In a world filled with anxieties, worries, and fears, could you stand to have a bit more joy?





The name "Shrove Tuesday" is derived from the word "shrive", which means to confess and receive absolution. The name denotes a period of cleansing, wherein a person brings their lusts and appetites under subjection through abstention and self-sacrifice.

Come, let us worship. Psalm 95

Worship is at the very heart of the life of the Church. Worship is the principal influence that shapes our faith. It is one of the most visible ways we express our faith. Particularly in the reformed tradition, worship fosters a strong sense of unity with God and with the community of faith with the past, present, and future. It is through worship we see a world in need of God and are able to participate with that healing.

Perhaps one of the intriguing questions regarding worship is best directed at "why" we do things. Much of our form of worship is rooted in the Jewish tradition (Jesus was Jewish).

In one sense, the book of Acts in the New Testament is the most important for our understanding of the early Church. Apart from the book of Acts, we have little information about the early Church, except for what we can deduce from the letters of Paul. Throughout the book of Acts, consistent in the Church is the spreading of the "word".

Worship since Christianity began seems to have changed due to the human desire for power. From the outside looking in, the communist manifesto described religion as "the opiate of the masses". Without an understanding of the aspects of worship, it would appear the mystery involved in the sacraments, the magnitude of the architecture, and politics are tools used to soothe the poverty of the mass while the elite drown in pleasure.

The evolution of thought (Enlightenment), though despised by many, appears to be the beginning of unity back into the Church. The very early Christians had little organization but a central purpose, the great commission. However, once a hierarchy was in place the power struggle began. During the enlightenment period, people begin to ask "why" we do things.

The sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper are but of two prime examples of this evolution of thought. Our understanding of these is they are a sign and act of God's self-giving, by which God's grace is made available to us. The sacraments are the primary signs of the covenant of grace. The mystery is not necessarily in the basic elements (water, bread, wine), but in the work of the Holy Spirit.

Architecture and Church furnishings appear to be one of the greatest examples of the massing of human wealth and power in the name of religious worship.

One of my most moving religious experiences was setting in one of the Catholic Cathedrals in West Germany. I went in simply to view the majesty of the building and beauty of the art work. What I discovered was without a word being spoken, I was experiencing a truly moving religious event. I found

myself teary eyed as I viewed the various artistic accounts of the suffering of our ancestors. The realization of the pain and agony of the Christ became etched clearly in my memory. The glory of the resurrection abounded. Surely, all this must have been inspired by God.

On the other hand, I recall the historical accounts of wars that resulted in thefts and killings that appear to have occurred mainly for the massing of wealth beyond my imagination in the hands of a few, while at the same time the vast majority of people were living in hunger, fear, and disease with no seeming hope for the better. This seemed to contradict the directive to go and "feed my sheep".

Perhaps one of the significant reasons the middle-ages was so dark were the power struggles within the Church. These power struggles were seemingly for individual rather than corporate good. This being a time where to disagree with the leaders of the Church or to have new ideas meant excommunication and/or death.

Clearly, one of the most important (if not the most important) inventions was the printing press. This allowed the masses to be more educated and as a result more involved. Eventually new ideas surfaced and powers begin to shift.


The question of "why" is best answered with the motivation of the individual. Whom do you seek to glorify, God or Self? Throughout it all, the Holy Spirit has been active interceding for us, guiding us, and teaching us. God is sovereign.

The reformed tradition's worship is centered on God rather than self and feelings. Our attention is drawn to the majesty and glory of God. God who created all, sustains all, who was revealed in the person of Jesus raised from the dead to rule over all, and who is at work in and among us by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Although we see change as inevitable in Christian worship, we remember the past. Unity of faith is part of our assurance. Retaining such things as creeds and common prayers, we are binding ourselves with Christians of the past.

We are beginning to look at others in ways that highlight our resemblances rather than our differences. We see Baptism as a fundamental to our faith. We recognize the scripture being read and proclaimed as central to worship. We share a common liturgical calendar. We are beginning to recognize that in belief and practice there is more that unites us rather than divides us at the Lord's Table.

The very early creed "Jesus is Lord" exemplifies where worship began and perhaps where we are going.
