note to the girl, signing it from your Valentine”

As we move through February’s lectionary there are echoes of this transformation from darkness into light. The month begins with the Beatitudes with the darkness of mourning and hunger, followed by the light of Jesus. By mid-February, the scriptures take us to “You are the light of the world”. Our God’s light isn’t just something to see, but something to be—by feeding the hungry and comforting those who grieve. And as we descend into the Lenten season, it is only through the shadows that the light of Easter can truly be revealed.

Valentine’s story and the February lectionary both suggest that light is most visible when the surroundings are darkest. Whether it is a martyr restoring sight to a blind girl in a Roman cell or the liturgical shift from the Glory of Epiphany, to the Dust of Ash Wednesday, the message is consistent: light does not ignore the darkness, it enters it to transform it.

On a lighter note, the oldest known surviving “Valentine” was written in February 1477 by Margery Brews to her fiancé John Paston III and it read as follows:

I promise I will do everything in my power to love you and no one else ever again. And even if my friends (family) say I am doing wrong, they shall not stop me from doing so. My heart commands me to love you forever more. Truly above all earthly things.

May light out of the darkness bring you closer to the Christ Jesus in this coming month. And may your heart be filled with the kind of love that is truly above all earthly things, and with you forever more.

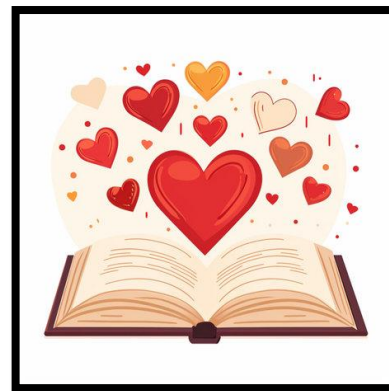

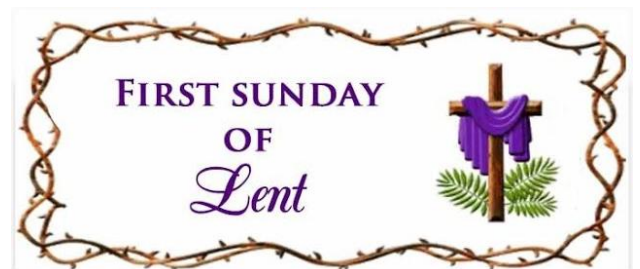
