Annual mission conference March 13-15

The 2015 World Mission Conference is coming to Clifton Christian Church in Grand Junction Friday, March 13 through Sunday, March 15. The weekend kicks off Friday night with a six-station Tour of an African Village. A children's treasure hunt and refreshments following the tour are included. More than 600 tourists are expected, so the 30-minute tours will begin every 1/2 hour from 4:30 until 8:30. Tickets are \$5 each or \$15 for a family, and can be purchased at The Intersection at DCC Sunday, March 8.
